Four Wives Seek Divorce.—Four divorce suits were filed yesterday in circuit court. Lena Olmstead asks freedom from B. B. Olmstead, on the ground of infidelity. The couple married in Montezuma, Wash., May 16, 1905. She asks \$35 a month alimony and the custody of three small children. Fannie K. Lehten seeks divorce from John O. Lehten on the grounds of desertion and cruelty. They were married in New York city, November 11, 1905, and have two small children. Mrs. Lehten wants custody of the youngest, Jennie L. Hayne asks a divorce from Henry T. Hayne, the custody of a young child and her maiden name, Jennie L. Van Doren. They were married in Hillsboro, August 31, 1909. Jennie G. Hall charges that Arthur A. Hall abused her. She asks for her maiden name, Jennie G. Bledsoe. They were married in Clarke county, Washington, April 23, 1912.

Sue for \$9000.—Claiming that Charles Zeller owes them \$9000 for the maintenance of himself and wife for 15 years, George Reynard, Ella Frost Reynard, his wife, and Amos B. Frost have started suit in circuit court for that amount. Mrs. Reynard and her brother, Amos Frost, are step-children of Zeller. In 1894 the Reynards were married, and Amos Frost joined them in maintaining a home. The following year Zeller and his wife agreed to pay \$4500 each if the Reynards and Frost would take them into their home. Mrs. Zeller died September 12 last, and Zeller left his step-children a week later. The Reynards and Frost maintain that though able to pay for his and his wife's maintenance, Zeller has never paid a cent toward their expenses.

Gets Verdict for \$2000.—A jury in the circuit court awarded John F. Dufur judgment for \$2000 against J. B. Hill, a Kalama, Wash., millowner, for logs sold Hill during the summer and fall of 1909. Dufur salvaged the logs, which floated down the Lewis river, as the result of freshets, and placed them in Hill's boom for keeping. Hill claimed that he purchased the logs from the real owners, the companies who had logged them, and agreed with them to pay Dufur \$150 a thousand feet salvage. Dufur refused the offer and demanded the full price of the logs. Hill tried to show that Dufur had broken the Washington law regarding salvaged logs, but as few of the brands with which the logs were marked had been registered, the attempt failed.

To Tell About Convention.—C. C. Chapman, manager of the promotion department of the Portland Commercial club, will occupy the pulpit of the Central Christian church, Twentieth and East Salmon streets, next Sunday at 11 a. m. This will be Mr. Chapman's first appearance in the pulpit, but not as a public speaker, for he has the reputation of a spellbinder. Mr. Chapman's text will be "The Second World's Christian Citizenship Convention," to be held in this city next year and in the interest of which the Commercial club is giving its best efforts.

The blaze was out in 10 minutes, having started by spontaneous combustion. The damage was very slight.

Not Guilty of Mayhem.—After a half hour of debate the jury in the case of Charles Pottage, accused of mayhem by Thomas Conroy in a saloon brawl in the Bachelor saloon at Third and Alder streets July 25, brought in a verdict of not guilty. The case was tried before Circuit Judge McGinn. Pottage was indicted July 21.

Vacant House Burns.—Fire entirely destroyed a vacant house belonging to M. McNulty in Fulton, near Roscoe's Park, at an early hour this morning. The damage amounted to several hundred dollars.

MICHIGANDERS PLAN HOME-GOING JOURNEY

Members of the Portland Michigan society will meet tonight in Women of Woodcraft hall, Tenth and Taylor streets, to discuss plans for a proposed home-going trip to be taken next spring, probably in May or June. The project has been launched by Mrs. Harriet Hendee, secretary of the society, the idea being to run a special train to Michigan to give former Michigan people now living in Portland and other Oregon cities an opportunity to visit in their home towns. The Michigan society has a membership of 600 and it is estimated that there are more than 4000 Michiganders now living in Oregon. The purposes of the contemplated trip will be purely social. It is intended to arrange for some form of entertainment for the excursionists in the larger cities of Michigan and then to allow the visitors to make side trips to their former homes as they may desire. So far the idea has been given enthusiastic support and it is expected that a fresh impetus will be given the scheme at tonight's meeting.

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COMMISSIONERS WILL LET ROAD WORK WAIT

Calling attention to a place on the county road known as Thorburn avenue on the north side of Mount Tabor, a communication from Frank Perkins, 68 East Sixty-first street, was read at yesterday's meeting of the county commissioners. Mr. Perkins said the roadway at this point curves in such a manner that a small fill would make it straight and place it in good condition. The commissioners decided no change could be made until spring.

Will Hatchell, superintendent of quarries, was given an order by the board authorizing him to inspect the machinery connected with the heating plant of the new court house. C. D. Fisher, engineer of the county road roller, was instructed to do private roadrolling work for Kibble, Walton company, of 501 Selling building. The company has agreed to pay the county \$10 per day for the use of the machine. Two bills for painting materials used at the Detention home were received. One bill from F. E. Beach & Co. called for \$8.55, the second, from the Pioneer Paint company, was for \$106.

Leaps for Life: Dying.
(Special to The Journal.) Los Angeles, Oct. 8.—Thomas Reyes, a construction worker, is dying here today, following a sensational leap for life. Reyes returned home from work and threw himself on the bed without removing his clothing. He awakened to find his room a mass of flames and sprang from a second story window, leaving a trail of sparks behind him. The fall did not hurt Reyes, but he probably will die from burns.
