

GOV. MARSHALL TO REACH PORTLAND THURSDAY, OCT. 24

Democratic Candidate for Vice President May Spend Entire Day in City; Other Speaking Dates Are Announced.

A telegram received by Chairman Haney of the democratic state committee last evening states that Governor Marshall of Indiana, candidate for vice-president, will arrive at Medford shortly after 5 o'clock in the afternoon of October 23, and the regular schedule calls for his leaving half an hour later for Portland. This would give him the whole of the next day in Portland, unless other arrangement is made. Two plans are being discussed. One is to have him speak at Medford the night of October 23, and bring him to Portland by special train the next day, speaking at towns en route. The other is to have him come through to Portland and go to Salem for a day speech on October 24. Either way, he will speak in Portland the evening of October 24th.

President Taft was re-elected in a straw vote taken on the steamers T. J. Potter and Monarch yesterday afternoon among the guests invited to the launching of the "Multnomah" at St. Helens. Fairness was secured by making Phil Metcalf, republican; Paul S. Seely, democrat and George W. Joseph, progressive, supervisors of the ballot. On the Potter, Taft received 141, Wilson 123, Roosevelt 85 and Chaffin 2. On the Monarch, Taft had 88, Wilson 89 and Roosevelt 22, a total of 229 for Taft, 227 for Wilson and 114 for Roosevelt. The Taft men chuckled over the result, while the Wilson and Roosevelt men wagged their heads and said the vote made clear the election of their respective favorites, because the votes came from business men, where Taft had his strength, and the deciding vote of the wage earners was not weighed in.

There was exultation at Progressive headquarters yesterday over the report of a straw vote taken by Charles Rittenhouse in Yamhill county. It was stated that he devoted two days to the work, using a motorcycle and getting a good share of country voters in his poll. He reported interviewing 587 voters, of

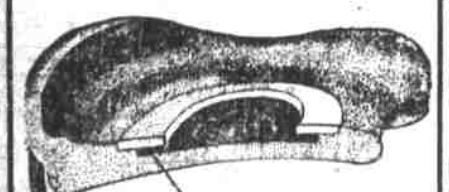

Ng Poon Chew's message of the commercial awakening of new China will be delivered before the business men of Portland tomorrow evening. The dinner will be given in the commercial club under the auspices of the Rotary club, and the representation of the city's business organizations will cause an attendance of about 300.

The Jonathan Bourne campaign for United States Senator is the only one with double-header headquarters. In the Journal building S. A. Darnall is in charge, while Russell Hawkins oversees things at the Imperial hotel quarters. A liberal quantity of literature is to be sent out telling of Bourne's record, to be reinforced by newspaper advertising and a corps of speakers. The senator himself will meander over the state as far as time will permit and mingle with the voters.

Ben Selling, the Republican candidate for United States senator, last night reiterated previous declarations of confidence that he will be elected in November. He said that conditions are improving every day from his viewpoint, and he feels much encouraged by recent reports he has received. He will continue making short trips out of Portland in the interests of his candidacy during the remaining weeks of the campaign, keeping in close touch with his headquarters here.

Col. C. E. S. Wood will leave tomorrow night for a two weeks' campaigning trip for Woodrow Wilson through Idaho and Nevada, the first Oregon speaker to be called outside the state by one of the national committees. He is to speak for Wilson and Marshall. After this trip is finished, he will make six speeches in Oregon on dates to be later announced.

John W. Campbell, Progressive party nominee for congress in the first district, was in the city yesterday and reports much encouragement in his campaign against Congressman Hawley. Taft is poor third in the presidential race, he says, after an extensive tour through the Willamette valley. Tomorrow he goes to Hillsboro and Newberg, then to Eugene, and later in the week leaves Roseburg for Coos county, where he will visit Myrtle Point, Coquille, Bandon, Empire, North Bend and Marshfield. He will arrive in Astoria by boat about October 24, and after touching Columbia county will spend the remaining time before election in Polk, Yamhill and neighboring counties.

The Woodrow Wilson league of Oregon will hold its weekly meeting at the new Lincoln high school auditorium Friday night. A prominent speaker will be heard. The Ad club quartet has secured several new political parodies to be sung.

The time for the speech of Secretary of State Knox in Portland has been definitely fixed for next Tuesday night, following communication yesterday between Chairman Moores of the Republican state committee with the Republican managers in Seattle, where the secretary arrived on Friday from Japan. Stephen A. Lowell has been invited to preside at the meeting, which will be held at the armory at 8:30 o'clock.

One more week is left for registration. The county clerk's office will be open for the tardy ones from 8 o'clock in the morning until 9 o'clock at night every day. All who have not registered during 1912 must do so during the coming week to vote, and all who have moved from one precinct to another must call, and have the change made in the books. Go to the fourth floor in the courthouse, where five clerks are.

After finishing the itinerary heretofore announced for him, ending at Corvallis Wednesday night, A. E. Clark, Progressive nominee for United States senator, will speak in Astoria and Oregon City the latter part of the week. Definite dates will be announced tomorrow.

A Roosevelt and Johnson meeting will be held tomorrow night at the east side library, East Eleventh and Alder streets, under the auspices of the Women's Roosevelt club. Miss M. E. Hill will preside and Emmett Callahan will be the chief speaker.

The University club went enthusiastically for Woodrow Wilson for president in a straw vote taken at the club last night. The result of the vote was: Wilson, 28; Taft, 18; Roosevelt, 4.

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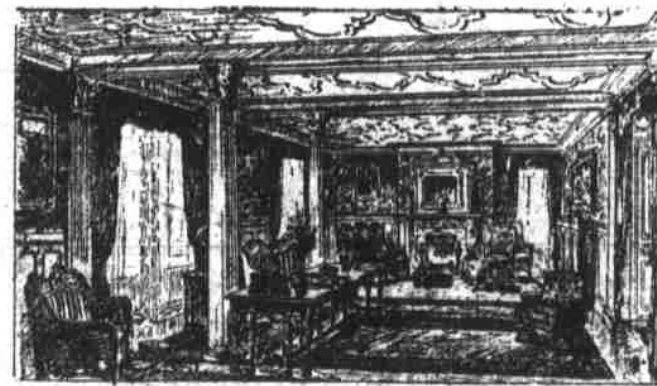
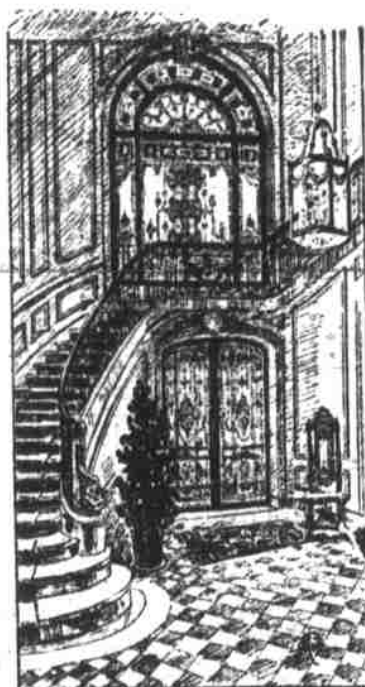
