Weather Conditions.

A large high pressure area extends from the North Pacific states southward to Oklahoma and thence northward to Ohio. There is a small low pressure area passing to sea down the St. Lawrence valley and a large low pressure area centered over southeastern Alaska. Moderately heavy rains have fallen in most of the northern states east of the Mississippi river. Fair weather continues in the Rocky mountain and Pacific states. It is much cooler over a wide strip of territory extending from Texas northward to the lake region.

The conditions are favorable for generally fair weather in this district Sunday, except in western Washington, where cloudiness will increase and be followed by rain. It will be cooler in western Oregon and western Washington.

FORECASTS.

Portland and vicinity: Sunday, fair followed by increasing cloudiness and cooler weather. Easterly winds shifting to southerly. Oregon: Sunday, fair, except rain extreme northwest; cooler west portion; winds becoming southerly. Washington: Sunday, rain west, fair followed by increasing cloudiness east portion; cooler west portion; winds becoming southerly.

TEACHERS' TRAINING WEEK OPENS TODAY

"Teacher Training Week" will be opened in Portland this afternoon at 3 o'clock with a Sunday school mass meeting at the White Temple. Pastors of various local churches have been requested to preach upon the theme, "A Trained Leadership in the Local Church," from their various pulpits.

At the White Temple mass meeting Rev. Richard J. Cooke, D. D., L. L. D., resident bishop of the Methodist Episcopal church, will deliver an address on "The Ethical Training Needed in the Sunday School."

Monday at 8:30 p. m. there will be a pastors' and superintendents' luncheon and conference at the Puritan cafeteria. Tuesday and Wednesday there will be afternoon and evening sessions of teacher training institutes at the First M. E. church, the Sunnyside Congregational church and the Central M. E. church. Thursday will be devoted to "teacher training in the local church" prayer meetings.

Friday evening there will be denominational rallies in the Baptist church at Oregon City, the First Congregational church, First Christian church, Evangelical churches, First M. E. church and the First Presbyterian church.

Rev. Benjamin Young, D. D., is chairman of the arrangements committee, and Rev. J. D. Springston is chairman of the program committee. Teacher Training Weeks are said to have been very successful in Seattle and Tacoma, and every effort will be made to make the Portland meetings just as interesting and instructive.

ANTI-TUBERCULOSIS EXHIBIT INTERESTING

The deadly organism that breeds in unsanitary tenements, the "Great White Plague," is to be revealed in Portland in all its hideousness beginning October 24, when the anti-tuberculosis exhibit of the Visiting Nurse association will be opened. It will continue ten days. Its purpose is to warn against consumption and to demonstrate that the disease is both preventable and curable.

The decision as to the time of the exhibit was reached at a meeting of the association in the auditorium of the Journal building yesterday afternoon. The place has been definitely decided, but the first floor of the old Journal building is being considered.

The means of seeing the germ of tuberculosis will be a number of high power microscopes, adjusted for public use. But this will only be one feature of the exhibit.

There will be charts and maps, stereoscopic views and moving pictures. Superintendent Rigler and the school board have been asked to permit public school students above the sixth grade to come in such numbers as the exhibit room will accommodate after school hours while the exhibit continues. Addresses will be delivered by William L. Cooper, field secretary of the National Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis, and by other authorities on the subject. One of the most significant charts will be furnished by the Visiting Nurse association, showing with exactness the rate and place of deaths in Portland from tuberculosis during the last five years.

Mrs. T. D. Honeyman, general chairman of the committee on exhibit, made appointments of sub-committees yesterday with the following assignments of committee chairman: Finance, C. F. Adams; program, Mrs. D. T. Honeyman; printing, Mrs. M. B. Trumbull; general committee, A. L. Mills; volunteer helpers, Miss Jane Doyle; publicity, Melvin G. Winstock.

All but \$50 of the expense, which was contributed by the State Federation of Women's Clubs, is to be borne by the Visiting Nurse association.

Apple Pies for Everybody from BUMPER YIELD

Oregon Crop of 3,000,000 Boxes of Apples Would Supply More Than 200 Pies for Every Person in State.

If every apple grown in Oregon this season was made into a pie there would be almost enough for an individual pie of the regulation size for every man, woman and child of the state every day in the year.

Approximately 3,000,000 boxes of apples were produced in the state this season. There are on the average 100 apples to the box, therefore a total of 300,000,000 apples will be gathered this season.

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Pies and Pies.
It takes about two apples to make a pie, therefore the totals are easily reached. There will be enough for all the pies the public's appetite can take care of and leave a whole lot of indignation and other stomach troubles for the residents of other states and countries.

While the apple crop this season did not reach the stunning figures of some of the earlier estimates, the output is still the greatest ever known in the state. The acreage planted to apples that will come into bearing for the first time this season will supply almost a third of the entire output.

Quality Excellent.
The apple crop of Oregon will have the best quality ever turned out. Sizes, as a rule, will be smaller than during recent seasons, but the average will be very good.

Not only is there a very heavy crop of apples in Oregon this season, but California, Washington and Idaho have bumper productions. The person who cannot afford apple pie this season is poor indeed. There will be apples for everyone and for every purpose. Baked apples, stewed apples, fried apples, apple dumplings, apple pudding, apple pie and a lot of other apple fixings will be enjoyed in abundance.

There will be a shortage of wormy apples, but this will affect few outside of the older manufacturers, and many of the latter have during recent years come to the conclusion that better cider can be made without the worms, and they have therefore discarded the insect-infested stock, which are in turn fed to hogs or perhaps made into vinegar.

WITHDRAWS HIS NAME FROM HEUSNER PETITION

Dr. A. S. Nichols has withdrawn his name from a petition asking the council to grant to George F. Heusner a franchise for a street railway line on Seventh street. The following letter received by Mayor Rushlight from the physician explains his reasons for withdrawing his name from the petition: "Some time since I signed a petition presented to me by George Heusner, asking for a franchise the entire length of Seventh street. This purported to be for both narrow and broad gauge tracks and to accommodate both way and through traffic, making stops at any street desired. Feeling that I signed the document without fully investigating its nature and possible benefits or detriments to the business interests of the street, I desire that you consider my name withdrawn from this petition until further notice."

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FEDERAL GRAND JURY DISMISSED BY JUDGE

The July term of the federal grand jury, which has been in session since September 19, made its final report before Judge Bean in the United States district court Saturday afternoon, and was dismissed. The jury considered 57 complaints, and examined 173 witnesses. Forty-two true bills were returned and 15 of the complaints were dismissed. In the last batch of bills turned in Saturday afternoon, there were 12 true bills and one not true bill. Ten of the indictments were, however, accompanied by bench warrants and their contents were not made public.

Charles Gervais was indicted for violation of the white slavery act. He brought Gladys Hill from British Columbia to Portland. Arne M. Lyman was indicted for violation of the same law.
