

COY'S STICK BEATS
SENATORS TWICEOakland Outfielder Drives the
Gate Receipts Out of Lot
—Peters Is Hurt.

Sacramento, Cal., Oct. 12.—Bert Coy and his big stick started two timely Oakland rallies with home runs this afternoon and the two rallies netted Bud Sharpe's crew a double header. Oakland took the first game 6 to 4 and the second game 6 to 4, in six innings, when darkness settled and prevented the further extension of the slaughter.

Coy was the shining light in the home run class. His circuit shot in the first game broke up a four to four tie score in the ninth and chased a runner ahead of him. And those two runs were good for the game when Killaly tightened up in the last of the ninth.

In the second game, Sacramento was enjoying a two to one lead when Coy drove the gate receipts out of the lot. His homer tied the score, but it soon unraveled. Fitzgerald, who had relieved Peters after the latter had been knocked out by a hard pitched ball in the second.

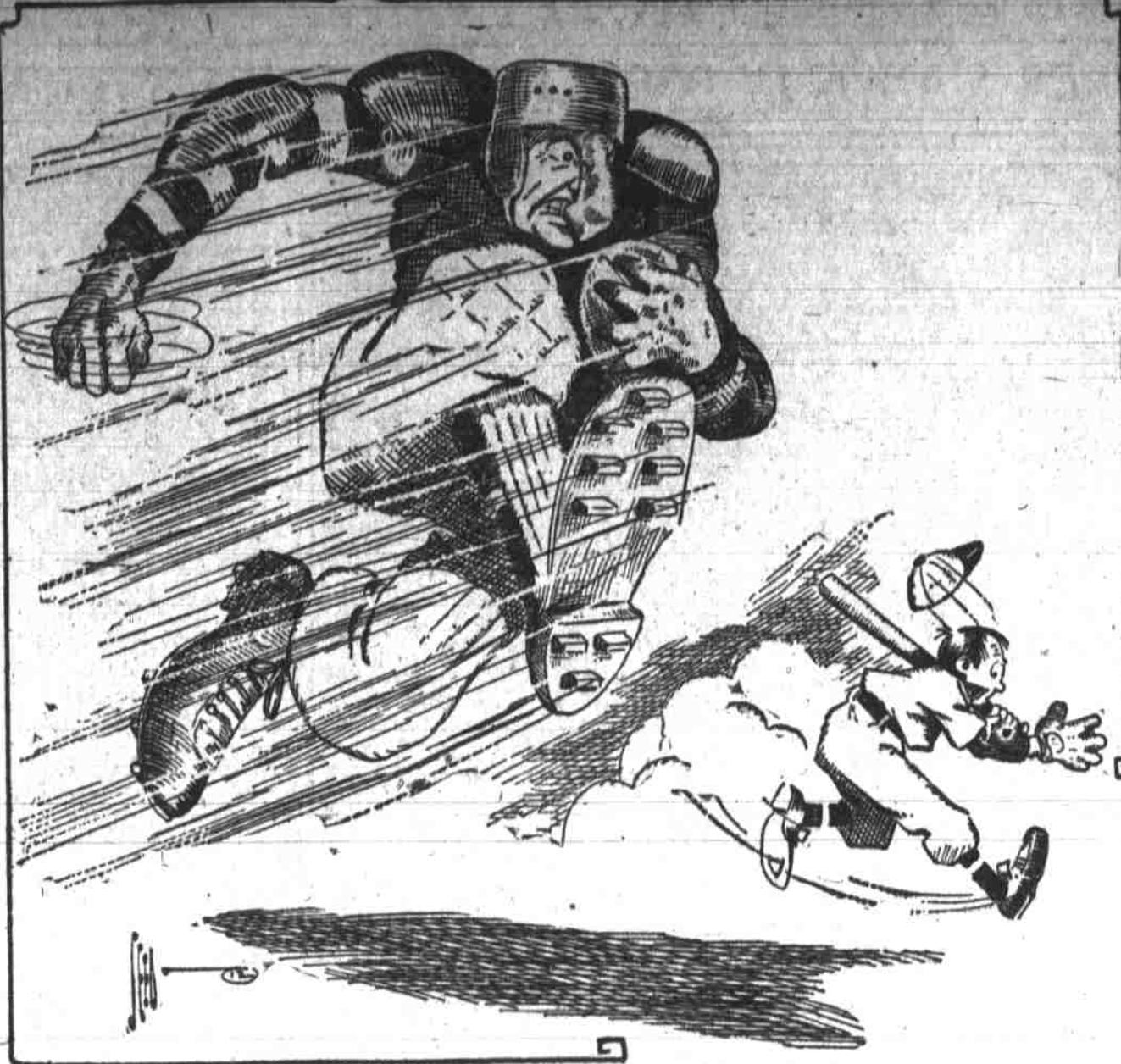
To Play Spokane Here.

CLEAR OUT, HE'S COMING--BY SEED

TWO HARD BATTLES
COMING THIS WEEKWashington Meets Columbia
and Hill Goes Against
Lincoln's Fast Team.

Two games will be played in the interscholastic football league this week. The Washington eleven, the team which is considered to have the best chance to win the 1912 championship, will meet Columbia university Wednesday afternoon. Friday afternoon the Lincoln High school eleven, which triumphed over the Portland academy last Wednesday, will battle with the Hill academy team.

Both games will be hard fought battles, as the schools are rivals of the deepest dye. Columbia did not play Washington last year, but was defeated by them in 1910. Coach Earl has said nothing regarding the game, but is working his players on the weak spots, which showed up in the game with the Pacific university.

The Columbia team is much lighter than it was last season, but Coach Callicrate is not a bit downcast. He is well pleased with the showing made by the team and believes it will give Washington a hard game.

Hill will try doubly hard to beat the Lincoln team, as the Cardinals defeated them last season in a game for the championship of the city. Hill was not in the league last season, but played Lincoln for the title at the close of the interscholastic season and was defeated by a score of about 12 to 0. The Hill team is much better than it was last season, and Coach Wolff is confident that his boys will put up a much better game. The cadets have a number of individual stars in the lineup

and if they get in good working order will be hard to beat.

The Lincoln team, although not as heavy as it was last season, is equally as fast. The line, however, is a bit weak, but Coach Borleske is working out new players at the different positions in an effort to strengthen.
