SIXTEEN PLAYERS;
BEAVERS WIN TWO

Beaver Southpaw Has Good Day Against Former Team Mates—Cunningham Bating Star.

San Francisco, Oct. 12.—Wild, weird and wonderful pitching tells the tale of the two slaps taken by the Beavers at the Seals this afternoon. Wee Willie McCorty twirled himself out of the box in disgrace the first game, and the fans were treated to the spectacle of seeing him return to finish the second after Al Bonner had tossed it hopelessly away. The day was not without its event, however, for in the second contest Harry Suter piled up 16 strikeouts, hanging up a record for the season. "Skeeter" Panning had previously held it with 11.

Seals Hit Hard.

The Seals provided us with another item for solemn speculation. In the first game they gathered in 11 hits without making a run, and their record stands just two runs out of 14 hits. The Beavers piled up seven runs with five hits, and it is necessary only to tell of what McCorty did to clear the way to complete comprehension. Wee Willie was removed in the fifth with no one out and two men on the bases. Three runs had been previously scored against him, he had walked four men, hit two with the ball and perpetrated a wild pitch. Also two of the hits registered against him were home runs.

Jess Baker looked promising for a time after he took hold of a job. But in the eighth a couple of hits, one a double, and a pair of errors put three runs over.

Klawitter got a little wild in the ninth inning and three successive hits, one a triple, gave the Seals their two runs.

Battle Till Eighth.

The second game was a pitchers' battle between Suter and Bonner until the eighth, when the Seal finger lost control after a couple of hits had been made, and forced in two runs. He was taken out when the bases were full and McCorty fell heir to the job. Bancroft hit to center and two runs scored.

McCorty got Zimmerman's throw-in and took a shot at second to head off Bancroft. The ball was wild and speeding on to center, where Zimmerman made another error on it, and the result was the clearing of the seals. The Seals were fortunate enough to get a couple of runs across in the ninth, the result of Suter's momentary wildness and an error by Baker. Scores:

46 OF 86 PLAYED
ON LOCAL FIELD

Vernon and Los Angeles Clubs Only Ones to Have Edge on 1912 Baseball Season in Portland's Park.

The Portland Beavers had a good record on their home grounds this season, considering the fact that they are in fourth place in the Coast league pennant race. The Beavers played 86 games on the home lot this year, of which 46 were victories, 39 defeats and 1 was a tie, resulting in the percentage of .511.

Harry Hogan's Vermonters proved to be the Beavers' hardest opponents on the Vaughn street field. Hogan's men played three series of five games each with the Beavers and succeeded in taking 10 of the games.

The Angels also had the Beavers' worst. McCordie's team played 13 games with Dillon's pennant chasers and were only able to win 7 and tie 1.

The Portlanders won a majority of the games from the other teams, Oakland, San Francisco and Sacramento.

The Beavers lost 5 out of the 18 played with Sacramento. They dropped just one more game to the Seals than then did to the Senators. Oakland came out with 8 victories in 17 starts against the locals.

Portland made one clean sweep of a series against the Sacramento team and came near repeating against Bill Reddy's Seals. Out of the 15 series played on the local field, the Beavers won 8, lost 7, and tied 2.

Three Are Star Performers.

Klawitter, Koestner and Higginbotham were the star performers on the home mound. Klawitter started 23 games, winning 15 and losing 7. Koestner won 11 and lost 6 and Higginbotham was winner 5 times out of 14 starts. Suter won three games out of five and Harkness won four out of six.

Elmer Koestner at the start of the season won 5 straight games on the local field.

LARRY BLAMES HIMSELF FOR LOSING
THIRD GAME TO BOSTON'S RED HOSE

NEW YORK CAPTAIN SAYS GIANTS WILL FIGHT MONDAY

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Boston, Mass., Oct. 12.—I looked as if my "boot" cost the game. There is no use in apologizing for it because the ball was hit squarely at me and I ought to have fielded it easily. If it had not been for this error, the best that the Boston club could have done would have been to tie us. The prisoner pleads guilty.

What hurt me worst was the idea that this murr of mine cost Matty his game, and I would rather have seen him win than any other pitcher. He was out there working with a sore arm, and every time that he threw the ball, he felt as if his arm were going with it. I think that Matty is the greatest pitcher that ever stepped into the middle of a diamond. As the Red Sox had made pitcher two runs and after it looked as if errors had cost him another game, he kept right on at work and held the Boston club scoreless for five innings. Not another Red Sox got to first base after the third. Then we could not win for him.

It Was an "It" Game.

It was another one of those "it" games which have marked the series. If I had not kicked the ball we would have been tied in the ninth any way, and of course, all the followers of baseball will say that it is part of the game. Errors are a part of the game, but they are to be regretted. It is hard for a fellow to write when he realizes that his mistake cost the game. He cannot afford to criticize the rest of the team very well, but I am going to say something about Snodgrass right here. The second triple in the third inning made by Yohs should have been broken down by him anyway. He could have at least stopped the ball if he hadn't fielded it cleanly and Devore could have chased it.

Again, Hooper and Yerkes were the men that hurt us, the same couple who have shone throughout the series, although we had been told previously that they were not stars. Hooper was reckoned to be the weakest of the outfielders at the bat and Yohs the poorest "fielder." The hits made by these two men, combined with my error on Speaker's roller, broke up the game.

Benedict was a big surprise to all of us. We had expected him to be easy, and he turned out to be one of the toughest pitchers that we have faced in the series. We had thought he would be wild, but after the nervousness of the first two innings had worn off, he showed the essence of control. He pitched a nice game and depended almost wholly on his fast ball, being aided in this by the darkness of the day.

It seems as if any pitcher who can beat us in this playing like a fiend all the time, and never gives up. I think that he has shown the best of any of the Giants so far. But Murray, from this year against Pittsburgh and Philadelphia, we will win the series yet, because he failed to get a hit in the world's series last year, has run Herzog a close race for the honors.

Josh Shows Well.

Devore has shown the gameness which the men on the team always declared he possessed. The way he saved the only game we won with a catch was enough evidence of this, but he has been hitting the ball hard, too. There is not much praise for any of the other Giants besides the pitchers. It is a habit among ball players to look toward the future, and forget the past. All eyes are on Monday's game. We must win that to stay in the series. The pitcher will probably be Wood against Marquard, and if "Rube" gets the support he ought to beat the Boston twirler. If the Giants can once come to life and play the kind of ball that they showed this year against Pittsburgh and Philadelphia, we will win the series in a single game. It seems as if the strain of the big series has killed us, but now the boys are fighting with their backs against the wall.

It has got to be done. Besides, I am tired of explaining, and I would never have taken this writing job if I had thought that I would have to look for as many alibis as I have in this series. The one game that we have won is the only battle that I have enjoyed telling about.

Only one bit of luck hurt us in the game today, that being the peculiar construction of the temporary left field stand along the foul line, and the left field stand behind the outfielder, into which a hit goes for two bases, according to the ground rules of the series. This leaves a space not more than three feet wide through which a ball must go to get behind the fence. The left field stand, it was through this narrow opening that Hooper's triple went, and the ball caught in a crack of the fence. That is why it took Devore so long to get it. That part of the field is invisible from the home plate. It was the only bad break we got in the luck today. All the rest was bad baseball.

Will Play at Vaughn Street.

The Piedmont Maroons and the Meier & Frank team will play this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock on the Vaughn street grounds. "Bobby" Hewitt will likely pitch for the Meier & Frank team, and Haworth will be behind the bat. Ed Morris will twirl for the Maroons and Bartholomew will do the receiving.

MATHEWSON CAUGHT OFF BALANCE

LONG ENOUGH TO LET REDS GATHER

BEDIENT REAL SURPRISE OF SERIES IN BOSTON EYES

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Boston, Oct. 12.—Christy Mathewson pitched a great game, but we caught him off his balance for a moment or two and managed to get over a couple of runs, which fortunately for us were enough to give us our third win in the series. Although we hit the ball, we could not seem to get it safe. Invariably it went directly at some fielder.

One instance in particular was the bid of Yerkes for a hit in our last inning. The ball was hit right on the nose and went like a shot at Herzog, who threw up his hands and caught it. He could not have gotten it if he had had to jump for it, or if he had had to move out of his tracks, for the ball would have passed him before he could have done either.

Entitled to Credit.

In view of our failure to make more runs, young Bedient is entitled to the credit for the victory, and to him it is given by every member of the team. He pitched a masterly game, and no veteran ever stood up to his work better than he did. Holding such a batting aggregation as McGraw has to three or four hits is something for any pitcher to be proud of. Very few men got on the bases, and when one did get on it did not apparently bother Bedient, and he worked just the same whether there was one man out or none.

One particularly fine piece of work on his part, I thought, was
