

AGGIES COMING NEXT SATURDAY TO PLAY SPEEDY MULTNOMAH ELEVEN

COACH DOLAN CAN'T RAISE A SMILE OVER FOOTBALL

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Oct. 12.—To represent O. A. C. against the strongest team that the Multnomah Athletic club has ever had, Coach S. M. P. Dolan will escort an eleven-man team to Portland next Saturday to play their first big game. Dolan remains over the Beaver camp, because of the numerous petty, early-season injuries that the men on the team have suffered. One man out for three weeks, and no heavy experienced substitutes to replace anyone injured in the coming contest, is the dilemma Coach Dolan is facing. The only sure position is that of quarter, "Shrimp" Reynolds having returned to college last week, giving two men both heady and fast, for that place.

Lack of sufficient practice is largely responsible for the poor condition of the Beavers. The alumni game has been the only contest in which the team has had any practice. The game which was to have been played against Pacific University yesterday, was called off the day before, because of the terrible snatching the Forest Grove men received from Washington High school last Saturday. They were in such poor shape to take on as heavy a team as the Aggies, that they requested cancellation of the date. In its place was substituted a game with the second O. A. C. team.

On the other hand, the Multnomah club has a strong aggregation of stars to pit against the Orange men. Several of their best players were on the alumni team that held the Beavers to a 2 to 0 score last Saturday, thus becoming acquainted with the style of playing adopted by Coach Dolan. This knowledge will doubtless prove a strong factor in the game on the 19th.

The lineup to be used by O. A. C. will, in all probability be the same as the one used against the alumni last Saturday. Christman, at center, is making good at that position, but is not in trim to play his best game, because of a sprained ankle received in practice a short time ago. To insure his presence in the conference games, Coach Dolan has been using him very lightly in the scrimmages held thus far. McKenzie has been used as a "sub" in that position, and will doubtless be in the lineup, should Christman be put out. Playing next to Christman at the guards, will be Otton Sifton and Laythe. May received a slight injury to his knee which, according to Dr. Stewart, will keep him out of the game for three weeks. No chances are being taken on having him out of the lineup when the U. of W. and O. A. C. clash on Nov. 9, so Laythe has not been coming up to the expectations of the coaches, being a little slow at getting into every play. He may develop more speed and ability before the season is over. That position is in the whole lineup. Otton Sifton has been suffering from an injured hand, and was only out for practice twice this week.

Jim Evenden is one of the few men that are on the job without an injury. Jim was always a line man, but was shifted to the backfield last year because of the weakness in that department at that time. Since his old berth has been given him he has been a demon, getting into all of the plays with great speed, and by Coach Dolan's side, he has been a great deal of attention, trying to strengthen that position.

On defensive work the O. A. C. ends are working perfectly, but they fail on the offensive work. Kellogg fails with regularity to connect with the forward end of difficult forward passes. When the ball is fed directly to him he usually manages to garner it in, but he cannot stop a high one. Bennie Robertson, the former Portland high school star, is developing into a fine end, and has clinched his place opposite Kellogg. He is very fast, and backs up his speed with his weight and assurance, but there is a hitch in the offensive work somewhere. Just where, Coaches Dolan, Harding and Brodie are endeavoring to ascertain. During the past week Kellogg and Robertson have been working on the second team to give them practice against the heavier first team men.

The backfield, if it should remain intact throughout the game, would be a very good one, but the absence of heavy experienced substitutes is felt here as in the other positions. Hauser, the Carlisle Indian, tears through the line all right, but has been laid up with a bad heel. He was in the scrimmage again yesterday for the first time this

week, and will probably be all right for the Multnomah contest. Blackwell, at left half, is on the job with a vengeance and is hard to hurt and hard to stop. Shaw, at right, completes an excellent backfield, as long as it remains intact. Shaw has improved wonderfully in his game since last year, and will be a consistent ground gainer for the Aggies this year. Larsen, Ras-mussen and Richardson are the alternates behind the line. They average about 25 pounds apiece lighter than the first squad.

A pretty fight will be seen this year for the position of quarter. "Shrimp" Reynolds decided to return to O. A. C. after entering Chicago university, and was out in his suit last Thursday for the first time. Dewey, the lad who has been in that position thus far this season, has the advantage of about 20 pounds weight over Shrimp, and weight will prove a big factor in the coming game. Both have had a great deal of experience, and the tussle between the two is being watched with interest.

Sam Dolan refuses to smile. He said yesterday: "I've never seen a team in as poor condition at this time in the year, just before the first big game. Petty injuries have interfered all along the line. First Christman's ankle, then May's knee, and Hauser's heel and Sifton's hand. Multnomah has the best bunch this year they ever had. I never saw such a bunch of material in my life as I did the Sunday I was out there in Portland, watching them practice. We have poor offensive ends, and there is a weak spot in both tackle and guard. Things look mighty black."

It is expected that a large number of the student body will accompany the team on its trip to Portland to see the game.

ASTORIANS BEAT JEFFERSON TEAM

Local Eleven Defeated in Hard Fought Game—Martin Nelson Is Badly Injured.

(Special to The Journal.) Astoria, Or., Oct. 12.—In one of the hardest fought football games ever witnessed on the local gridiron, the Astoria high school defeated the Jefferson high eleven of Portland by a score of 10 to 6 this afternoon.

The locals outplayed the visitors at every point of the game and frequently made large gains by successfully executing the forward pass and by end runs. Jefferson's line was unable to hold the charges of Astoria's backfield and good gains were made in this manner.

Only a few times during the contest were the visitors able to make their yardage, their one touchdown being made in the last quarter when Leopold secured the ball on a fumble on the 30 yard line and making a run through an unbroken field, put the ball behind the goal posts. Irvine missed an easy goal.

Astoria made the first touchdown in the second quarter on a forward pass and 20 yard run by Burns. Nelson kicked goal. Nelson's toe was working in excellent manner today and he made the other three points in the game by kicking a field goal from the 30 yard line. Several of the locals were injured during the game, Nelson receiving a fractured collar bone in the third quarter.

SOCCER FOOTBALL WILL START TODAY

Cricketers Have Reinforced and Seem to Have Strong Eleven.

This morning at 10:30 o'clock the first game of soccer football of the season will be played between the Rangers and the Cricketers on the ground of the latter at East Sixty-seventh street and Gilman street. The Rangers is a new aggregation of players, composed of members of last year's victorious Mount Scott team, some of the picked players of the other teams in the Oregon league and two or three players just out from the old country, who are said to be

good, but have yet to prove their mettle. The Cricketers are a strongly reinforced side this year according to the accounts of the president, P.
