

NINETY-ONE LARGE HIT GAMES IS THE BAT RECORD IN NORTHWESTERN LEAGUE

TACOMA AND SEATTLE SHOW IN BIG BINGLE CLUSTER

Ninety-one games, in which over 13 hits were made, were played in the Northwestern league during the season of 1912. The highest number of hits in one game was made August 26, when the Tacoma Tigers cleaned 26 hits off pitchers Concannon, Schneider and Thompson of the Seattle champions. Seattle captured the second highest number of hits when it made 25 hits off Pitchers Churchill and Belford of Tacoma in the same game.

Fourteen hits in a game was made 27 times. Twenty-two times during the year the teams managed to collect 15 bingles off the opposing twirlers. Seventeen 16 hit games were played. The other games are 17 hit games 12 times, 18 hit games 6 times, 19 hit games 2 times, 20 hit games 3 times and 22 hit games one time.

The Colts figured on the batting end of 34 of the number of large hit games and the Colt pitchers suffered in 12 of the games.

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University of Oregon, Eugene, Oct. 12.—Basketball among the University of Oregon co-eds has suddenly become the rage and the girls, one and all, have dropped tennis rackets and golf sticks to crowd the gymnasium for this sport. The announcement that the interclass and interschool championships will be decided before Christmas, and the fact that no girl may play upon a team until she has had three weeks' practice, is the cause of the sudden rush. The interschool series is played between nine clubs, and after this, for which Athletic Trainer Bill Hayward offers a silver cup, is settled, the four classes play for the supremacy of the college. Last year's club series was won by the Gamma Phi Betas from the Gamma Delta Gammas in a very close game. The class games were won by the sophomores, who had the same team as the winning freshman class the previous year. Among the freshmen class of this year are several girls players who bring reputations. Notably among these is Miss Fenton, a center, of Portland, whom the more enthusiastic speak of as the "freshman phenom." Miss Eva Brock of Hood River, and Miss Palm M. Cowden of Silverton.

Basketball is encouraged among the university girls by the physical culture director, Miss Bertha M. Stewart as one of the most healthful forms of exercise. All freshmen and sophomore girls are required to take regular work in the gymnasium.

Killing Big Game in Yukon Sport of Burnham, Motor Boat Enthusiast

In the lower right is Burnham and one of the five bears that he killed, a big fellow weighing nearly 1000 pounds. On the left is the sportsman with a "stooneeye" or black mountain goat, a very rare prize.

How would you like to kill five big, fat, ferocious bears in two and one-half minutes? That is the record of F. K. Burnham, the New York millionaire sportsman who owns the Dixie IV, fastest motor boat in the world, and who left Portland yesterday on the last leg of his journey home after a 50 days' hunting trip in the wilds of the Yukon. Mr. Burnham was accompanied in his vigorous northern trip by his wife, a beautiful, vivacious young lady, who was the first woman to penetrate the region about Telegraph Creek, which is in latitude 60 degrees north, longitude 130 degrees west.

Mr. and Mrs. Burnham are nearing their home after a year spent in touring the world. Both hunted in the Malay archipelago and in the bush of Australia but they say that nowhere did they experience the thrills that came from their shooting of big game near the Arctic circle.

Mr. and Mrs. Burnham left yesterday for San Francisco, whence they will go direct to New York. While here Mr. Burnham, who is vice commodore of the Motor Boat Club of America, piloted the Oregon Wolf, champion motor boat of the Pacific coast in a five mile spin and pronounced it capable of making a good showing in the international motor speed boat races for the Harmsworth trophy, emblematic of the world's championship. The championship was held for two years by Burnham's boat was lifted this fall by the Maple Leaf IV, an English boat. Burnham will construct a new boat to go after the trophy, which will be competed for in English waters next year.

The five bears which were shot by the New York sportsman totaled nearly 3000 pounds in weight. The largest one, the quintet weighed about 1000 pounds.

Speaking of his trip, Burnham said:

"We had the grandest time ever and I think I shall return there next year in search of more big game. I think that the Casiar mountain region is the greatest big game region in the western hemisphere.

"My wife is the first white woman to go into this region and come out with the honor of having killed some of the finest big game in that country. We killed some of the rarest specimens of animals on the trip, which was full of thrills from the start to the finish.

"Our three Indian guides furnished lots of novel sport for us and helped us out wonderfully during our hunting. I killed several bull mooses and O-borne caribou, which is very rare now. I also bagged a black mountain goat. This species of animal is becoming very scarce and I consider myself lucky to have been able to bag one of them.

"The bear in that region is very plentiful, there being an abundance of brown, black and grizzlies. The mountain sheep were also quite numerous.

"Game birds were many and flights were numerous during our entire trip. We never suffered a bit from cold or hunger, everything being as well as one could wish.

"I have shipped the furs and hides to New York where I will have a number of them mounted. I value them at many hundreds of dollars.

"Burnham has over 400 photographic views of his trip through the Arctic region and of his trip in Australia and Asia.

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KILLILAY IS ABOUT 100 POINTS IN LEAD

Al Klawitter Holds On to Third Place Among the Winning Pitchers.

Jack Killilay, Walter Leverenz and Al Klawitter still hold first, second and third positions in the race for the honors of leading pitchers. Killilay has the percentage of .814 and Leverenz is nearly 100 points behind, Leverenz has the percentage of .735 and Klawitter .647.

Charley Chech of the Angels advanced to first place in the number of games won. The former American association leaver has won 23 games. Klawitter, Leverenz and Ables of Oakland have won 22 games.
