

SHORT SESSION TO BE A BUSY PERIOD FOR CONGRESSMEN

Archbald Impeachment is to Claim Attention of Senate During Early Portion of Three Months' Work.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Washington, D. C., Oct. 12.—With a task fully as difficult as the one he has just taken nine months to complete, congress will meet on December 2 to dispose of practically the same amount of business in three months, and old observers of events at the capitol are predicting one of the most strenuous sessions in years. If the wheels of government are to go on, all the big appropriation bills must be disposed of before March 4. This year at that date only one of them had passed both houses. With the senate Republican and the house Democratic, and the leaders of each showing little disposition to work in harmony with the heads of the other branch, there may be many night sessions before congress is wound up by statutory limitation.

This condition of affairs will prevail, according to the best opinion here, irrespective of the result of the presidential election. No matter which one of the three presidential candidates is elected, it is being predicted that the senate and house will show the same hostility to each other which has marked their deliberations to date.

Archbald Impeachment On.

Added to the mammoth amount of routine business that must be transacted, the senate has on its hands the Archbald impeachment trial. The present plan is to start this trial immediately upon the beginning of the session. The most conservative estimates are that the trial will consume a month. Judge Archbald, according to the latest reports, is to fight to the finish and there is little possibility of his relieving the senate of the duty of trying him by resigning. The house committee of prosecutors will have to call a large number of witnesses just to present their case. They are ready to go ahead with it any time. The Archbald defense may consist largely of what the lawyers call "character testimony." This can be dragged out into an everlasting piece of detail if Archbald's lawyers so decide. The prosecutors are known to realize that they will have to carry a heavy burden in getting a conviction by a two-thirds vote of the senate and if they see the case is going against them they may be compelled to fraction their presentation of facts beyond their present calculations.

The chief difficulty in passing appropriation bills at the last session of congress was due to the tendency to tack on legislation of an important character to them as riders. The next set of these supply measures, it is predicted, will be loaded down with the same old miscellaneous provisions that restive and revise the administration of many of the most important functions of the government departments. It would not be surprising if in view of threatened expenditures of the session, the leaders of each branch who are anxious to get legislation on the statute books would more than ever before resort to appropriation bills as carriers of their legislative projects. In this case a great batch of conference reports would be held up until the very last day of the session and the drop of "jokers" and accidental legislation would bid fair to reach a new high record mark.

Port Barrel to Be Opened.

The first duty of the house managers will be to open the "port barrel." Congressmen whose appetite has been whetted by lack of appropriations at the last session, will clamor loudly for public buildings for their respective districts. They have been promised a "port barrel" and it will be the duty of the leaders to dole out the "pork." This will be a job full of dynamite for the house public buildings committee.

An attempt will be made to revise the patent laws. The house patents committee, which has been investigating this subject, has drafted a tentative bill, but it is recognized that this bill must be redrafted and more hearings held. The senate has not begun consideration of this subject at all.

The senate must ratify a new treaty with Russia. The treaty is a subject of question will come up for long discussion.

The whole Panama canal toll question, involving the rights of foreign shipping in use the canal, will probably be reopened and be fruitful of long debate.

The Democratic majority in the house will attempt to pass trust control legislation, based on the report of the Stanley steel committee.

A movement will probably be started to cut the naval appropriation so as to include only one battleship. On this question the "big navy" and "little navy" men will lock horns.

Further changes in the army establishment are considered inevitable.

Philippine Legislation Expected.

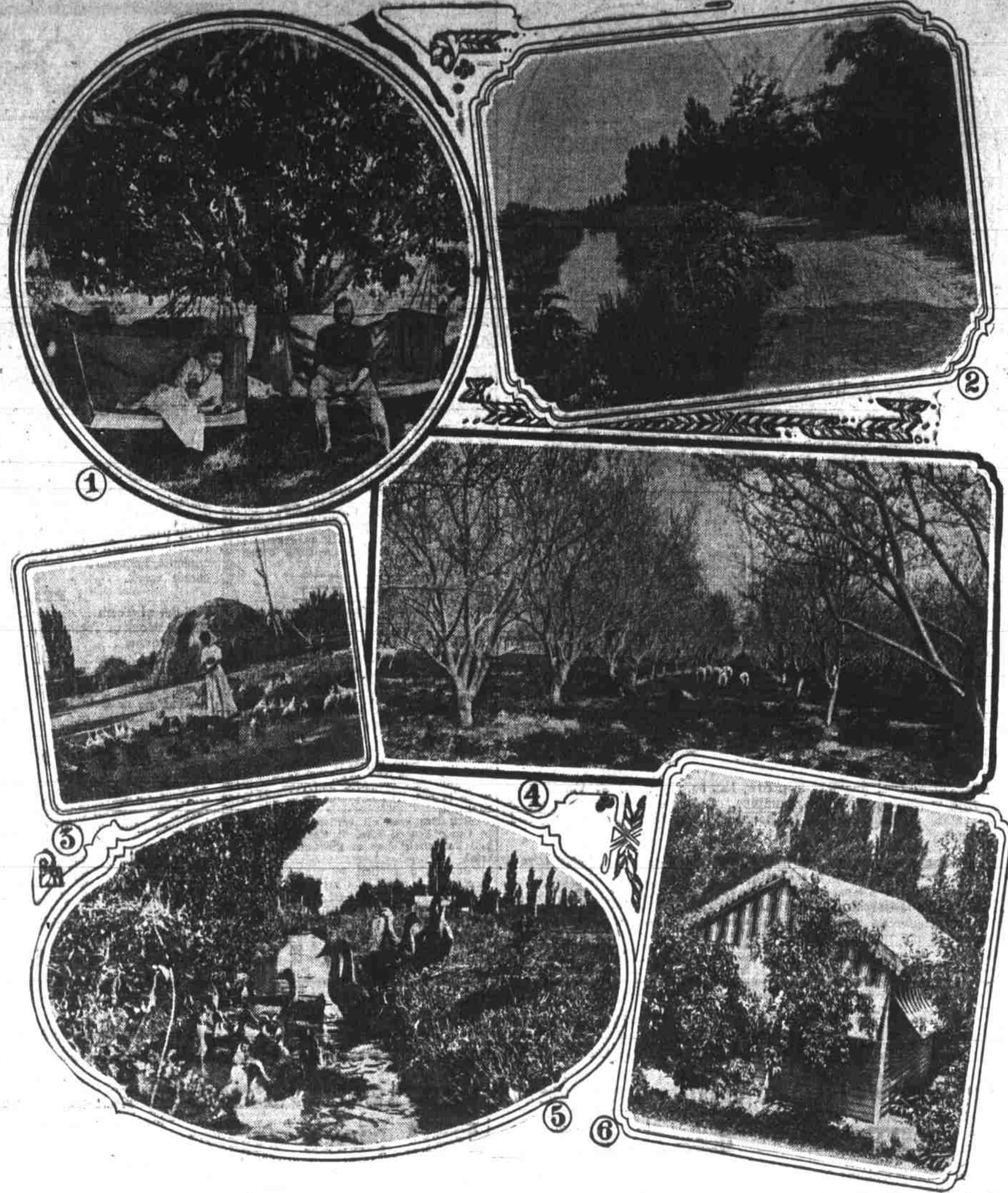
Legislation to give the Philippines partial self-government is expected. Federal aid for good roads and industrial education will be fully threshed out and urgent demand for the passage of bills made.

Suffragists will make a new assault on congress to get suffrage for women. Labor legislation, including the proposal to establish a department of labor, will hold the legislative stage for a time at least. Agitation for further publicity of campaign funds is to be continued. Anti-immigration and anti-convict bills, both of which are strongly urged by the labor interests and which passed the house last summer, will be revived and an attempt made to get action on them in the senate.

What a Practical Man Can Do With a Run Down Orchard Is Demonstrated By W. V. Sanderson Who in One Season Rejuvenated Nyssa, Or., Wreck

Nyssa, Or., Oct. 12.—One of the most renowned orchards in the Northwest, the Idanha, is located near Nyssa. It consists of 120 acres of very fertile land and has one of the best systems of irrigation in the country. The trees were planted about 13 years ago by Robert van Gils, the present mayor of Nyssa, and the symmetrical lines of the orchard show great care on the part of the planter. Robert van Gils disposed of the place a few years later and from that time until the first of this year the orchard was neglected to such an extent that it was practically in a dying condition, the trees being infected with all pests indigenous to this part of the country. It was also well-nigh ruined for want of pruning. In January last, a genuine horticulturist, W. V. Sanderson, purchased this

orchard from Bishop Andrew Nielson for \$30,000. Nielson, however, having owned the place but a comparatively short time, Sanderson's practiced eyes, being always on the alert for just such emergencies, soon convinced him what the possibilities of the wreck were, and he at once set to work to demonstrate his ideas. The result, even at this early date, is marvelous and visitors come long distances to satisfy themselves as to the real facts and to learn the fundamentals of horticulture from the unassuming author of it all.

"Fruites," They Call Him.
Among his intimate friends, Mr. Sanderson is known as "Fruites," and enjoys the reputation of making three prunes grow where only one prune grew before. A few of the things he has accomplished in the few months he has owned the place are interesting. First

organizations and municipal and communal authorities are swamped with applications for aid.

"KNOCKING DOWN" PUTS YOUTHS IN JAIL

Spokane, Wash., Oct. 12.—H. L. Schmidt, a young grocery clerk whose wedding was to have occurred within a few days, is confined in the city jail with F. C. Dougherty, a young married grocery salesman, charged with grand larceny after it was declared they had been caught in systematic robbery of the Marr grocery store. The arrests were made last night by a detective and merchants' police agency, which had been working some time to ascertain the source of irregularities in the total cash turn-over. According to detectives, the prisoners have confessed having stolen about \$2500 between them during the last few months. Schmidt is declared to have had in marked money \$4.15, given by the superintendent of detectives for a sack of sugar.

Both are asserted to have succeeded in avoiding detection this long by failing to ring up receipts from customers, collecting from two and ringing up one, generally the smaller receipt.

Approximately three cars daily were shipped during the prune season.

One goes into the orchards and there the same activity prevails. Men and teams are picking and hauling fruit with almost military precision. Mr. Sanderson directs his operations with such care that the ensuing year's crop may not suffer. Not a twig must be broken, or anything done to impair the following season's yield. He has exerted such an influence in local horticultural work that farmers every-

where are anxious to increase their own fruit acreage, and turn the growing and marketing over entirely to his supervision. Mr. Sanderson, however, has refused all such flattering offers, as he intends spending the coming winter in Australia.

Letters are coming to him from eastern buyers and the fruit growers' associations, complimenting him on the superior condition in which his shipments have been invariably received. This, combined with the fact that his prunes cost him only \$205 a car to pick, pack and load, compared with a usual cost of about \$275, added to receiving the highest prices in the eastern markets, has been gratifying alike to him and his bank account.

Now that he has decided to make a winter's trip to the antipodes, Mr. Sanderson has contracted to dispose of the Idanha to its former owner, Bishop Nielson, at an advantageous figure. But, anonymously with this transfer of title, Mr. Sanderson has invested in considerable property in Nyssa, firm all ways in the belief that this is an infant fruit Eden.
