

OREGON'S ELEVEN BEATS WILLAMETTE

Eugene Boys Make 2 Touch-downs Against Lads From Salem Way.

(Special to The Journal.)

University of Oregon, Eugene, Oct. 12.—The shortness of 10 minutes halves saved Willamette today in the football battle, which closed with a score of 12 to 6, just as Oregon rushed the ball to the two yard with a third goal expected on the next play and with Willamette utterly exhausted. Oregon's backfield, partly crippled, and weighing less than 150 pounds, proved the sensation of the game by its wonderful speed. It was assisted by a heavy line that held and opened that of the opposing team almost at will in the last half.

Willamette, especially in the first half, played a remarkably strong defensive game, but could not stand under the heavy onslaught. The speed and heady playing of Blackwell, who often dashed among the Willamette men for 20 yards, the dash of Cornell, the remarkable Portland freshman, with his long runs, the changing of Joe Jones, substituting for the injured Heuser, and who shot through the line for many gains, and of Cook, the Coeur d'Alene freshman, who plunged repeatedly through Willamette for 10 and 15 yards, kept the rooters and crowd howling their praise. Cook, who was taken off the field by the faculty in the middle of the week, an hour before the game, passed his examination, bringing his work up to the standard.

"Pruney" Francis, a former Eugene boy, played a greater part of Willamette's game. Roughness upon the part of Captain McRae was more pronounced than his playing. Fenton booting as much as 50 yards. The first score was made in the first quarter after Jones had dashed 30 yards to the five yard line, when Hall, a tackle, took a delayed pass. The second score involved the new rules. After the ball was rushed to the 35 yard line by Cornell, a fumble punt was returned by Briedwell, who then sent over the goal a forward pass, Walker to Ansonson. The game resembled the football of last year. The forward pass was not used to any extent nor does the four down rule seem to make any noticeable difference. The feature was strategy and the special formation plays, cleverly executed by the very fast light backfield. Salem played a heavy defensive game. The line-up:

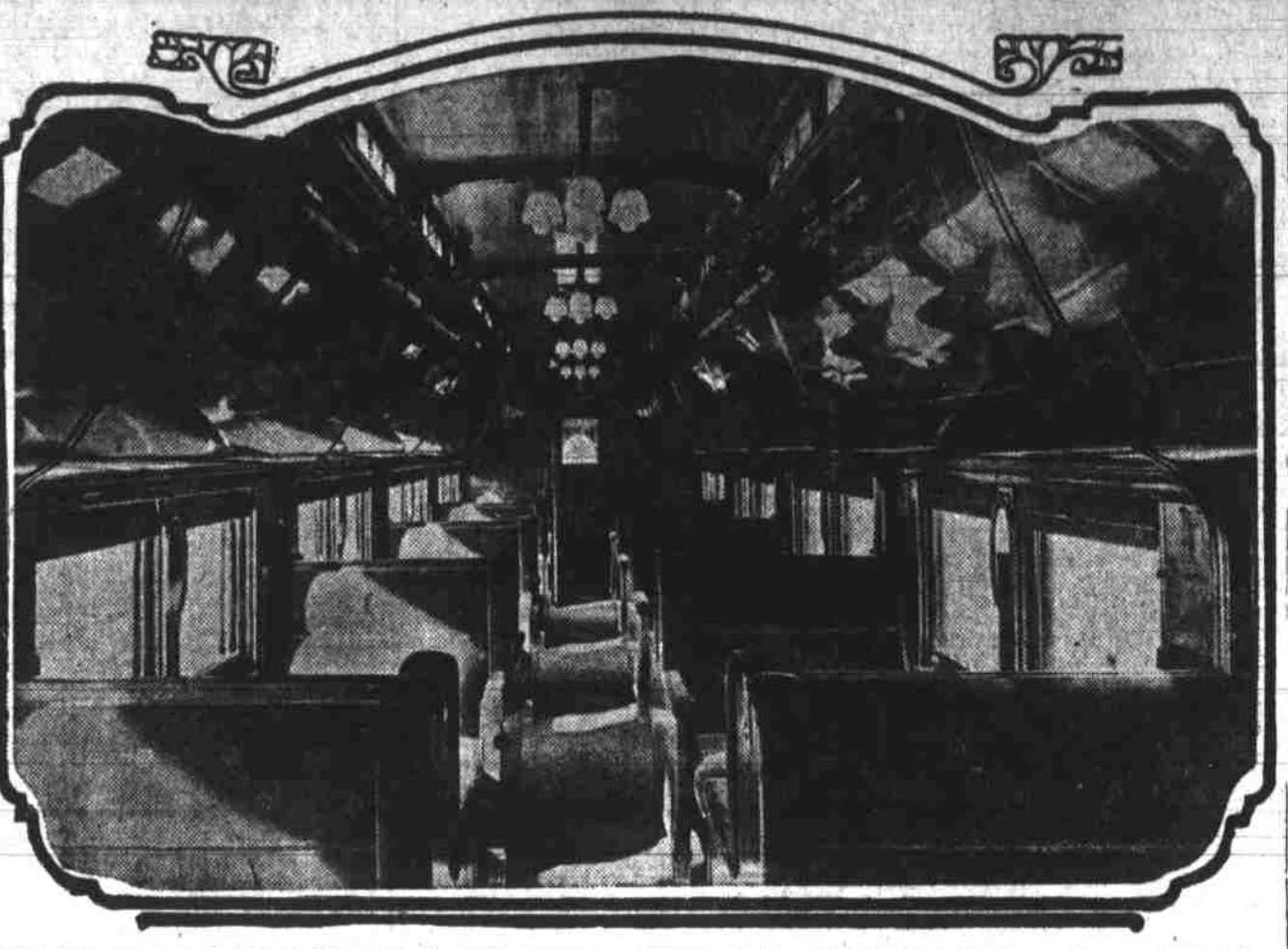

Eugene Plans Big Celebration for First Electric Train

Portland Will Send Big Delegation of Business Men

Interior of sleeping car on Oregon Electric line between Portland and Eugene, the longest electric trunk line west of the Mississippi river; service will begin October 17, trains leaving Portland and Eugene simultaneously each evening.

12:15 p. m.—Arrival of first passenger train over Oregon Electric railway.

When the first train over the Oregon Electric railway reaches Eugene Tuesday noon it will give Oregon the longest electric line, between terminals, built on steam road standards west of the Mississippi river. The arrival of the passenger train at Eugene will be made the occasion for the celebration of the inauguration of electric transportation to that section of the Willamette valley in which Portland and

the various cities and towns of the valley will participate.

Until the completion of the Salem-Albany extension and the building of the line to Eugene, the Oregon Electric made Salem the valley terminus. With the addition of 71 miles, the distance between Salem and Eugene, the Oregon Electric is 121 miles between terminals, besides several branch lines. The line between Salem and Eugene has been constructed entirely on steam road standards. The track work has also progressed on the best standards of construction.

Standard Construction.
The overhead construction of the electric line is under the catenary system, which has proved successful in electric line building and has been adopted by companies building the most modern systems. The line has been built on a maximum four degree grade with a curvature of three degrees. This will allow high speed work, the maintenance of a fast schedule for express and passenger trains and the operation of long trains without reduction of speed.

The building of the road from Salem to Eugene required the construction of three steel bridges. The one across the Santiam river consists of seven 175-foot steel spans with a total length of 1225 feet of steel. Eight concrete piers, sunk to a depth of 40 feet, were constructed. The new steel bridge at Harrisburg is 800 feet long and consists of three 200-foot spans, and two 100-foot girders. The Calapooia bridge has one 150-foot steel span.

The bridge construction along the extension has called for the building of 16 concrete piers. It was April before the building of the bridges commenced and the work was completed in five and one-half months, a record for engineering work of that kind.

Besides the construction of 71 miles of line between Salem, Albany and Eugene, the company has also done 10,000 feet of paving work and the entire line has been electrified for the 1200-volt system. Substations have been constructed south of Salem at Orville, Pirtle, Cartney and Lassen. The buildings have been constructed so as to give a capacity of 1000 kilowatts, 500 kilowatt machinery being installed. The company has also completed a 60,000-volt transmission line from Salem to Eugene and a telephone line for company service.

New passenger and freight stations are being built at Salem and Eugene. The Albany station is rapidly nearing completion and will be one of the handiest suburban stations in Oregon. The construction is of brick and tile and it will have spacious and comfortable waiting rooms. Plans have also been complete for the Eugene station.

The electric Pullmans for the owl service between Portland and Eugene are ready for service and the regular schedule will be maintained after October 17.

SOCIALIST WRITER TO SPEAK MONDAY
Fred B. Warren, editor of the Socialist paper, "Appeal to Reason," will speak October 14, at the Givens Smith Tabernacle on "Political Revision of the Constitution." Warren gained considerable fame through his arrest some time ago on a charge of offering a reward for the kidnapping of ex-Governor Taylor of Kentucky, following the alleged kidnapping of Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone. Warren was sentenced to six months in jail and was fined \$100, but before he was locked up, after giving himself up to the authorities, he was pardoned by President Taft and the fine reduced to \$100, but he refused the pardon which was returned to the president.

Warren has made a deep study of political and economic subjects for many years and is well informed on the topics. His visit here is of special interest to the Socialists.

A. E. CLARK AND KENNEDY GIVE TALKS AT ROSEBURG

Roseburg, Or., Oct. 12.—The Progressive party rally at the court house tonight was widely advertised by local progressives and hundreds of postal cards were sent to voters here advertising the affair.

The speakers were introduced by E. H. Barber, after a short talk upon political questions. Mr. Kennedy followed with a talk lasting a few minutes. He did not discuss politics.

Mr. Clark then spoke. He believes the greatest problem before the country in the near future is getting more people located upon land. Instead of in the cities. He thinks the O. & C. railroad land grant will be eventually declared forfeited to the government and he believes the proceeds from sale of timber thereon should, in part at least, be devoted to the development of the agricultural section thereof. This also, he said, would make homes for at least 100,000 more people in Oregon, and would be of vast benefit to the state.

Twenty minutes of earnest arguing resulted in Lister being made the nominee unanimously.
