

WILSON A SINCERE PROGRESSIVE, IS WORKS' TRIBUTE

California Senator Declares Democratic Nominee Has Proved Himself Honest and Urges His Support.

(United Press Special Wire.) Washington, Oct. 14.—Woodrow Wilson is a real and sincere progressive. He has proved it by his course and conduct as a public officer and as a candidate. He is running on a sane, progressive platform. The best service progressive Republicans can render their party is to vote for Wilson. It will help to teach dishonest manipulators of politics a lesson.

This was the tribute paid here today to Governor Wilson, the Democratic presidential nominee, by United States Senator John D. Works, Republican of California. In a remarkable statement issued by the California senator.

"It would do a progressive no good," Works said, "to vote in a Republican booth, unless he could vote in that booth for progressive candidates. The Republican party of California, represented by its state central committee, declares for Roosevelt, who has severed all connection with that party and become the candidate of another organization. No kind of sophistry or evasion can conceal the fact that this whole proceeding is fraudulent.

Question of Common Justice.

"It is pitiful that a great movement for reform in politics in California should have been brought to this sorry pass. The merits of the respective candidates or their parties have nothing to do with the question. It is a question of common honesty and justice. It is to be regretted that the law of the state did not allow the Progressive party candidates a place on the primary ballot. Every voter of the state should have the right to vote for the candidate of his choice. The governor would have been entirely justified in calling a special session of the legislature that the law might have been amended to give that right.

"The present Progressive candidates had no just or legal right on the Republican ballot, and they were nominated by the votes of electors who had no right to vote for them in the Republican booth.

"All this is exceedingly unfortunate. It has done more than anything that could have happened to discredit and bring into disrepute the progressive movement in California.

A "Contemptible Deception."

"Roosevelt and his new party cannot, with consistency or honor, continue to act with or use the power of the Republican party in its own interest or in the interest of any other progressive candidate. The right and honorable thing for them to have done was to place their candidates on the ticket as Progressives by petition, so that every voter could vote intelligently for whom he pleased, knowing whether he was voting for a Republican or a Progressive.

"The whole thing has been a contemptible deception and a fraud. It has been more than that—a series of crimes. The candidates who ran on the Republican ticket, but who were Progressives, were fraudulently nominated and are entitled to no consideration.

"Then what are real progressive Republicans to do? They cannot consistently support Taft for two reasons—he was not honestly nominated and he is a reactionary. The answer is simple: Vote for Wilson."

prison at Rawlins, Wyo., had anything but good words for the management of the prison this morning when interviewed in the city jail.

"In the first place, Warden Alston hardly ever comes in the prison. I was there nine months and saw him twice. The guards have no regard for the prisoners. The food is the worst possible. I have gone to my meals, finding the food only half cooked, and many times not one fourth enough.

"The prisoners are required to do entirely too much work. The guards lay out tasks for each man. If he is not able to do it, he is put in the dungeon because he could not complete his work on time. There is no use trying to explain many of the things the guards require of the prisoners. The poor food and overwork are the two main things causing the revolt of the prisoners. While I was there, practically every man in the prison had a deep grudge against the management over these two things.

MANY STALLIONS REFUSED LICENSE

New Oregon Board Rejects Some for Lack of Breed, Some for Disease.

(Special to The Journal.) Oregon Agriculture college, Corvallis, Or., Oct. 14.—The first annual report of the stallion registration board of Oregon, prepared by the secretary Professor E. L. Potter of the Oregon Agricultural college, is now off the press, and is full of interesting facts.

Besides a complete directory of all the licensed stallions and jacks in the state, classified by counties, with the names of their owners and a statement of their breeding and any special defects, there is a table showing just how many of each breed there are in each county, how many are grades, mongrels, or pure blooded. Another table classifies the animals as to breeding and soundness, showing the number of each breed having spavin, roaring, and other defects, a total of nine per cent unsound out of 1135 animals.

The total number of applications received was 1238, and of these 1135 have been granted licenses, 103 being held up, some because no fees were paid, some because of the death or sale of the horses, lack of inspection, necessity of further information, or other cause. In some cases the pedigrees were found to be entirely fictitious, or to have dates changed or to be forgeries. Certificates of registration were refused them, as were also certificates issued by the American Horse Register, American Percheron Register, American Pacing Register, Standard Jack and Jennet Register, the Dominion Draft Horse association, and the Hartman Stock Farm Registry Record company. In the latter case pure bred licenses were issued after the foreign certificates were presented, and in some other cases animals thus listed have afterward been properly recorded. Unauthorized certificates issued by S. D. Thompson, certificates of Arabian horses, and miscellaneous unauthorized certificates were also refused.

A large number of owners, finding that the law barred the certificates they held, did not present them for registry. Some horses advertised as pure bred had no certificates to support the claim, and sometimes the owners have tried to secure a pure bred license without a certificate. In no case has a pure bred license been issued by the board until a certificate from a recognized association has been presented at the office of the board, examined and approved.

There are 21 graduate veterinarians in Oregon who are authorized to inspect stallions and jacks for state license, and to receive applications for licenses. The fees for licenses, transfers and duplicates amounted during the year to \$12,361, and the disbursements of the board to \$7,691.17, leaving a balance on hand, not including outstanding obligations, of \$4,669.83.

It is interesting to note that Idaho has registered three stallions in the Oregon Registry, California four, and Washington nine. Of these six are Standard bred, one Shire, one Percheron, one Cleveland, two Mongrel, one German Coach, two Belgian, one Grade-Trotting and one Grade-Percheron. They are used along the Oregon line.

DAN M'ALLEN BACK; WOULD MISS VOTING

Dan McAllen, well known as the "father" of the Lewis & Clarke fair, has returned to Portland, after an all summer trip to the Blue River mining district, and now McAllen is talking mines and ore to every friend he meets on the street.

"I wouldn't buy a million dollar mine for 10 cents before I was up there, but my opinion has changed since then. You can find gold everywhere," he said this morning.

"Blue River is 45 miles from Eugene, and from Blue River to the summit of the Cascades is six miles, on a grade of 45 degrees, but you can have ice cream there on the Fourth of July, and the ice isn't shipped in."

McAllen is interested in two big mines, the Treasurer and Great Northern, which promises fair profits, according to the assay made by his son, Lavelle McAllen, a mining engineer, who is now on the grounds.

"What is necessary to make mines pay is transportation facilities, and an electric road would pay from the start. Anything that can be raised in the Hood or Rogue river valleys can be raised in the McKenzie river valley, and it is only a question of time when it will be as well known as the other two valleys," he said.

"I came down here on account of the coming election. I always want to be here at these times. But I am going back after November 5. I couldn't stay away if I wanted to," he declared.

SAYS CHINA WILL BECOME CHRISTIAN

Religious Change to Occur Within 100 Years, Asserts Ng Poon Chew.

That eloquence is peculiar to no race or class was the discovery of audiences that listened to Ng Poon Chew, new China's "word citizen," yesterday.

He predicted that within 100 years China will be known as a Christian nation. With the humor that lightened his addresses at Westminster Presbyterian church in the morning, the Y. M. C. A. in the afternoon, and the First Presbyterian church in the evening, he suggested that even before that time China may be sending missionaries to the United States.

Ng Poon Chew, who "lives on both sides of the sea," in that he publishes the Chinese daily of San Francisco, yet played a great part in the revolution in China, said that while the date given for the beginning of the revolution is September 12, 1911, its beginning was really in 1644. The Chinese ruler had been overthrown by 300,000 robbers. General Woo of Chinese troops invited savage Manchurians to aid him in putting them out. Instead of going away when the help was rendered, the Manchurians remained, established the Manchurian dynasty, and put the burden of supporting their 4,000,000 on the Chinese. Thus it was for 270 years.

Ng Poon Chew described a recent visit to China, at the First Presbyterian church last night. He had gone away as a little boy. It required then six days to travel 125 miles. He came back to find a wonderfully progressive spirit. American built locomotives and coaches furnished transportation. Telephones facilitated communication. The Imperial

post had handled in the last year 400,000,000 pieces of mail, although 20 years ago they had no such thing as postal service. He gave much of the credit for the revolution to Christianity. Dr. Sep Yat Sen, president of China's provisional government is a Congregationalist. Ng Poon Chew is an ordained Presbyterian preacher.

"No people can last or endure unless they have religion as the foundation of society and government," said Ng Poon Chew.

The last appearance in Portland will be before the business men of the city under the auspices of the Rotary club this evening at the Commercial club. A dollar dinner will be given, beginning at 6:30 p. m. Theodore B. Wilcox will respond to Ng Poon Chew. About 500 reservations have been made, said, H. S. Denny, chairman of the committee on arrangements, today.

ILLINOIS SOCIETY RENEWS ACTIVITIES

Its membership is already as large as that of any other state society in Portland.

DOCTOR DROWNS IN RAGING UMPQUA

Wades to Middle of River to Fish and Loses Footing When Coming In.

(Special to The Journal.) Roseburg, Or., Oct. 14.—Dr. R. F. Smick, a well known Roseburg physician and a member of the medical firm of Drs. Seely, Sether, Stewart & Smick, was drowned Sunday morning while fishing in the Umpqua river, 15 miles west of Roseburg. The body was recovered 50 minutes after he sank. The doctors worked over the body for more than an hour but could not induce respiration. He was 32 years old and a son of Rev. and Mrs. W. A. Smick of Roseburg.

Smick had often fished in the vicinity where he lost his life. He went there Sunday morning with two other Roseburg men. He waded to the middle of the river as was the custom, and after fishing for some time started to return to shore. He lost his footing and was carried by the swift current to deep water below.

Smick was a fine swimmer. He started to swim up the river but the current was too strong and he could make no headway. One of his companions threw him a fishpole attached to a line. He grasped this, but as the man started to pull him in he let go and sank.

The place where the accident occurred is below the confluence of the North and South Umpqua rivers, and the water was very cold and ran like a mill stream.

Dr. Smick was to have been married in about six weeks to Miss Elaine Bell, daughter of Weather Observer Bell. She at present is touring in the east.
