

COMMITTEES PLAN TO ENTERTAIN W. C. T. U. WORKERS

Automobiles Will Carry Temperance Women on Sight-seeing Trip; Program Will Open Saturday.

Where to Take Autos.
Due to the fact that there has been some confusion regarding the sightseeing trip through Portland for the delegates to the W. C. T. U. national convention to be held here this week, it has been announced that all automobiles that are to participate in the trip are to be at the White Temple tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock.

The committee on arrangements has asked that all the rooms for decoration purposes should be delivered to the White Temple either Friday night or early Saturday morning.

If a stranger should by chance invade the local W. C. T. U. headquarters in the Goodnough building, it would be an easy matter for him to decide that an event of national importance is about to take place, for the many white ribbons of this city and from all parts of the state are unusually active in arranging entertainment.

The principle cause for the haste about headquarters today is the preparation of the reception for the special train carrying delegates from 26 eastern states which arrives at the Union depot from Tacoma and Seattle tomorrow morning at 7 o'clock. These delegates are today in Seattle and Tacoma, where they are being entertained. All of tomorrow will be occupied by receiving, caring for and entertaining the delegates. As soon as the train arrives, the delegates will be taken to the Mayberry hotel which has been selected as the official headquarters. At 10 o'clock all the visitors will assemble at the White Temple where automobiles will be provided for the sight seeing trip through the city. Tomorrow night a reception, which is to be one of the most important social features of the convention, will be held at the Commercial club. The most important delegate to arrive tomorrow morning is Mrs. M. N. Stevens, national president.

State Convention to Meet.
An important session of the state executive board was held this morning when delegates to the next national convention were named. These will be confirmed at the state convention at the W. C. T. U. which is to convene at the Taylor street M. E. church tomorrow at 10 o'clock. A full ticket of the officers of the state organization has also been prepared and will be submitted to the convention tomorrow, while an important one will be cut as short as possible on account of the national convention that will convene the next day. At least 200 state delegates are expected at this session.

Plans are being made today to fill between 75 and 100 Portland pulpits Sunday with speakers from among delegates from all over the United States, and speakers will also be sent to Oregon City, McMinnville, St. Johns, Camas and other nearby towns. The details will be announced tomorrow, if present plans carry.

Noted Speakers Coming Far.
One of the most important speakers to arrive is Miss Agnes Anderson Hughes of New Zealand, a speaker of international reputation, whose principal

talk will be given Sunday night at the White Temple. Miss Hughes is coming from New Zealand to attend this convention. Mrs. Edith Smith Davis, world superintendent of scientific temperance work, will also address the Sunday night meeting.

The program as arranged for the convention will go into effect Saturday morning at 9:30 o'clock at the White Temple, when Mrs. L. M. N. Stevens, national president of the W. C. T. U., will formally open the national convention. At 10 o'clock Mrs. Stevens will give her annual address.

On Saturday afternoon the national corresponding secretary and the treasurer will make their reports. At 4 o'clock there will be a children's demonstration, under the direction of Miss Edna Rowan, national L. T. L. secretary.

Saturday evening will be welcome night, and Governor West, Rev. Mr. Hinson, Rev. E. Nelson Allen, D. Solis Conner, Frank Rigler, C. C. Chapman, Mrs. Sarah Evans, Miss Emma Wood, Mrs. H. L. Shelton, B. Lee Paget and Mrs. Unruh, president of the Oregon W. C. T. U., will be given a reception at the White Temple.

A special sermon will be given Sunday morning by Rev. W. B. Hinson at the White Temple. Sunday afternoon the convention sermon will be preached by Rev. Edith Hill Booker. A special young people's meeting will be held at 6:30 o'clock at the Grace M. E. church.

NORTHERN POSTS IN GOOD SHAPE

General Wood, at San Francisco, Says N.-W. Reservations in Fine Condition.

San Francisco, Oct. 17.—On a tour of western army posts to further his plan for the concentration of troops, Major General Leonard Wood, chief of staff, United States army, is here today after visiting the posts in Washington and Oregon. With General Murray, commanding the Presidio station, General Wood spent the day inspecting the post and discussing plans for improvements in the military reservation.

"I found everything in excellent shape up north," said General Wood, "and I am more convinced than ever of the necessity of concentrating troops in or near such centers as San Francisco and Seattle."

General Wood will remain here four days.

COLONEL HAS BAD NIGHT; HIS SLEEP IS FITFUL, BROKEN

absolute quiet. After breakfast he went to sleep.

The crisis in Roosevelt's condition is rapidly approaching and the doctors are carefully watching for signs of blood poisoning and tetanus. They expect the crisis to come tomorrow. Mrs. Roosevelt came with her husband until 10 o'clock last night, when she went to her room, which adjoins that of the colonel.

An X-ray examination of the wound showed that the bullet had flattened and imbedded itself near the fractured rib. The wound, however, is clean.

The physician announced this morning that unless complications developed, Colonel Roosevelt will be permitted to start for Oyster Bay some time next week. The members of his family are anxious to get him home.

Believes Schrank Paranoiac.
Discussing Schrank and the shooting, Colonel Roosevelt said to a visitor today:

"This man's name might be Czolgoz or anything else, so far as I am concerned. I never heard of him, and know nothing whatever about him."

Colonel Roosevelt believes Schrank is a paranoiac.

"I did not feel any pain," he said, "for the first 15 minutes after the shooting. After I reached the Auditorium, however, and began speaking, it began to give me trouble."

The following bulletin concerning Colonel Roosevelt's condition was issued from Mercy hospital at 9 o'clock this morning:

"At this hour Colonel Roosevelt's pulse is 72; his temperature 98.3, and his respiration 18. The wound has just been dressed and looks well. There is some coughing, but the lungs are in good condition. The patient's general condition is splendid. The case is progressing nicely and unless some unforeseen complication occurs the bullet will not be removed at present."

Colonel Says He Feels Fine.
The colonel laughed and joked this morning with Mrs. Roosevelt, the surgeons and his nurses.

"I feel bully and fine," he declared. "I have just had a good sleep, and feel that I could start for Oyster Bay today if the doctors would let me."

The physicians and Mrs. Roosevelt then advised the colonel that even if the wound healed in the most favorable way there would be no chance of him leaving Chicago until after Sunday.

The colonel acquiesced in this plan.

Earlier in the day one of the attending physicians told a United Press representative that the colonel had passed a restless night, but that he had resulted in no turn for the worse. The fractured rib, the physicians said, was probably the cause of this condition. Only a few visitors called at the hospital today.

A thousand telegrams and letters have poured in on Colonel Roosevelt since he arrived at Mercy hospital here. Theodore Roosevelt Jr., is dictating the replies.

Colonel Roosevelt discontinued today the publication of cablegrams from European royalty fearing such publicity might prove offensive.

Hundreds of bouquets are arriving daily. These the colonel orders distributed among the other patients in the hospital.

When informed today that twins had been born in the hospital as he entered the building Tuesday, Colonel Roosevelt declared himself delighted and expressed his satisfaction when told that the elder infant was named after him. He wanted to see the babies immediately.

The parents, Dominick and Nellie Waisie, were greatly pleased and the mother arranged to show the twins to the colonel.

Physicians are very confident that Colonel Roosevelt is out of danger. All nervousness has disappeared. Dr. Lambert, who accompanied Mrs. Roosevelt here from New York, said:

"There is no significance in the morning bulletin that the bullet is not yet removed. Two things will determine whether or not the bullet will ever be

removed—first, if it starts to cause trouble; and second, the fact that Colonel Roosevelt would rather carry it in his pocket as a souvenir instead of in his chest."

Schrank Spends Night Writing.

Milwaukee, Oct. 17.—Joe Schrank, who shot Theodore Roosevelt here Monday night, spent the morning in his cell writing and tearing up the sheets. He refused to divulge the subject of his writing. Later he played checkers with another prisoner named Walter Stassel, winning four games.

LOWELL PREDICTS WILSON VICTORY

Eastern Oregon Republican Says Party Split Will Bring Defeat.

Judge Stephen A. Lowell of Pendleton, well known eastern Oregon Republican, while in Portland yesterday predicted the defeat both of William Howard Taft and Theodore Roosevelt for the presidency, and the election of Woodrow Wilson.

"It is not a matter of sentiment or party but of mathematics," declared Judge Lowell. "The Republicans of this country have only about 1,000,000 more votes than the Democrats. But this year the Republican vote is divided between Roosevelt and Taft. The Democratic vote is solid for Woodrow Wilson because of the Republican split. There can be but one result. Neither Roosevelt or Taft will receive enough votes to elect. Wilson will inevitably be elected."

"I do not speak as one who supports Wilson but as one who faces and honestly recognizes facts. I intend to vote for Taft, knowing as I do so that my vote will count for nothing. I will vote the Republican ticket because of my belief that our only hope for regained strength is to continue the regular organization with the hope that after four years we may again win. I do not approve the methods by which his nomination was gained. I am a progressive without a candidate, a Republican without a platform. Party loyalty and party loyalty alone will influence my vote this year."

Judge Lowell was a candidate for the Republican nomination for United States senator in the primaries. He delivered an address last night in Soling-Hirson hall in behalf of Ben Sling's candidacy for the United States senate on the Republican ticket.

Johnson Summoned by Colonel.

Fort Wayne, Ind., Oct. 17.—Governor Hiram Johnson of California, Progressive candidate for vice president, spoke here this afternoon, and then left for Marion, where he is scheduled to appear tonight.

Governor Johnson is finishing his campaign in Indiana, which was interrupted in September.

From Marion Johnson will go direct to Chicago to confer with his running mate, Colonel Roosevelt, having been summoned by the latter.
