

SENATOR HEYBURN OF IDAHO DIES AT WASHINGTON, D. C.

Worn Out by Disease and Overwork, Senior Senator Collapses After Critical Illness—Heart Trouble.

(Special to The Journal.) Washington, Oct. 13.—"I am worn out but worn out in the service of a great cause."

Thinking of his country and his country's good almost up to the last moment of his life, United States Senator W. B. Heyburn of Idaho died here in his apartment last night at 7:30 o'clock. His physician attributes his death to heart disease complicated with kidney trouble and diabetes. He had been critically ill since August, and in poor health for more than a year.

Senator Heyburn was rational during the last few hours, and surrounded by his wife, his wife's sister, Miss M. E. Yeatman, his brother, E. M. Heyburn, Dr. Kerr and two nurses, talked of his work in the senate and his efforts to work for the betterment of the nation. "I have done the best I could. I am worn out but worn out in the service of a great cause," were almost the last words he uttered. A moment afterward he said he felt that he must leave his bed. The attendants assisted him to sit up but the effort proved too much of a strain on his heart and he fell back dead.

Realizes End Near. Early in the afternoon, the senator experienced a sinking spell and restoratives were applied, after which he talked for three hours with his brother. During the conversation he made statements indicating that he knew the end was drawing near and realized that he had hastened it by the stubborn fight he had made in congress to prevent the passage of the resolution which authorized the present senatorial investigation of campaign contributions when he was in no fit physical condition to do so. This investigation he characterized frequently as a "great mistake."

Arrangements for the funeral, which will take place Sunday, are being made today by the sergeant-at-arms of the senate. Interment will be made in the Birmingham Quaker burial ground in Delaware county, Pennsylvania, by the side of his mother, in accordance with a wish he had often expressed.

Although Dr. Kerr attributes Senator Heyburn's death directly to heart trouble, overwork, he said, and a determination to apply himself to his senatorial duties were in a large measure responsible for his collapse. Dr. Kerr declared he had frequently ordered the senator to rest and give his body a chance to recuperate, but that Mr. Heyburn steadfastly declined to do so. Senator Heyburn spent little of his time in bed during his last illness. Most

of the time he sat in a big arm chair. He evidently did not realize his serious condition.

Senator Heyburn, who was one of the staunchest regular Republicans in the senate, was born in Delaware county, Pennsylvania, May 23, 1852.

His parents were Quakers. He was admitted to the bar in 1876 and practiced continuously. He moved to Wallace, Idaho in the winter of 1883-84. Soon after his arrival he entered active political life and in a short time was considered one of the powers of politics in his adopted state. He was elected to the United States senate for his first term in January, 1903, and reelected for a four year term in January of 1909.

WHITE RIBBONERS POURING INTO CITY IN SPECIAL TRAINS

In the 28 intervening years that the delegates present at the opening session in the White Temple tomorrow morning will represent 300,000 women in the United States alone. And when Mrs. Lillian M. N. Stevens, national president of the White Ribbon League, calls the convention to order promptly at 9 o'clock, 500 delegates are expected to be in their seats.

Delegates Arriving in City. In addition to these delegates, there probably will be other hundreds not entitled to votes as the official representatives of their unions, who have come to be present at the "Farther West" convention the W. C. T. U. has ever held.

Once before, in 1905, the W. C. T. U. has met on the Pacific coast. That convention was at Los Angeles, but geographically Portland is farther west than the southern California city. The incoming delegates, each one wearing a tiny white ribbon in a double bow pinned on her breast, with the official badge of her state or union, began yesterday, and today every incoming delegate is increasing the number of convention visitors in Portland. One big special train of 18 cars that rolled into the union depot before 6 o'clock this morning brought nearly 400 women from Indiana, Ohio, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Pennsylvania, Illinois, Connecticut, Florida, Georgia, Iowa, Maine, Massachusetts, Mississippi, Nebraska, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Kansas, North and South Dakota, Oklahoma, Rhode Island, Tennessee and Virginia.

"White Ribbon Special." This train, called the "White Ribbon Special," was made up at Chicago in two sections, and when it left that city there were 300 women in the party. But as it went through each state toward the west other delegations boarded it until at Tacoma there were fully 400 in the party. Delegates from Spokane, Seattle and Tacoma further increased the number, though many women from these cities will come by the regular trains.

At Tacoma last night, following a banquet and reception in honor of the W. C. T. U. and Mrs. Stevens, the president, who was on the train, given by the Tacoma Chamber of Commerce and Commercial club, the two sections were combined.

On this train besides Mrs. Stevens, were Miss Anna A. Gordon of Evanston, Ill., national vice president at large; Mrs. Frances P. Parks, national corresponding secretary of Evanston, Ill.; Mrs. Sara H. Hoge, national assistant recording secretary of Lincoln, Va.; Mrs. Elizabeth P. Hutchinson, national treasurer of Evanston, Ill.; and Miss Eva K. Foster of Boston, national press representative. Presidents of many state unions were also among the passengers.

California Sends Delegation. Another party to arrive this morning was a delegation of nearly 20 from California. These women had held their state convention at Sacramento just before they boarded their special car, attached to the regular train, for Portland. Prominent among them was Mrs. Sara J. Dorr, California state president; Mrs. Emile Skore, recording secretary; Mrs. Anna E. Chase, corresponding secretary; Mrs. M. H. Cartwright, formerly of Portland, where her husband was United States district attorney, but now of Berkeley, and Rev. Bridwell Washburn, also a former Portland woman. Mrs. Cartwright and Dr. Washburn were elected fraternal delegates to this convention.

Many smaller delegations of from two to 20 persons will arrive today by the regular trains or in special cars. As soon as they arrived in Portland today all delegates were taken in hand by the entertainment committee, of which Mrs. Mary T. Mallett, Multnomah county president, is in charge, and after breakfasting at one of the hotels, were assigned to quarters. It was a busy day for Mrs. Mallett and her committee. In the early part of the morning this committee was stationed at the Carlton hotel, which with the Hotel Mallory will be the headquarters of the national officers during the convention. After 10 o'clock, however, Mrs. Mallett and the committee moved over to the White Temple at Twelfth and Taylor streets, where the work of assigning quarters went on.

Homes Opened to Guests. This was a pretty heavy task, but it went on without a hitch. The committee had the names of nearly 400 Portland citizens who had offered to take visitors into their residences and entertain them during the convention week, and as the delegates or their visiting guests arrived, they were quickly assigned to one of these residences. The officers, including the national

officers and state presidents, comprising the official board of the W. C. T. U. will stay at the Hotel Mallory or the Carlton, but practically all the other visitors will be cared for in private homes.

Assisting Mrs. Mallett in this assignment work were Mrs. J. T. George, Mrs. G. E. Christmas, Mrs. Margaret Houston, Miss Winona B. Mallett, and Miss Helen C. Hanning. Nearly 200 delegates were provided for this morning. The registration of the delegates and visitors will not begin until tomorrow morning just before the first session of the convention. The registration books will be in the White Temple.

While they are waiting for the convention to open, Portland W. C. T. U. women, assisted by the Portland Commercial club, are not letting them remain idle for lack of entertainment.

Hardly were the delegates assigned to their quarters than 200 of them were taken in autos on a sightseeing trip about the city this morning. This trip was arranged by Mrs. Lucia Faxon Addison of Portland, national lecturer, and the start was made from the White Temple.

In the meantime, the official board, which is composed of the national officers and the presidents of the various state organizations, was meeting in the assembly hall at the Mallory hotel. This session was for the purpose of reviewing acquaintances and outlining the work of the convention, and was a short affair.

Enjoy Auto Ride. As soon as it was over at 12 o'clock, the members of the board, of whom between 40 and 50 were present, were taken to automobiles awaiting them outside the hotel, and whisked about the city on a quick sightseeing trip 45 minutes long. After that they had luncheon, preparatory to a session this afternoon of the executive committee, which includes besides the official board, the superintendents of the various W. C. T. U. departments. There are about 40 of these departments, and they cover a very wide scope of endeavor, from work among the children and young people, to education along medical lines, work among lumbermen and the like.

The auto trip for the official board was under the auspices of the Transportation club.

A unique entertainment feature was a walking trip to points of interest about town to women—which includes, of course, the department stores—at 2 o'clock this afternoon. This trip also started from the White Temple, and the delegates were in charge of four official guides, who were: Mrs. M. E. Pugh, of Frances Willard Union, Portland; Mrs. McNeil, of Lent's; Mrs. Florence Heald and Mrs. Inez Richardson, both of the M. Scott union.

After the visitors had seen to their hearts' content of the department stores, they were taken to see the Art Museum and the library.

At the Commercial club rooms, in the Commercial club building at Fifth and Oak streets, from 7:30 to 11 o'clock tonight, the W. C. T. U. visitors will be guests at a reception. Refreshments will be put forth to make the visitors feel at home.

One of the most important features of the convention, however, is the most important, because of its influence in shaping the work to be done at the succeeding sessions—will be the annual address tomorrow morning, of a sweet faced little woman who for 14 years, since the death of the great Frances E. Willard, has guided the destinies of the Women's Christian Temperance Union as its national president. She is Mrs. Lillian M. N. Stevens, of Portland, Maine, under whose leadership the organization has attained perhaps its greatest efficiency.

Reception Is Expected. For 13 successive times Mrs. Stevens has been reelected president, and there is little doubt that she will be again chosen when the present convention elects its officers. With her at the Hotel Mallory this morning was Miss Anna A. Gordon, of Evanston, Ill., national vice president at large, who has held that office since Mrs. Stevens became president.

The custom at previous W. C. T. U. conventions of having three sessions daily will be changed this year to the extent of holding an afternoon and night session at the White Temple and devoting the morning to conferences and committee work. But these conferences which will be held at Grace M. E. church, the official conference church, which is right across the street from the White Temple, will all be open to the public.

Then only meetings of the convention not public will be the sessions of the official board and the executive committee, all of which will be held privately at the Mallory hotel. The official board, which directs the policy of the W. C. T. U. is the most exclusive, while the executive committee is the largest.

Though the convention will begin at 9 o'clock tomorrow morning, it will not be officially called to order until 9:30 o'clock by Mrs. Stevens.

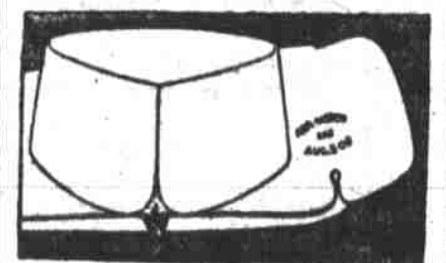
Big Crop Expected. The big crop of apples is now being gathered, and latest returns confirm the report that the output will be the greatest ever known. There will be apples galore for everyone, and the price will be right for those that care to participate.

Not only has the Pacific coast its greatest apple crop this season, but all through the east a record crop is reported.

E. C. Gillett, secretary of the New York State Fruitgrowers, has issued his annual report of fruit conditions, which shows a better crop than for many years.

The Lake Ontario counties of Oswego, Wayne, Monroe, Orleans and Niagara, apples average 84 per cent as compared with 81 per cent in September last year, while the central New York section, including Yates, Seneca, Livingston, Genesee and Ontario counties, average also 84 per cent, as compared to 80 per cent last September.

The report also includes the conditions in some other apple-growing states, as follows: Connecticut, 60 per cent; Pennsylvania, about 75 per cent; Virginia, 70 per cent; Delaware, 110 per cent; Massachusetts, 70 per cent; Vermont, 40 per cent; Arkansas, 50 per cent; Michigan, 100 per cent.
