**SOCIALISTS GET BAIL
ON "ROOSEVELT DEAL"**

The eight Socialists who are known of the nine indicted by the September grand jury for publication and distribution of scurrilous attacks on Colonel Roosevelt and members of his family when he visited Portland recently, appeared yesterday before Circuit Judge Morrow for arraignment and were bound over for trial on their pleas of not guilty. The ninth indictment was against "John Doe" and his identity has not been revealed.

The men indicted are: O. A. Erickson, J. E. Fisher, I. W. W. Ramsley, M. Koerner, F. W. Hale, J. Worthen, A. F. Hale, and T. J. Burns. Their indictments were made for some time no arrests were made in order that political capital might not be made of the affair. The men were notified to appear and all were willing to do so.

A fund has been started by sympathizers to supply the necessary money for the defense of the men and Fred T. Reason, editor of the Appeal to Reason, declared in a speech in Portland Monday that he will aid in raising \$100,000 if necessary. The Socialists will be defended by Attorneys John A. Jeffrey and H. J. Parkinson.

COUNT GETS ANGRY

Los Angeles, Cal., Oct. 18.—Count Paul Schmidt, secretary to Hugo Schmidt, manager of the Deutsche bank of Berlin, refused to be interviewed on the subject of women suffrage today.

**ALLEGES ETTOR
INCITED RIOTS**

Reporter Says the Lawrence Strike Leader in Speeches Advocated Violence.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Salem, Mass., Oct. 18.—Testimony which hurt the defense of Joseph Ettore, Arturo Giovannitti and Antonio Caruso, Lawrence labor leaders accused of the murder of Anna Lopizzo during the strike riots, was given today by James Donahue, a Boston newspaperman. Donahue testified he heard Ettore say before the Lopizzo woman was shot that unless the importation of "scabs" into Lawrence stopped the textile strikers would "clean out the gun stores."

The prosecution yesterday put several witnesses on the stand in an effort to prove the three defendants had advocated bloodshed during the strike and by speeches incited rioting which it was asserted finally led to the death of Anna Lopizzo.

Among the witnesses was James P. Donahue, a newspaper man from Boston who was at Lawrence throughout the strike. He recounted speeches he alleged Ettore made to strikers. In one of his addresses, Donahue declared, Ettore said the industrial conditions at Lawrence remain hopeless until a revolution when the workers would be denied bread and told to eat grass. "A short time afterward the masters' heads hung on Paris lamp posts and in their mouths were wisps of grass," Donahue said Ettore told the workers. Donahue stated also that Ettore warned the strikers that some one would "be got" during the strike.

Two Lawrence police officers testified that Giovannitti had told them he defied the police and militia.

ASSERTS CITY HAS
LEGAL POWER TO
REMOVE TRACKSCity Attorney Grant Gives an
Opinion on Complaint of the
Dock Commission; Meeting
With Terminal Company.

Holding that if the railroad tracks of the Northern Terminal company on North Front street interfere with the public use of the street as planned by the Portland dock commission, the city council, in such event, has a right to order the tracks removed or subjected to such restrictions as shall seem reasonable to the councilmen. City Attorney Frank S. Grant has submitted an exhaustive opinion to City Auditor A. L. Barbur. The city attorney further recommends that the street committee of the city council fix a time for a hearing, at which both the Terminal company and the dock commission shall be present, to express the views of both sides on the matter.

Claims Tracks Obstruct Street.
In a number of communications addressed to the council, Chairman F. W. Mulkey of the dock commission has declared that the Terminal company is occupying a portion of North Front street between Fourteenth and Seventeenth streets with double tracks, which are detrimental to the public, in that they obstruct access to the proposed public dock near the foot of Fourteenth street.

After reviewing the situation and noting a number of reasons why the Terminal company should not be permitted to interfere with the plans of the dock commission, Mr. Grant says that the whole matter is finally settled by section 106 of the city charter.

"This section provides," says the city attorney, "that all franchises or privileges granted by the city, which are not in actual use or enjoyment at the time the charter was adopted, or which the grantees thereof have not in good faith commenced to exercise, are hereby declared forfeited and of no validity unless said grantees shall within six months after the charter takes effect, commence to exercise or enjoy said grant or franchise."

Hearing Is Requested.
"It appears," continues the city attorney, "from the report of Chairman Mulkey of the dock commission, that the Terminal company did not commence to exercise its franchise in question, until long after the time specified in the charter."

"I would therefore recommend," he concludes, "that the street committee fix a time for a hearing of the matter and notify the Terminal company to make a showing as to the extent that public traffic is accommodated by the present tracks on North Front street and that the dock commission will explain to what extent the tracks will have to be modified in order to provide suitable access to the proposed public docks."

"The street committee should then determine whether it is necessary to have the existing tracks removed or whether they may be permitted to continue with certain changes (the elevation or the shifting of the tracks or the limiting of their operation to certain periods of the day or night) I would recommend that the committee report accordingly together with an ordinance providing for such changes."

**IMPROPER MOTIVE
DENIED BY COLONEL**

Ex-President Says Senator Bourne Acted on the Square.

That Senator Bourne's actions in seeking a compromise between the government and the Standard Oil company was "eminently proper" is the assurance in a telegram from Theodore Roosevelt to the Oregon senator, given out at Bourne headquarters yesterday. The ex-president says no inference of improper motive is justified from the letters read before the senate investigating committee.

The telegram bears date of October 12, at Chicago, two days before Roosevelt was shot. Publication has been withheld, it is stated, because of the shooting at Milwaukee. The telegram follows:

Roosevelt's Telegram.
"Chicago, Ill., Oct. 13, 1912.—Jonathan Bourne, Jr., Portland Oregon.—Your efforts toward the settlement of the Standard Oil litigation referred to in my letter published before the senatorial investigating committee in no shape or way justifies the impression that you are an employee or agent of the Standard Oil company."

"You asked for an interview and arranged it, you had an absolute right to do, and exactly in the same fashion as other congressmen of high character were continually and properly making requests for or arranging interviews between me and the heads of big corporations or the heads of labor unions, or labor leaders, or leaders in the industrial world. After these interviews had continued a sufficient length of time I grew to feel from Mr. Archbold's attitude that it was advisable that further interviews should be held directly and without intermediaries between me and the Standard Oil counsel and the attorney general."

"But all your actions at the interviews in question showed that your efforts were entirely along the line of serving the general welfare of the country as a national public servant who desired to help bring about the termination of the suit in the interests of the country and to do this as an incident of securing the cooperation of the large financial interests of the country in getting legislation which would make all the big financial interests responsible and accountable to the police force of the government."

"I do not believe that at that time and under the then existing conditions it was possible to secure a better settlement from the Standard Oil so far as the government was concerned than was actually obtained, because I do not trust Mr. Archbold's sincerity, but your own action in securing the interviews in question was absolutely proper and your purpose to secure direct control by the government through the exercise of its administrative police power over the big trusts was an eminently wise and proper course. You and I agreed then upon a policy to which all

sensible men have since come, the policy of controlling the trusts by administrative action in the exercise of the police power of the people."
