

RIVAL POLITICAL CLANS TAKE FIGHT TO "LAST DITCH"

Campaign Continues With Unrelenting Energy; the Democrats to Hold Meeting at Bungalow Tomorrow Night.

The Democrats will start the week tomorrow night with a meeting at the Bungalow theatre, at which O. C. Wilson of California will be the speaker. Bert E. Haney, chairman of the Democratic state committee, will preside, and Governor Oswald West will introduce Mr. Wilson. The Californian is said to be an entertaining speaker. He has been campaigning in the northwest several weeks, having filled several engagements for the national committee in Washington last week.

Ben Seiling, plowing through his correspondence at his headquarters yesterday, paused long enough to give renewed assurance of his confidence that he will be elected United States senator. He said that on his recent trips to Yamhill and Benton counties and the tri-county fair at Condon, he was doubly reassured of this result.

"I am sure that Mr. Bourne's entry as a candidate has been of benefit to me," he said. "From many quarters I am told that this assures my election. I am well pleased with the outlook and regard my election as certain. Mr. Bourne's repudiation of the primary result has lost many votes cast for him in April."

At Bourne headquarters it is said that a large number of speakers will take the field for the senator next week, and quantities of literature are being forwarded to the voters. State Senators Dan Kellaher and George W. Joseph were scheduled among the speakers at a meeting at Sellwood last night, and Gay Lombard is to be billed later on for the senator's cause.

Harry Lane, Democratic candidate for United States senator, has rearranged his speaking schedule, so he will reach Portland next Thursday afternoon, in time to meet Governor Marshall, the vice presidential nominee, and attend the Marshall meeting at the Gipsy Smith auditorium that night. Dr. Lane has been campaigning for two weeks in the eastern part of the state.

Chairman Brown of the Progressive state committee yesterday made public reports from local leaders in several counties of the state as to conditions from the Bull Moose standpoint. These are excerpts:

Douglas—County as a whole very favorable. Roseburg mostly against us. Country districts should more than counterbalance. E. B. Barber and O. H. Cash.

Baker—Progressive party is making excellent showing and estimate that Roosevelt will carry it by 200. Many Democrats voting for the colonel. A. V. Swift.

Columbia—Roosevelt will carry county three to one. Sentiment is Roosevelt or Wilson. Taft will be a poor third. James Gallitens.

Umatilla—Taft will get about the same as at primaries, 500. La Follette 400 will be equally divided between Roosevelt and Wilson, giving Wilson 200 Republican votes, making 1500 Wilson, 600 Taft, 2100 Roosevelt. November 6 will prove correctness. I. U. Temple.

Jackson—Situation has improved materially in last few days. It looks as though Jackson county would go for Roosevelt by good majority.

Ex-Senator Charles W. Fulton is to make three speeches for the Republican ticket during the coming week, opening at Eugene next Thursday. Friday he will be at Ashland and Saturday at Medford. A meeting may also be arranged for him at Jacksonville. Ex-Judge Lionel R. Webster is to take the field in the last week of the campaign, but his engagements are not yet announced.

BULL MOOSE IS LOSING GROUND IN CALIFORNIA

Barring of Taft Electors From Ballot Reacts in Governor Wilson's Favor in the Bear State Is Reported.

(Special to The Journal.)
San Francisco, Oct. 19.—With election day little more than two weeks distant a peculiar condition is evolving among the voters of California. From all parts of the state, and especially from the mining and agricultural districts, come reports of a steadily increasing reaction from the Roosevelt ranks to Wilson, and the Democrats now are claiming that the man from New Jersey will carry California by from 15,000 to 25,000 votes. These figures are based upon calculation that 65 per cent of the vote polled by Taft at the primary election, as well as 40 per cent of the vote polled at the same time by La Follette, will be cast in the Democratic column.

Taft Men Are Angered.
This defection is due, of course, to the fact that the Taft electors have been barred from the ballot in this state, and the disfranchising of the president's followers is laid entirely at the door of the Bull Moose element. Many of the conservative Roosevelt voters intend to vote for Wilson as a rebuke to their own faction, as they do not countenance what is characterized as theft pure and simple. Again, the farmers who hitherto have blindly followed Hiram Johnson, are grumbling at the fact that he is absent from the state, touring the country for his own political advantage instead of being home and tending to his executive duties.

Johnson's Machine Is Effective.
Another thing that has caused a large falling away of the original Johnson voters is the fact that the governor, having made his campaign on an anti-boss platform, has created and organized in California a personal political machine that makes the old Southern Pacific organization look like a kindergarten. His pledges of economy have not been kept, and the payroll of the various state institutions, boards and commissions has been greatly increased. Hence the general dissatisfaction which, it is predicted, will express itself on November 6 by an overwhelming vote for Wilson and Marshall.

State Senator Milton A. Miller and J. K. Weatherford will open a series of eastern Oregon meetings for Woodrow Wilson and Harry Lane at Hood River tomorrow night.

EASTERN ELKS RECALL PORTLAND'S GREETING

Harry McAllister, who achieved national fame by his thoroughness in conducting the business side of the Elks' national convention in this city in July, returned Thursday from a trip of four weeks through the eastern states. The trip was made for the purpose of bringing his mother, who lived near Baltimore, to make her home with him.

"I found conditions everywhere exceptionally good," said Mr. McAllister. "I visited Chicago, Pittsburgh, Baltimore, Philadelphia and New York, and in all of those cities there was plenty of work for everyone."

"I found the Elks were 'tickled to death' with the reception they received in Portland. I met all the friends I made when members of the order were here, and many more who were only represented at the national meeting, and all were well pleased with the reception. I think the Elks' national convention was the biggest advertising stunt that has ever been pulled off here. Many of the Elks are looking toward this state with envy, and a number told me that they were arranging their business affairs to come to this state."

"It was hard to get a line on the political situation anywhere. In some cities each of the three candidates were stronger. Taft's friends seemed to be most abundant in New York. Baltimore, being a Democratic stronghold, was all for Wilson, but I found Chicago and Pittsburgh equally divided between Roosevelt and Wilson. I found the business men were doubtful as to whom would be elected, and they are divided in their choice."

"One of the things asked me with surprise was why Oregon had turned Senator Bourne down so hard in the spring. Those people could not understand why Bourne's aggressiveness and statesmanship had not been backed up." While in the east Mr. McAllister, who is a baseball "bug," attended the first world series game in New York and two of the city championship games in Chicago between the Cubs and Sox.

DISREGARD OF PRIMARY REBUKED BY DR. LANE

Pendleton, Or., Oct. 19.—Harry Lane spoke here tonight to an enthusiastic audience which packed the auditorium in the city hall. Dr. Lane flayed Jonathan Bourne for disregard of the direct primary law. He criticized the candidacy on the ground that rich man was an improper person for senator because of the manner in which the forces of wealth interlock. Dr. Lane also explicated the merits of Governor Johnson and predicted his election.

COLONEL TELLS HOW HE CAME TO BE PROGRESSIVE

"While President Got Impression of Contempt for Merely Rich Man," Says Roosevelt in Interview.

Chicago, Oct. 19.—How he became a Progressive, as explained by Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, in an interview with Will Irwin, is set forth in an article printed today by the Chicago Evening Post. The interview with Irwin was given before Colonel Roosevelt was shot. Discussing the growth of his political sentiments, the former president said that in his childhood days he read such books as "Jack Hazard" and "Winning His Way," and that after he left college he had a set of principles moulded largely by the influence of those classics.

His views began to change, Roosevelt said, when he became a member of the New York legislature and they changed still more when he became police commissioner of New York city and later governor of the state. His progressive views were pretty well developed when he became president and started to clean up the postoffice department. Later he discovered that the

money powers were influencing the judiciary, adding:
"It was then that I went the full route and advocated the recall of judicial decisions."

Colonel Roosevelt continued:
"During my years in the White House I got my impression of contempt for the merely rich man. I have no contempt for wealth, but only for the aims of those who use wealth as things have gone in our worst period. The tremendous and corrupting use of wealth in our affairs struck me most."

"What patriotism, what spiritual ends is there in most merely rich men? Do they feel any obligation except to own fortunes?"

"Let us break the shameful abuses of wealth and restore the rewards to the men who work."

REBELS PLAN TO ATTACK 3 TOWNS

El Paso, Texas, Oct. 19.—Simultaneous attacks on three Mexican border towns, in the interest of the Felix Diaz revolt, have been planned by the Diaz-Orozco commanders in the north of Mexico, it is said tonight. The towns to be attacked are Juarez, opposite El Paso; Agua Prieta, opposite Douglas, Ariz.; and Piedras Negras, opposite Eagle Pass, Texas.

In El Paso recruits for a new rebel army are being secured for the attack on Juarez. It is estimated that 200 were recruited here today. In Juarez, the rebels are impressing into service all the idle Mexicans they find on the streets. Several naturalized American citizens are said to have been forced into the federal ranks. There are fewer than 600 federal troops in Juarez.

PIONEER WOMAN OF 1865 PASSES

Mrs. Henrietta Rowell Ellis, of Revolutionary Stock, Dead at Age of 87.

The death of Henrietta Rowell Ellis at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Charles A. Johns, 632 Terrace Road, on the afternoon of October 17, marks the passing of another of the early pioneers of Oregon.

Mrs. Ellis was born December 14, 1825, in Athens, Ohio. She was the daughter of William and Hester Lentine Rowell, a prominent Virginia family. She was a direct descendant of James Neal, a captain in the Thirteenth Virginia regiment in the War of the Revolution under Colonel William Russell. Other ancestors also gained distinction in the war of 1812.

On October 2, 1844, she was married to Henry Ellis, and in 1865 removed to Oregon to Polk county. After the death of her husband in 1891 Mrs. Ellis moved to Salem. During her stay in Salem she was an active and devoted worker in the First Methodist church. In 1908 she went to Baker to make her home with her daughter, Mrs. Charles A. Johns, remaining there until June last, moving to Portland at the time Mr. and Mrs. Johns took up their residence in this city.

She is survived by three sons, W. R. Ellis of Salem, H. J. Ellis and J. C. Ellis of Dallas, and three daughters, Mrs. N. L. Butler, Twenty-fourth and East Hoyt streets, Portland; Mrs. W. H.

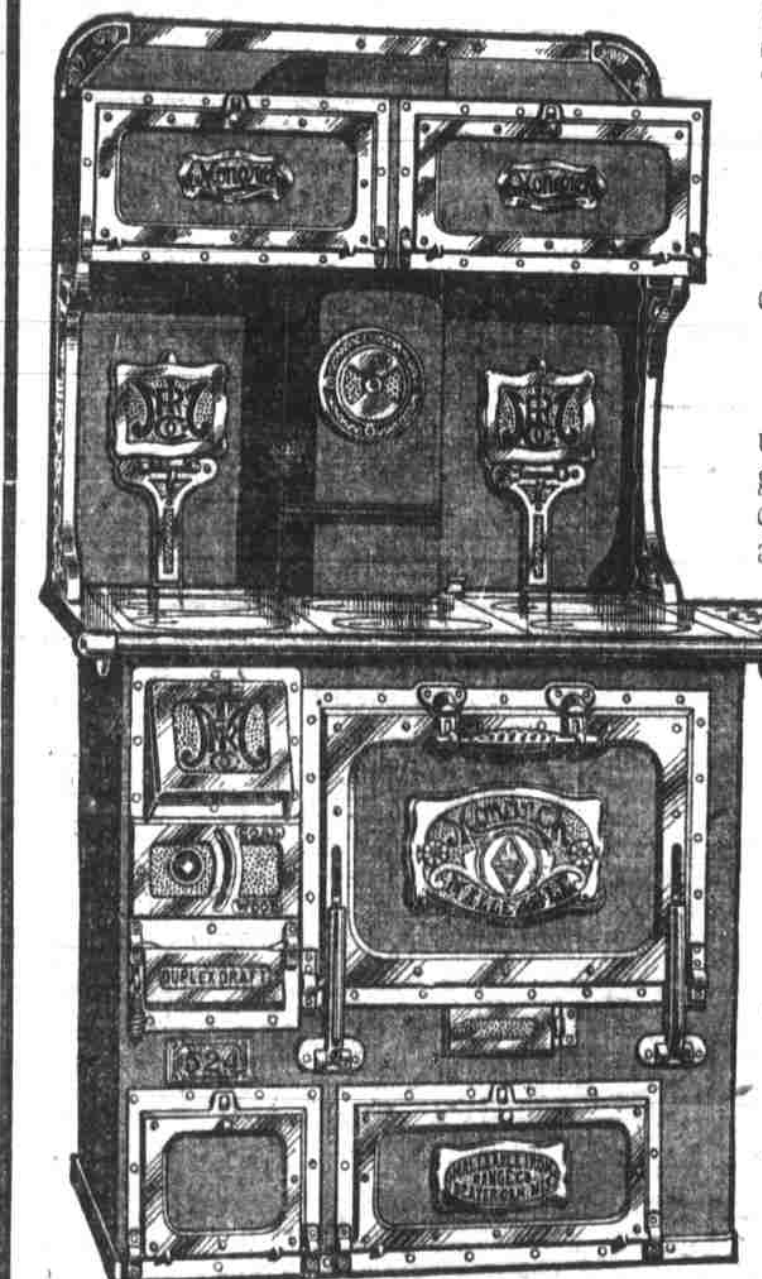
