

STATE'S PRINTING FOR 2 YEARS WILL COST \$151,070

No Deficiency Probable During
This Biennial Period but the
Sum Includes Shortage for
Previous Period.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.)
Salem, Or., Oct. 22.—The state's printing bill, for the present biennial period, will amount to \$151,070.11, according to figures compiled by Governor West and made public as a part of his campaign to show up what the various state departments are costing the taxpayers.

"The remark has been made that years have been spent in evolving a system so complicated that no one would be able to tell just what the state was paying for its printing," said the governor. "This interested me and I have spent a good many hours digging into these figures, and I now think the people of the state can know just about what their printing expense is."

Governor West's statement is as follows:
"Owing to a typographical error in making up figures assigned to the state printer's office in the classification of departmental expenses which was published by this office, and the omission of an item which should have been added to the amount assigned to that department, and for the reason that a detailed statement of expenditures is necessary in order that no injustice may be done the state printer, the following statement is offered for the purpose of advising the public as to the appropriations made by the last session of the legislature and the cost of printing and binding from January 1, 1911 to October 1, 1912. Appropriations made by the legislature for purposes pertaining to printing and binding:

"This statement shows \$75,248.73 to have been expended from the public printing fund, leaving a balance of \$24,751.27 to carry that department through the balance of the year."
Pamphlet Cost Is \$11,000.
"The expense of initiative and candidates' pamphlets, which the state printer expert advises me will amount to something over \$11,000, is to be paid out of this balance, and the current expenses for the quarter will likely consume the remainder."

"Of the \$75,248.73 already expended from this fund, a little over \$13,000 went to cover the cost of getting out initiative and candidates' pamphlets and the postage thereon; also many other incidental expenses and the salary of the state printer expert. The balance of about \$62,000 appears to have been expended through the state printer for printing and binding. Of this amount \$31,768.70 was paid to Mr. Duniway for printing.

"Of the \$12,800 appropriated for court reports, \$900 has already been expended, this amount having been paid to the state printer to cover the cost of printing and binding supreme court reports.

Lord's Oregon Code Deficiency.
"An appropriation of \$23,000 was made to cover the deficiency incurred in the matter of getting out Lord's Oregon Code. A total of \$23,721.24 appears to have been expended to cover bills for printing and binding, of which \$11,211.76 was Mr. Duniway's share for printing done. There is a balance of \$12,509.48 in this fund.

"Of this appropriation of \$25,000, there appears to have been expended \$15,748.87, leaving a balance of \$9,251.13. Of the amount expended \$13,130.25 appears to have been Mr. Duniway's share for printing done.

"While it appears that the general printing fund will likely be consumed by the needs of the department, advice received from Mr. Duniway leads us to believe that no deficiency will be incurred during the biennial period 1911-12.

"If this is true, the total cost for the years 1911-12 will be as follows:

"State Printer Duniway contends that these apparently large expenditures are due to the fact that many items, such as the cost of mailing election pamphlets, have been thrown into his department. He says his gross receipts for actual printing have averaged \$37,740 during the time he has been in office."

NEW BUILDING RULE
FOR THEATRES PLANNED
At a conference between City Inspector of Buildings H. E. Plummer with a delegation of moving picture show proprietors yesterday afternoon a tentative draft of a proposed ordinance

regulating such shows and the buildings in which they are conducted was decided upon.
If the ordinance should be passed by

the city council motion picture theatres will be divided into three classes according to capacity. Class A theatres will be those having a seating capacity not to exceed 250; class B theatres will have a seating capacity not to exceed 500, and class C will be all motion picture showhouses having a seating capacity of more than 750. For this latter class the regulations will be the same as those that govern the large theatres of the city.

It is proposed, if the ordinance passes, that it shall not become effective till January, 1914. Building Inspector Plummer hopes to be able to submit a draft of the ordinance to the city council two weeks from today.

Dutch Girl Is Walking Around the World

New York, Oct. 18.—Miss Dora Rodriguez, 19 years old, of Amsterdam, Holland, who is making a tour of the world afoot, reached Washington, D. C., September 30, 1912. Miss Rodriguez wears two medals. One for her ability at games and the other for skating.

From Washington she will go to Cuba and then home to Holland. She is the daughter of a diamond merchant of Holland. She wears a big 38 calibre automatic revolver, swung at her side in true western style. She is slightly over five feet tall, but every line of her lithe body displays great strength.

To the People of the City of Portland and State of Oregon:

The cartoon set out at the head of this space appeared in The Morning Oregonian of Tuesday, October 22, 1912. We wish everyone who has the welfare of Oregon at heart to understand that we deeply resent this cartoon. It is an indecent and unwarranted reflection on the business interests of the City of Portland, associated together under the name of the Non-Partisan 1912 Senatorial League. This League is composed of two hundred and fifty of the leading business concerns in Portland interested in the welfare and development of the City of Portland and the State of Oregon. This association of business men is solely in the interest of Oregon and is not banded together for any particular man or the selfish ambition of anyone. As business men, we have carefully considered who would be our most effective business agent in Washington, and realizing that performance was worth more than promises and that Senator Bourne had succeeded in becoming identified on the most influential committees in the senate and had succeeded in getting the appropriation that we sadly needed for the development of the resources of this state, we decided that he was the proper man to be our business agent to get us what we absolutely have to have to make this state worth while.

The petitions asking Senator Bourne to become a candidate were in most part circulated by us and under our direction and without any charge of any kind. When The Oregonian intimates, as the above cartoon attempts to set out, that these petitions were hawked around the street by blind men and drunks, the reflection on us, as business men, is one that we cannot pass by without entering our emphatic protest and registering our resentment.

We are putting down in our pockets for the money to meet a \$3,000,000 bond issue for the building of public docks in Portland. We have been contributing thousands of dollars in taxes under the Port of Portland tax, and we have put up thousands of dollars to maintain on the Columbia River the Open River Transportation Company, and it is plain to be seen that all this money that we have contributed and all the effort we have put forth will be of no avail if we do not secure the appropriations for a proper waterway from the ocean, so that we can use our public docks and make effective the work of the Port of Portland Commission and the Open River Transportation Company.

We have given our time and our money without any direct hope of return in the work of developing the State of Oregon, and it doesn't seem to stand in good grace for The Oregonian to cartoon our efforts in such a manner.

We have been hammering away on holding the American-Hawaiian Steamship Line to Portland and the Columbia River, and we have been using our utmost endeavors and our best thought and a great deal of our money to place on a business basis a line to the Orient, and we do not propose, at this time, if we can possibly help it, to have Oregon set back and bottled up because of any personal selfish ambition of any candidate for the United States Senate. We are sincere and in earnest in our efforts to build up Oregon and make it the star of the Pacific Coast States.

As business men, we know that Bourne is on the committees that grant the appropriations we require for the development of our resources and the opening up of the Columbia River from its mouth to the British Columbia line, Snake River to Lewiston and the deepening of the Willamette River through to Eugene. We know that the South Jetty is nearly completed so far as superficial appearances are concerned, but that hundreds of thousands of dollars will be required to make that improvement permanent. We know that the project of deepening the mouth of the Columbia River will not be completed until a North Jetty is built. This work at the mouth of the Columbia will require \$20,000,000, and Bourne, on the Commerce Committee, dealing with the Rivers and Harbors Bill, can get this appropriation within five years—as fast as the project can be completed.

We further realize that the immense bodies of timber along our coast line are of practically no value unless the coast harbors can be so improved that schooners can freely enter and carry away the timber and lumber to foreign markets. Bourne's position on the Commerce Committee of the Senate insures our getting the appropriations for meritorious projects that will make these harbors usable.

We have the deepest respect for the efforts put forth in the past by Oregon's Senators, and we know that while our revered Senators Mitchell and Dolph were in the Senate and most influential for periods of 18 and 12 years, respectively, and used their utmost endeavors and all their diplomacy to be placed on the Appropriations Committee, it was without avail and they failed to land. We have been 50 years in Oregon trying to get a Senator on the Appropriations Committee, and Bourne is there, and we propose to keep him there if it is in our power. If he should be replaced by any other candidates for Senator from Oregon now in the field, it is sure that they will not go on any of the strong committees that Senator Bourne now occupies, and, furthermore, in the light of our experience in the past, it is doubtful if we would be able to land another Senator on the Appropriations Committee in the next half century.

We expect cooperation of all interests in developing and building up this State, and our purpose is single to that end, and we certainly wish the voters of the State of Oregon to know that we resent the belittling of our efforts by the publication of the cartoon at the head of this article.

GREATER VALUES IN REAPER, FLUXE AND VELVET HATS

TO REDECK APPROACH TO MORRISON BRIDGE

Orders were given Madison Welch by the county commissioners yesterday to start the work of redecking the west approach of the Morrison street bridge immediately. The order was issued on the representation that the bridge approach is badly worn and in a dangerous condition. Welch estimates that the work will cost \$2480.87.

Harry Bulger, who has been employed as a deputy sheriff, was appointed special agent by the commissioners, to investigate non-support cases and assist other county officers as directed. Mr. Bulger accepted the position, which carries with it a monthly salary of \$100. The appointment becomes effective November 1.

Owing to the approach of the wet season and the consequent lessening of auto speeding on the county roads the commissioners addressed a communication to the county motorcycle officer, L. H. Truesdell notifying him that his services will not be required after October 31.

'INSANE,' SAYS DOCTOR; 'SANE,' CRIES ANOTHER

Colfax, Wash., Oct. 22.—Two expert witnesses for the defense, Dr. Edwin Kimball of Spokane, and Dr. R. J. Skiffle of Colfax, testified that in their opinion George Wesley Brown and his wife, Minnie Brown, were both insane at the time they shot Al Nevees, father of Mrs. Brown, near Colfax September 15.

They state this insanity was only temporary, being brought on by a belief that they were not getting justice in court, and that they had been threatened with death, and that during an insane frenzy killed Nevees.

Dr. W. J. Howells, former superintendent of the insane asylum at Medical Lake, testified that in his opinion both Brown and his wife were sane and that they were determined to kill Nevees, having walked a long distance from Idaho to Colfax with all premeditation possible. In his opinion all testimony showed sanity and deliberate shooting.

TICKET VALIDATING FEE DUBBED PETTY GRAFT BY COMPLAINING ATTORNEY

Salem, Or., Oct. 23.—Alex Bernstein of Portland has complained to the state railroad commission against the alleged practice of railroad companies that sell round trip tickets from Portland to Chicago or Chicago to Portland, exacting a fee of 50 cents when the tickets are validated. He alleges that this fee is no part of the purchase price of the ticket and is a "petty graft." The commission is preparing to take the matter up with the Interstate Commerce commission.
