

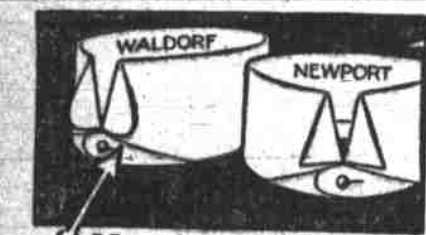
OREGON WOMEN URGE PENSIONS IN AID OF MOTHERS

\$1.50 for each additional child residing with her, is to be given if the bill becomes a law. This money is to be paid from the county of which the mother is a resident.

Mrs. J. E. Rand, Mrs. W. W. Williams, Mrs. C. W. Hayhurst, Mrs. C. J. Smith, and Mrs. R. E. Bondurant compose the committee which framed the bill. Mrs. Bondurant, chairman of the committee, presented the bill for indorsement this morning.

Discussion Is Warm.

A very lively discussion was started at the meeting concerning the abolishment of county school superintendents. The matter was first brought up by Mrs. G. R. Stevenson, who rose to the defense of the supervisors, saying that a county school superintendent could not do the work without assistants.

At this point Mrs. Herbert Armstrong of North Bend, Or., arose to her feet and with a quick retort said that in Coos and Curry counties, the work of the supervisors or inspectors had not been a success. She stated that the right kind of a county superintendent could easily do the required work and for \$1000 a year a capable man supervisor could not be gotten. That is why she wanted the office abolished.

"Well, if we can't get good men to do the work, let's get women and there will be no question," asserted another delegate. This remark brought forth a great deal of applause. An attempt was made to pass a motion to take up and thoroughly discuss the matter this afternoon, but it failed.

Oregon Babies Best.
The report of the various officers of the congress were given this morning, showing of the work accomplished in the past year. In giving the report of the Salem Eugenics exposition, Dr. Kittie P. Gray said that the results of the exhibition showed that the babies in Oregon were much larger and stronger than those of eastern states.

A diploma which had been presented by the Oregon Agricultural college to the Congress of Mothers, was shown this morning. This diploma had been presented for the work they had done in making the exposition a success.

Sessions will be held this afternoon, when practical demonstration talks will be given. The convention will close tonight with an address on "Child Welfare in the State," by Governor West. Several musical numbers are to be given. The public is invited to attend.

PERSIAN MINISTER A QUIET VISITOR IN CITY FOR 2 DAYS

Ali Kuli Khan, Representative of the Shah, Will Influence His Countrymen to Come to Oregon.

Ali Kuli Khan, the Persian minister to the United States, spent two days of quiet investigation in Portland and departed last night. So carefully did he shield himself from publicity that only a few knew of his presence.

He came, he said, to find what are the opportunities for establishing Persian colonies in Oregon. He went away saying that the similarity of the Oregon country to Persia made it a highly desirable place for settlement by his people. He intends to influence the Persians who come to this country hereafter to settle in the northwest. He has already established a Persian colony in California.

Also he will exert influence to attract the Persians who have settled in such congested centers of population in this country as New York, Chicago and Philadelphia. They do not do well there, he explained, because Persians are an agricultural people. They do not thrive in the big cities. They are affected as they are by the extreme heat of the south.

Climate Like Persia.

But northwestern Persia, along the Caspian sea, is similar in rainfall, forestation, products, climatic conditions, to the region west of the Cascade mountains. Much of Persia is a high plateau.

There irrigation has been practiced for centuries. There also are snow capped mountains. Teheran, the capital, is at an elevation of 6000 feet. This, in Persia, said the ambassador, is similar to eastern Oregon and Washington. His people, he predicted, can come from the highlands of Persia to the highlands of Oregon and do well. They can come from the vicinity of the Caspian sea and flourish in western Oregon. They are virile, strong people, who never become bald headed. They are industrious and efficient in tilling the soil.

Minister Ali Kuli Khan was the guest of honor at a luncheon given yesterday at the Commercial club by Guy Talbot. Other guests were William M. Ladd, J. C. Ainsworth, G. F. Johnson, C. C. Chapman. He charmed the business men with his mastery of English and facility of expression. He evinced complete familiarity with our men, our literature, our customs. His was an excellent English as that used by Woodrow Wilson.

Stands up for Shuster.

The Persian minister has an American wife. She has become famous because of her activity in movements for social uplift. She is said to have had an important influence over her husband. The stories of her work have been circulated throughout the world. Ali Kuli Khan, too, is the man who brought William Morgan Shuster from America to put the Persian empire on a business basis. He is loyal to Shuster today and believes that he did more to modernize the land of rugs than any other person or agency.

TOM LAWSON HERE? NO. CLARK "BUYS"

Thomas W. Lawson, Boston financier and writer, was in Portland yesterday, at least that is what Nas Clark, assistant manager of the Hotel Portland, believed until 10 o'clock this forenoon when he, by accident, learned that Clark had been worked on him. It left Clark quite breathless when he was informed that he had spent much of his good money on another Lawson, a T. A. Lawson of the traffic department of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, to be exact. He was speechless when he realized that he had introduced the self same Lawson to his friends as the man of frenzied finance fame, and all but collapsed when he re-read accounts of Lawson's visit, in a local newspaper, information he had given out.

And quite incidentally Manager George Kaufmann, who evolved and engineered the joke, aided and abetted by Lawson of Portland, gazes apprehensively behind him whenever he walks unfrequented hallways. He knows his assistant has been sore beset by twitting

friends, and Clark's friends are legion. Every time Clark "buys" he vows vengeance. And well he might. Last night he purchased several magazines containing articles written by Thomas Lawson, and midnight oil burned in the assistant manager's apartments while he labored to digest the written words of his hero.

Smiling and ready to congratulate his new found friend on his abilities as a writer, Clark breezed down this morning, and learned.

And now Clark, who gloried yesterday, today is "buying" and his manner is apologetic. "No more will I entertain 'financiers'."

BURNS TO GUARD COLONEL TONIGHT

Oyster Bay, N. Y., Oct. 30.—William J. Burns, the detective, took luncheon with Colonel Roosevelt today at Sagamore Hill. He will act as Roosevelt's

personal guard en route to New York and during his speech in Madison Square Garden tonight. The Progressives have engaged Burns to guard the former president when he visits the polls next Tuesday.

It was announced that Former District Attorney Jerome of New York has been retained to prosecute any persons accused of ballot frauds on Tuesday. Colonel Roosevelt said:

"We intend to prosecute all frauds to the limit. We will not tolerate any repetition of what took place at the spring primaries. Those attempting frauds must deal with the Burns detectives, and in Burns we have the best man

available to prevent illegal voting. "Instead of the old parties watching each other, as formerly, they are apt to work in concert. The question of Jerome's politics was not considered. We want the best prosecutor, so we got Jerome."

Colonel Roosevelt declared he "feels fine."

Democratic speakers will invade Brooklyn and Rose City Park tonight. Dr. Harry Lane, Tom Word and Judge M. G. Munly will make the principal addresses. The Democrats held two large meetings last night, one in Sellwood and the second in Irvington.

CHARTER AMENDMENT SUBMITTED TO THE VOTERS BY THE COUNCIL.
Shall the present Charter of the City of Portland be amended by providing for a commission form of government?
100 YES. AN ACT to amend and generally revise the City Charter by providing a commission form of government, vesting all legislative power in a Council consisting of a Mayor and four Commissioners, distributing the executive business among five departments, the Mayor or a Commissioner being at the head of each department, abolishing ward representation, providing that the Mayor, Commissioners and Auditor shall be elected, all other officers to be appointed.

CHARTER AMENDMENT SUBMITTED TO THE VOTERS BY THE COUNCIL.
Shall the Charter of the City of Portland be amended by adding thereto Section 429?
102 YES.
