

DECLARES MUNLY 'MAN OF THE HOUR'

Democratic Nominee for Congress, Able and Honest, Says Writer.

POLICE WORKING HARD TO DEFEAT MEASURE

With but one day left in which to explain thoroughly the necessity of voting no on number 127 on the special city election ballot tomorrow if the police department is to be kept under civil service, and out of the hands of politicians, every member of the department who has been able to secure even a half ration of sleep is working among the voters and distributing their cards.

With the mayor, who fathered the proposed amendment, conceding the defeat of the measure, the various commercial bodies throughout the city promising to defeat the amendment, the efforts are now being directed toward the education of the voters and the final class is in session today.

The feature of the fight is the fact that the ballot title reads in a manner that at a first glance it would appear that to vote to amend section 206 would be a vote to retain civil service, but that is not the case. The vote must be No, because the ballot title states that "all city employees shall be subject to the provisions of the civil service except the chief and all members of the police department."

The prediction is made that the measure will be defeated by a five to one majority, and it is conceded by those who favor the amendment that the majority of the votes cast in favor of the measure will be through a misapprehension.

May Charge Extra for Bread and Butter Hotel Men to Take Up Proposed Change



It begins to look as though the high cost of living is due for another jolt; that is, another jolt upward. This time it is the real staff of life, our daily bread and butter, that is threatened.

Some time ago the owners of the larger hotels in the city of New York decided that they should charge 10 cents extra for the bread and butter served with meals. Having no other recourse unless they cut bread and butter from their daily food allowance, the New York hotel and restaurant livers paid the extra dime without more than passing protest.

The idea spread to the west, as do most things that originate in New York. Chicago took the matter up, then Kansas City, and now the Pacific coast has been infected.

In favor of increase. Los Angeles hotel men have taken the initiative and declared themselves in favor of the increase. At the Alexandria, Ind., the management claiming that the new plan will mean to them an increase in revenue of nearly \$30,000 a year.

The question of the extra charge in hotel dining rooms in Portland will be brought up for discussion at the next meeting of the Oregon Hotel Men's association. Thought not all local managers are in favor of the bread and butter tariff, it is probable that if one of them sets the pace the others will fall into line.

Phil Matschan Jr., president of the Oregon Hotel Men's association, does not favor the bread "tax." "Hotels in Portland do not make or break themselves on their dining room business," said Mr. Matschan. "The proposition of charging extra for bread and butter served with meals has never been considered by the hotel men in Portland, and I do not know that it will be."

One Has Different View. "There are only two or three hotels in the city that have enough dining room patronage to speak of, and I believe they are not worrying about the bread and butter that is being consumed with the meals served."

H. C. Bowers, manager of the Multnomah hotel, has a different idea of the proposition. "Certainly we are swinging around towards the extra charge for bread and butter," he said. "They are doing it all through the east and we will do the same out here. It is necessary considering the high price of butter and of flour. I shall bring the matter up at the next meeting of the Hotel Men's association. It is a proposition that is coming, but no one has had the initiative to push it. With the prevailing high price of flour and butter, bread and butter portion of a man's meal often amounts to as much in the kitchen as the rest of his service."

M. K. MacRae, resident manager of the Oregon hotel, is of much the same opinion and will favor making the additional charge.

"It is much the same proposition as the buttons on your coat. You pay something for the buttons when you buy the coat, and when you buy a meal you should pay for what goes with it."

Opposed to Plan. "No, decidedly no, so far as this hotel is concerned," said G. J. Kaufmann, manager of the Portland hotel, when asked if he was considering the bread and butter additional cost feature. "They may be doing it in the east and in Los Angeles," said Mr. Kaufmann, "but the Portland hotel will not charge additional for the bread and butter consumed by its patrons at their meals. There's nothing to it."

The Hotel Men's association will meet one day next month and will probably consider the proposition at that time.

EASTERN BREEDER WILL SHOW FINE GUERNSEYS

M. S. Tichenor, a well known breeder of Guernsey cattle at Oconomowoc, Wis., has telegraphed O. M. Plummer, general manager of the Pacific International Dairy show, this week that he will enter two carloads of his finest winners. This will be good news for breeders of that variety of stock on the coast who have been hoping for just such competition.

That the climate of the west coast is splendidly adapted to dairying, the coming show will no doubt demonstrate. It is expected that the bringing together of eastern and western herds will undoubtedly cause many eastern breeders to look to the west for their herd heads and foundation stock. Oregon and Washington breeders of cattle have gone to the big eastern shows, and their stock has proven a revelation to old time breeders.

GEO. F. WILLIAMS FOR SINGLE TAX

Democratic Leader Says It Easily Can Be Discarded if a Failure.

Asserting that the Oregon system would enable Oregon to discard single tax if it proved unsatisfactory, George F. Williams, Massachusetts Democratic leader who is stumping the state in the interest of the national candidate, is out today with a statement that he is a firm believer in single tax.

Mr. Williams was the Democratic gubernatorial nominee three times in Massachusetts and once represented the Bay State in congress. Regarding single tax, he said:

"Oregon has made itself famous in American annals by first putting into practice the initiative and referendum; it has a like opportunity to put the single tax to the test. It can do so safely because it has the power to immediately discard the system if it proves unsatisfactory. It is most remarkable that the vested interests of this country have been able to control every legislature in the country so that this tax system could not even be tried in a county or municipality; the people of Oregon have, however, opened the way to a trial. There is but one answer to the question why the forces of wealth, which have regulated our tax systems, are not willing even to have the single tax go to the experimental stage."

"The only answer is that they do not dare to allow a trial. If their arguments against it are true, they should have the opportunity to kill the agitation once and for all by securing a trial and demonstrating its failure. That they will not do so is a short answer to their objections. One county in Oregon will furnish the test. I trust the people will open the way for a fair trial of this much mooted proposition. I am of the opinion that such a trial would satisfy the entire country of the truth, justice, practicability and material advantage of the single tax."
