

HEAVY RAINS IN CALIFORNIA ARE AID TO ROOSEVELT

Northern Part Storm-Swept, Keeping Wilson Voters at Home; South, Strong for Colonel, Casts Big Vote.

San Francisco, Cal., Nov. 5.—"Roosevelt luck" brought general rains in northern California, where Woodrow Wilson, Democratic presidential nominee, was expected to poll his heaviest vote today, and prevented hundreds of voters, particularly in the country districts, from going to the polls.

Los Angeles for Roosevelt. Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 5.—Reports from 10 outlying precincts indicated that at 10 o'clock this morning 50 per cent of the entire vote had been cast.

Early Voting in San Diego. San Diego, Cal., Nov. 5.—Fine weather today brought out a tremendous early vote here. In several precincts nearly one quarter of the registered voters appeared during the first three hours.

Sacramento Has Rain. Sacramento, Cal., Nov. 5.—A drizzling rain is blamed for a light early morning vote here.

vote here. At 10 o'clock less than 25 per cent of the registered vote had been cast. The fact that the Southern Pacific shops, employing nearly 3000 men did not close today, as has been the custom on election day, is likely to cause a rush to the polling places between 5 and 6 o'clock this evening.

Light Vote in Oakland. Oakland, Cal., Nov. 5.—Overhanging clouds and a light rain marked election day here and the early vote was considerably lighter than had been expected. Interest centered outside of the presidential contest, in the congressional fight between Congressman J. R. Knowland, incumbent, and J. Stitt Wilson, Socialist mayor of Berkeley.
