

SAY HARVESTER AGENT IS THIEF

Wallace J. Poland, Pacific Coast Representative, Arrested.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Nov. 5.—Wallace J. Poland, Pacific coast agent for the International Harvester company of America, was taken into custody here by a detective agency on a warrant charging embezzlement of \$1500 on October 2. That the total defalcation of the accused man will reach \$34,000 is the report made to the police by the complaining witness, Aubrey S. Ambrose, the traveling auditor of the harvester trust. The complaint was sworn to before Police Judge Weller and Poland's bail fixed at \$50,000 bond or \$25,000 cash.

Poland has not been turned over to the police as yet, but will be lodged at the city prison late this afternoon, it is believed. Poland is said to have squandered the money in the operation of a Modesto theatre and the St. Regis saloon of this city.

DETECTIVE, HASTY WITH GUN, PUT UNDER ARREST

LABORERS' BLOOD SAVES WOMAN

President Arthur's Daughter, Victim of Anaemia, Secures Transfusion of Blood.

New York, N. Y., Nov. 5.—Mrs. Charles Pinkerton, only daughter of former President Chester Arthur, it became known today, was saved from almost certain death last week by a blood transfusion operation, which was performed at the Pinkerton's home at Mount Kisco, N. Y.

Mrs. Pinkerton had long been a sufferer from anaemia. It was decided two weeks ago that only blood transfusion could save her. Two laborers were selected from many volunteers. The operation was a complete success and the condition of the patient is reported as satisfactory. Mrs. Pinkerton before her marriage in 1903 was Miss Ellen Herndon Arthur. Her mother was a member of the Herndon family of Virginia, which was noted for the beauty of its women.

"MY LAST DRINK," SAYS SPORALSKY TO OLD WIFE

The funeral was held today and interment made in the Aurora cemetery.
