

JOURNAL ELECTION BULLETIN SERVICE PLEASES CROWD

Five Minutes After Polls Close in East Results Are Flashing; Signal Lights Beam From Council Crest.

Ten thousand people braved the steady downpour last night to come to the business district and receive the election news. Of these, 6000 apparently, gathered in front of The Journal's two screens and stood for the three and one half hours from the bulletins were flashed. Viewed from above, it was a sea of umbrellas.

The polls in the eastern states closed at 4 o'clock, western time. Five minutes later, The Journal had bulletins up, announcing results from the smaller towns in Massachusetts and in less than half an hour, positive statements had come from several of the far eastern states that Wilson had won by an overwhelmingly majority.

The crowds were singularly undemonstrative. It seemed that the vast majority took Wilson's election as a foregone conclusion and the only thing that interested them was how much of a majority he had made. Down in the crowd, one would hear individuals reading the bulletins as they were flashed, but there was little comment. Occasionally a cheer would go up as a report of smashing gains in doubtful states was made, but these cheers came from a few.

Interest locally centered in the senatorial race, the sheriff contest and the two propositions, suffrage and sales tax. It was these things that kept the crowds up town as the mere figures showing the president-elect's majority began to grow monotonous. The entire lack of doubt after the first few bulletins made the readers apathetic.

Great interest was shown in the flashes of the big search light on Council Crest. Beginning shortly after 8 o'clock, the steady swing of the brilliant ray of light across the dark, low hanging clouds, announced the election of Wilson to thousands of Journal readers, south, north and east of the city who were unable to get to the city to hear the returns. The flash was visible as far east as Troutdale and Gresham, as far south as Oregon City and to remote corners of Clark county Washington. As one of several novel means taken to show how the presidential race was progressing, it was by far the most effective.

DYNAMITE TRIAL RESUMES ITS COURSE

Indianapolis, Ind., Nov. 6.—The dynamite conspiracy trial, after halting one day to allow the jurors to vote, was resumed today with the reading of more letters alleged by the government to have been written by the defendants to John J. McNamara and Frank M. Ryan. No letters that District Attorney Miller did not refer to in his opening statement were read.

EQUAL SUFFRAGE WINS IN FOUR OUT OF FIVE STATES

Arizona, Oregon, Kansas and Michigan Put Stamp of Approval — Wisconsin Will Have None of It.

(United Press Leased Wire.) New York, Nov. 6.—Advocates of woman suffrage were delirious with joy today. Four out of five states carried yesterday for the amendments, striking the word "male" out of the state constitutions, was considered sufficient cause and it was stated that Saturday's night parade up fashionable Fifth avenue, to be participated in by thousands of men and women, representing every state in the union, would be a record breaker.

One state—Wisconsin—rejected suffrage yesterday. Four approved—Arizona, Oregon, Kansas and Michigan—bringing the total of states where women have all the rights of men up to 10. It was agreed by the leaders that the real reason for the defeat of the suffrage amendment in Wisconsin was the fight made against the Socialists, who made suffrage a preferred cause.

In addition, it was opposed by the liquor interests.

Detroit, Mich., Nov. 6.—For the first time in the count the vote on the woman suffrage amendment showed against votes for women this afternoon. Upwards of 400 precincts in the state voted against.

Yes 51,916; no, 52,163. The suffragists were still confident of victory on later returns.

BUCKSHOT CHARGE IN SIDE; AGED MAN COOL

Ishpeming, Mich., Nov. 6.—For a case of nerve and grit, Ishpeming furnishes an example hard to beat. August Nault, 70 years of age, residing at the Lake Angeline location, was hunting 15 miles from the city. He had traveled three miles from his camp, when his shotgun was accidentally discharged by striking a tree. He received the charge of buckshot in his left side, making a hole that a man's fist would fit into. One bone was shattered and one of the shot penetrated his left arm. Nault walked back to camp, hobbled up his horse and drove to town. When he arrived he unhitched and fed the animal, and then entered the house and calmly informed the members of his family that he had been shot. He was alone from the time of the accident until he reached home. Dr. H. Vandewater was summoned from the hospital, and, after working for some time, he succeeded in removing seven buckshot and a heap of gun wads. The doctor was astounded at the man's nerve, and stated that the case was remarkable. The next morning Nault was sitting up in bed smoking a pipe when the physician called to see him. His speedy recovery is expected, notwithstanding his age.

CUMMINS SWINGS MANY VOTES IN IOWA TO WILSON

Lead of Roosevelt Last Night Is Apparently Overcome by Later Returns Favorable to Democratic Candidate.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Des Moines, Iowa, Nov. 6.—Wilson appears to be ahead of Roosevelt in Iowa from 2000 to 4000, according to returns early today, although late returns last night give the state to Roosevelt by about 15,000. Northern Iowa went for Roosevelt, but later returns from "the reservation," the standpoint territory in southern Iowa, showed that many Republicans had voted for Wilson, placing him in the lead. Only 600 precincts have been heard from and the result is not certain. These precincts give Taft 31,246; Wilson, 48,542; Roosevelt, 47,561. Republicans generally took Senator J. B. Cummins' advice and voted a Republican state ticket in preference to the Bull Moose ticket and as a result George W. Clarke, Republican, is elected over Dunn, Democrat, and Stevens, Progressive. Clarke will leave from 15,000 to 20,000 plurality, although the Democrats will not yet admit Dunn's defeat. The legislature is probably Republican by 15 on joint ballot, insuring Kenyon's reelection.

For congress all the Republicans have won except in the Second district where Pepper, Democrat, won without opposition; Third, where Hickett may be defeated by Connolly; the Fifth, where Huber, Democrat, made a hard fight, and the Sixth, where Saint Kirkpatrick has apparently defeated McCord, who took the Republican nomination when Nate Kendall withdrew.

DEFEATED BULL MOOSE LEADERS GO BACK TO WORK

Roosevelt to the "Outlook" Office; Johnson to Democratic California; Dixon Goes to Montana.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Oyster Bay, N. Y., Nov. 6.—Colonel Roosevelt again took up the cudgels today and laid plans for the continuance of his fight. The colonel seemed much encouraged by the fact that the Progressives had run second. But the sting of defeat was noticeable in the manner of the Bull Moose leader. Roosevelt dictated letters and telegrams all morning. He announced that on Friday he would go to New York for work at "The Outlook" office.

The colonel is preparing to continue his attack on E. H. Root and the lawyers who criticized his stand on the court of appeals question. Bull Moose leaders held a war council at Progressive national headquarters today and then sent Governor Johnson of California, defeated candidate for vice president, and Clifford Pinchot, to see Colonel Roosevelt at Oyster Bay. Senator Dixon, national chairman, and George W. Perkins attended the conference. Governor Johnson today declined further comment on the returns.

"I am going back to California to go to work," he said. He plans to return from Oyster Bay this afternoon and leave for the coast at 4 o'clock.

Despite defeat, Senator Dixon fairly oozed optimism and enthusiasm today.

LARGER LEAD PENCILS FOR SCHOOL CHILDREN

Milwaukee, Nov. 6.—The bigger lead pencils for school children—put in use about a month ago—has improved handwriting greatly. Teachers, principals and superintendent are of one mind in making this statement. The writing with the larger pencil is more legible, and can be done with greater speed. Employers had complained to school directors, and to Superintendent Pearce, of the cramped, indistinct writing of high school graduates. The directors cogitated, but could not devise a system that would improve conditions. The suggestion came that the fault might lie with the pencil. An experiment with a bigger pencil, three-eighths of an inch thick, was made and the improvement in the general writing was immediate and noticeable.

"The larger pencils are a decided success," said Superintendent Pearce. "It affords a better grip in the hands of the children, and also in the grown-ups. I have become so attached to the big pencil that I have discarded the small kind. The lead in these new pencils is much tougher than in the former smaller pencil, so that if a child drops it there is less danger of breaking."

"While the big pencils cost twice as much as the former size, the work obtained is more than double the service realized from the old-style pencil."

WILSON CARRIES CALIFORNIA BY A LARGE PLURALITY

Big Democratic Vote in the North Is More Than Offsetting Expected Roosevelt Strength in Los Angeles.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Nov. 6.—That Wilson has carried California by 16,000 to 15,000 is indicated by the latest returns, and if the Roosevelt vote in the south continues to shrink, there is a possibility that the Democratic plurality will be more than 15,000.

Chalmers Davis of the Democratic State committee is strongly of this opinion, and as he was inclined on Tuesday night to claim the state by 20,000, even while Los Angeles' showing was far better than it is today, his estimate is considered conservative. Definite figures are not expected before tonight or tomorrow.

The surprisingly large Wilson vote in San Francisco, added by the Wilson pluralities in San Diego and Fresno counties, with a few of the smaller counties not previously counted upon by the Democrats, were responsible for the turning down of the Roosevelt electors.

With 105,232 votes cast in San Francisco, complete returns show that Wilson carried the city over Roosevelt by more than 10,000 votes. The vote on president was:

Wilson, 49,021; Roosevelt, 38,624; Debs, 13,415; Chaffin, 1141.

For congress—Julius Kahn, Republican incumbent in the fourth district, defeated Bert Schleicher, Democrat, 2,542, to 14,895. Norman Pendleton, Socialist, received 5191 votes. In the fifth district, John L. Nolan, secretary of the San Francisco labor council and member of the executive board of the International Molders' union, running as a Progressive Republican, defeated S. V. Costello, Democrat, 27,908 to 18,566; Ernest L. Reguin, Socialist, polled 6722.

The four incumbent superior judges—Graham, Coffey, Mogan and Lawlor—are reelected. Indications throughout the state today are that Governor Hiram Johnson will retain a friendly legislature, complete returns from San Francisco showing six of the eight Republican assemblymen elected in the Progressive column. Five Democratic assemblymen go to Sacramento this year. Three of the eight Republicans are reelected incumbents who have already aided Governor Johnson in putting through his Progressive legislation.

Cut Roosevelt Plurality.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Los Angeles, Nov. 6.—Three hundred and forty-four complete precincts in Los Angeles county give Roosevelt 30,493; Wilson 24,785; Debs 10,460; Chaffin, 2064; Taft, 890. This is a gain for Roosevelt over the earlier returns.

The race between Bell, Republican, and Ralph Criswell, Socialist, for congress in the Ninth district is attracting great interest. Bell has a slight lead, but the country is very incomplete. Incomplete returns indicate that the racetrack gambling bill has been defeated in Los Angeles, 2 to 1. The free textbook amendment won a sweeping majority.

Kent Is Re-elected.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Nov. 6.—Belated returns received here today from Humboldt county indicate that William Kent, Independent Progressive, has been re-elected to congress in the First district. Until these returns were received the result remained in doubt, Kent and Judge Zumwalt, Democrat, running neck and neck.

Knowland Defeats J. S. Wilson.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Oakland, Cal., Nov. 6.—Returns from 254 precincts out of 257 in Alameda county, show that Congressman Joseph R. Knowland defeated J. Still Wilson, the Socialist mayor of Berkeley, for congress by a vote of 28,010 to 20,604. It is estimated that Knowland's majority over Wilson will be about 8000.

Santa Barbara Is Progressive.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Santa Barbara, Cal., Nov. 6.—Santa Barbara county, practically complete, gives Roosevelt 6100 plurality in a normally Republican county. All amendments were defeated, according to incomplete returns.

Wilson Leads in Shasta.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Redding, Cal., Nov. 6.—Thirty precincts in Shasta county, according to returns received today, give Wilson 1420, Roosevelt 1126, Debs 356. For congress, John E. Baker, Democratic incumbent, is accredited with 1658 votes and Rutherford 558.

THIRTEEN BOY BANDITS CAUGHT AS THEY FEAST

New York, Nov. 6.—When the nine boys who compose the Polson Oak baseball team won a victory of 87 to 2 over the Rough-on-Rats last Saturday they decided that the event should be commemorated by a banquet. A committee of three was appointed to supply the provisions, and the feast was set for 3 o'clock yesterday in a cave in a vacant lot at One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street and the Southern boulevard.

"You got 'Matty' wiped off the boards," said Vincent Lorelio, 10 years old, of 515 One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, as he passed a lot of pears, bananas and apples to the pitcher of the team, James Walsh. "These were the best we could get for this here banquet, but you and Tommy Carrigan, the greatest catcher in town, should have the finest in the land."

As he finished he was startled by the appearance of two pairs of arms wriggling into the entrance of the cave, and the next instant two detectives knelt before them. After questioning the boys the intruders arrested three, charged with stealing \$15 worth of fruit from Iradore Friedman of 534 East One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street.

Vincent Lorelio was the first one taken into custody. He protested that his brother Thomas, 12 years old, had not taken part in the robbery, but implicated Theodore Ore, 9 years old, of 514 East One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street. Theodore declared that Vincent was trying to protect his brother, and said that the three of them had broken into the fruit stand with an ax on Sunday.

There were 13 boys in the cave, but the other 10 were permitted to go. The three lads under arrest will be arraigned in the children's court.

VICTOR L. BERGER DOWN TO DEFEAT

Milwaukee's Socialist Congressman Beaten by 2000; Gains Made at Large.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Milwaukee, Wis., Nov. 6.—Although the Socialist party ticket vote showed a general increase throughout the country, the Socialist cause locally received a setback in the defeat of Victor L. Berger for reelection to congress by about 2000.

In Schenectady, N. Y., another Socialist stronghold, practically all of the present officeholders of that party were defeated for reelection.

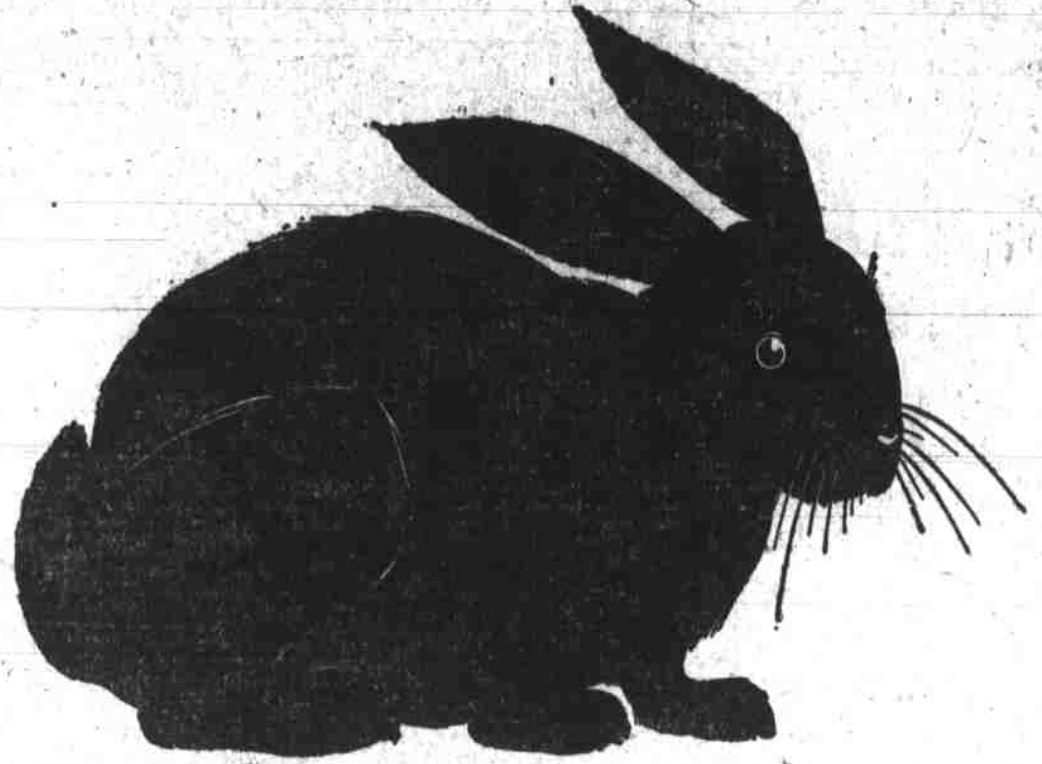
