

# GLOOM ENVELOPS U. OF O. AT FATE OF MILLAGE BILL

## Hope Falls as Returns Indicate Defeat of Important Measure; Anticipated Festivities Abandoned.

University of Oregon, Eugene, Or., Nov. 7.—A huge rally and student demonstrations which were expected to occur last evening upon arrival of news that the university millage bill had passed did not take place. Instead of a general turning loose of student enthusiasm, to relieve feelings pent up during the past two years while the university has been handicapped for lack of support, a sentiment of depression existed from the fear that the measure had not carried. The situation has been very tense and college work has been more or less demoralized. Yesterday afternoon a report was received giving a very slight majority for the bill in the totals from a number of incomplete county returns. The news spread about the campus like wild fire. An extra of the college paper was rushed into print and a rally was ordered. Later reports, however, checked the appearance of the paper, and subdued the rally enthusiasm. It was realized that if the measure passed it would be by a

very narrow margin, and many despaired its passage.  
The matter is quite serious to the college, for the classes have been crowded and hampered by lack of actual lecture room and apparatus, but existed with the hope that this election would furnish relief. The university has far outgrown its present support, and what the actual result of the loss of this measure will be is problematical.  
One group of boys, petitioning for a national fraternity chapter, have their chapter at stake, for the national organization realizes that with ample support Oregon will become a great western institution; without it, they do not care to establish themselves here.  
The sentiment of student depression was amply illustrated by the sob of one co-ed, who was heard to mourn over the returns. Her father is a candidate on the state ticket.  
"Papa got left out, they say; the millage bill failed, and I don't even know that woman suffrage carried. What's the use, anyway?"

### Linn Retires Ancient Sheriff.

Albany, Or., Nov. 7.—With complete returns now in from 24 out of 34 precincts, Linn county shows nearly as many votes for Wilson as for Taft and Roosevelt combined. Roosevelt leads Taft slightly.  
Lane, for senator, carried the county heavily, with Seiling next and Bourne a weak third.  
Locally the principal fight was on the wet and dry question, for the city of Albany and on the office of sheriff for the county. Albany has gone dry by a good majority and Bodine has a safe lead for sheriff. D. S. Smith, the present sheriff, has held the office for six years past, and with previous terms and deputyships, has been connected with the place for 30 years. He is a Democrat.

Owing to the large ballot and the fact that many of the city precincts have unusually large registrations, the counting has been slow and results are still dribbling in from all quarters. In many places the counting of the votes on the different measures was left until after all the votes on offices had been counted; consequently few figures are available yet on the measures. From the returns that are now in, however, it is believed that the equal suffrage measure lost in this county by a small margin. Most of the other measures were lost, but by heavier majorities. The majority rule amendment, the single tax measure and that to abolish capital punishment have been snuffed under, according to present returns.

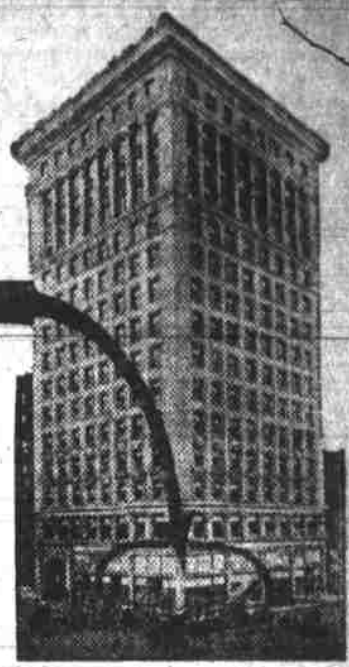
