

WILL POSTPONE DARROW TRIAL

**Illness of Earl Rogers Induces
District Attorney to Agree
to Another Delay.**

(United Press Special Wire.)
Los Angeles, Nov. 12.—The trial of Clarence S. Darrow on a charge of corrupting Juror Robert F. Bain in the McNamara trial, is indicated today in the attitude of District Attorney John D. Fredericks. The second trial of Darrow is now set for November 25, and the district attorney, while stating that it is his present intention to try Darrow, is willing to grant another postponement on account of the illness of Earl Rogers, defense counsel, who is in a sanitarium.

At present Darrow has retained no counsel to defend him, should the case be postponed. It is believed that Rogers will again be of counsel for Darrow, who is reported to be financially embarrassed through the expense incurred in the first trial. Darrow, himself will do much of the active court work.

MANY DEMOCRATS ARE OUT FOR PLUMS

When President Wilson starts to consider candidates for United States district attorney in Oregon, the applications presented to him will include those of Bert E. Haney, chairman of the Democratic state committee, and Claude C. McCulloch, state senator from Baker county.

For the place of United States marshal, to take the place of Leslie M. Scott, the active candidates will include County Judge R. B. Beattie of Oregon City, W. H. Canon, mayor of Medford, and Claude C. Covey, formerly of Warm Springs, now of Portland.

Milton A. Miller of Lebanon is an aspirant for collector of customs, and E. Versteeg of Portland, would like to be appointed to the post. For the postmaster at Portland the names under discussion include Alex. Sweet, former chairman of the state committee, and N. A. Ambrose, for 26 years in the railway mail service.

John W. Ferguson, state insurance commissioner and secretary of the state committee, who has also been talked about for postmaster, has informed friends here that he is not a candidate and will not be. The same is true of Gilbert L. Hedges of Oregon City, who has been mentioned as a candidate for district attorney, but has stated that he will not seek the place.

1913 ROSE SHOW TO BE FESTIVAL FEATURE

An important meeting of the executive committee of the Portland Rose society was held yesterday afternoon, the new president of the society, J. A. Curry, presiding.

One of the most interesting matters of business was the final decision on the date for holding the 1913 show. It will be held Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, June 9, 10 and 11, the first three days of Rose Festival week. This year it was decided to make the show the opening feature of the festival week.

The king of the festival will journey to the city hall, where the keys of the city will be turned over to him, and he will then go to the armory, where the show will be held, and will formally open it with suitable ceremonies. Plans are being made to make the show the most elaborate in the history of the city of Portland, and that is saying a great deal, for the shows of past years have been of a very high standard.

LIMITED TRAIN WILL MAKE LOCAL STOPS

Commencing today the Forest Grove limited will again make stops along the line for local traffic, the new arrangement having met with considerable opposition from patrons at stations this side of Forest Grove. The train will be operated on the same schedule as before the train was made a limited. This will give the service of two trains each morning and evening instead of one for those who work in the city.

President J. H. Young of the Oregon Electric stated this morning that the Forest Grove limited was inaugurated a few weeks ago in response to requests for quicker through service, but it appeared that a great many people living along the line found the new arrangement inconvenient, and so the company will return to the old service.

The complaint voiced by the people along the line was that if they missed the first local train in the morning they would have to wait two hours for the next local, while the limited passed only 45 minutes after the first local.

CITY WARRANT BROKER HOLDS SACK FOR \$5000

Mose Block, a salary warrant broker who has long since become a familiar figure around the county court house, may have to hustle some to get rid of the latest batch of warrants, he has had assigned to him by clerks and judges of the recent municipal election. In purchasing about \$5000 worth of these salary warrants, Block forgot there is a city ordinance prohibiting city employees from assigning their salaries.

City Auditor Barbur says he cannot recognize the assignments held by Mr. Block. As the officials who signed their warrants have already gotten their money, they will be in no hurry to accommodate Mose by putting in an appearance at the city hall to cash the warrants for him.

SIX MONTHS FOR AIDING YOUNG GIRL TO FALL

Six months in the county jail was the sentence imposed upon Ethel Julian by Circuit Judge Kavanaugh for contributing to the delinquency of a 15-year-old girl. Mrs. Julian was found guilty several days ago. It was shown by the evidence that Mrs. Julian invited young men to her home to see the girl. L. L. Willis, one of the young men, pleaded guilty to a similar charge and turned state's evidence.

Naturalization Day.
Tomorrow is to be naturalization day in the circuit court before Judge Morley. Henry B. Harnard, United States naturalization examiner from Seattle, will conduct the examinations. There are 100 applications to be heard.

FUNERAL OF PIONEER CAPTAIN IS HELD

The funeral of the late Captain John G. Pearson, master of the Elkader, who was killed Sunday morning by a fall from the upper to the lower dock at Inman-Poulsen mill, was held this morning at 10 o'clock from his late home, 473 Ellsworth street. The services at the grave were conducted by Multnomah camp No. 77, Woodmen of the World, of which order he was a member.

Captain Pearson was a very well known stevedore man, as he had been for the past 15 years a navigator on the Columbia and Willamette rivers. For the past eight years he had been master of the Elkader. Death overtook him as he was making repairs on his boat, which sank last Saturday. He was 46 years of age, and a native of Scotland, and came to this country when a boy. A widow survives him.

JOHNSON WANTS TO ESCAPE FROM U. S.

Washington, Nov. 12.—The United States supreme court will not interfere with the exactions imposed by Federal Judge K. M. Landis of Chicago regarding bail money for Jack Johnson, negro heavyweight champion, held on a negro slavery charge. If the recommendations of Solicitor General Bullitt are respected, Attorney Bachrach of Chicago, representing Johnson, filed a motion asking that the amount be reduced. In submitting his brief today to the court, Bullitt practically charged that Johnson wants his release on bail so he can flee the country to escape prosecution. In opposing the motion for a reduction of bail the solicitor general said:

"The administration of criminal law would be brought into disrepute if one committing such an infamous crime as the one Johnson is indicted for could, by forfeiting a considerable sum, escape to a place where he would be free from further prosecution."

Bullitt also quoted a telegram from United States District Attorney Wilkerson at Chicago, which said Johnson did not deny his intention to leave the country November 26.

WESTERLUND OUT FOR SPEAKER OF HOUSE

J. A. Westerlund of Jackson county is a candidate for speaker of the next house of representatives at Salem, and is asking southern Oregon members to stand behind him in the coming fracas. He was a member of the last house, in which he was chairman of the committee on horticulture and took particular interest in road legislation. He is a Republican of the progressive type.

Two Hurt by Falling Limb.

Centralia, Wash., Nov. 12.—Ed Mauer and Art Bowen, two loggers, were badly injured at the F. A. Soule camp in Frances Monday, when a limb of a tree which they were falling dropped, striking Mauer on the head and almost tearing Bowen's arm from his shoulder. Mauer was brought to a Centralia hospital, where a surgical examination revealed the fact that the man's skull was fractured. Bowen was taken to a Raymond hospital.

HOTEL AT YAMHILL YIELDS TO FLAMES

**Loss Is Nearly \$10,000 on the
Royal, 40 Rooms, and
Built in 1902.**

Yamhill, Or., Nov. 12.—The Royal hotel, a three story wooden structure, was burned about midnight last night, causing nearly \$10,000 loss, partially insurance covered. The hotel was owned and operated by Otto Doeltz, who came here from Portland about six months ago, was built in 1902 and contained about 40 rooms.

The fire began in the basement, it is believed, from a defective furnace, and quickly followed the hot air flues to the top of the building. The outside walls were kept intact by utmost effort, and had they gone down, the entire business section of the town might have been burned. The work of the local fire squad was unusually good. Men stood on the top story with the fire leaping around them, to get water in play. Some of the hotel occupants were badly frightened, one woman going into hysterics, but there were no injuries.

Funeral services for John R. Hulford, the young ballist in Judge Gates' department of the circuit court, whose death occurred early Tuesday morning, will be held at 1:30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon, at the East Side funeral directors parlors, East Sixth and Alder streets. The services will be under the auspices of Scout Young camp No. 2, Spanish-American War Veterans, and Rev. W. S. Gilbert of Astoria, chaplain of the Second Oregon Volunteers, a regiment that went to the Philippines, will be in charge. Hulford's death was caused by trauma, contracted during a long service in the islands when conditions were unsanitary. Burial will be in the Spanish-American Veterans' plot in Riverview cemetery.

Blind Woman Dies in Fire.

afternoon, lost her life because of blindness. She was unable to find her way to safety. Relatives this morning declared she was alone in the house when the fire started.

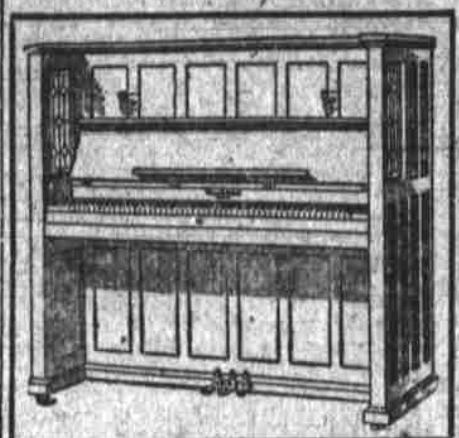


MEN PAY FEES BUT FAIL TO GET JOBS

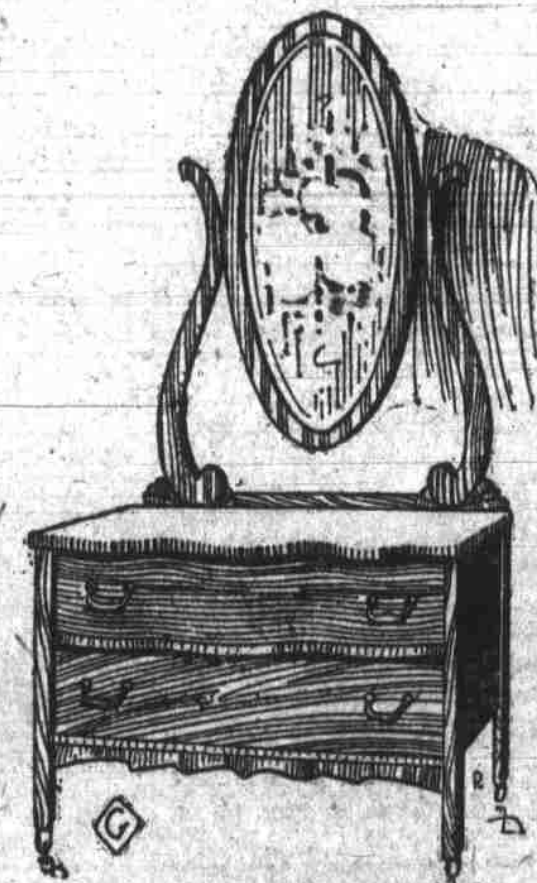
