WILES SEES GREAT FUTURE FOR MOTOR

Portlander Appointed to Committee to Confer With Lipton at Frisco.

"Power boat racing along the Pacific coast will be as important a sport almost as the annual international championships and will measure up equally with the middle states championships," said Elwood Wiles yesterday. Mr. Wiles, who was elected vice commodore of the Pacific International Power Boat association at Tacoma the other day, will leave Sunday night along with Miller Freeman, editor of the Pacific Motor Boat, and Sam Perkins, editor of the Tacoma Ledger, for San Francisco, where they will confer with the California Motor Boat club relative to the big motor boat and yacht regatta during the 1915 exposition.

If the Harmsworth trophy, emblematic of the world's championships, is brought back from England next year, it very likely will be defended in California. Fred Burnham of New York, who visited here several weeks ago, stated that the New York association would be glad to let the races come west. Burnham will have a boat in the races in England next summer.

Lipton Will Help. Sir Thomas Lipton, the Irish yachtsman, who says he is ready to challenge for the America cup again, and who will be the guest of Portland Friday, will also meet with the Californians next week in an endeavor to assist in the starting of the 1915 regatta.

While at Tacoma the North Pacific club adopted the ruling of the Motor Boat club of America and Royal Motor and Yacht club of England, which prohibits the entry of any boat in a race if the power is not submerged. This will cut out aerial freaks.

In addition to honoring Wiles with an office, the Tacoma meeting also elected George S. Shepherd as a member of the council. Mr. Judd of Astoria is another council member.

Manager Pratt Will Use Two Full Sets of Backfielders Saturday.

Manager Martin Pratt is planning to give the Multnomah team a strong try-out in the game against the Columbia club eleven Saturday afternoon, November 23, on the Multnomah grounds.

Pratt will use two full sets of backfielders in the game with possibly one exception. All of his line players will be given a chance to show what they will be able to do in the way of breaking up opponents' plays.

Pratt will start Huriburt, Clark and Wolff in the backfield. Later Borleske will replace Wolff and Keck will replace Huriburt. Reinhardt will start the game at the quarterback position and "Sap" Latourette will run the team in the second half.

Hickson, Ludlum, Smith, Montague and probably Keck will play the end positions. Keck also will handle forward passes making him a very valuable end player.

Conville, O'Rourke and Wascher will play the tackle positions and Notestiner, Rodgers and Carlson will be the guards. Cherry will play center and Carlson may be given a chance at the same position.

The other team players, who have been showing up for practice regularly will likely be put in the game.

Manager Pratt wants to get the strongest team possible to send against the University of Oregon team, which plays here Thanksgiving day, November 28. The team will practice tomorrow night and Sunday morning. Tuesday and Thursday evenings and Sunday morning will be practice nights of next week. After that the team will likely practice each night until the big game on Thursday.

The Oregon team is rated as the heaviest in the conference and Pratt expects a very hard game from Coach Pinkham's eleven this season.

The addition of Latourette, Borleske and Hickson to the club team makes it look much more favorable for the club's chances of a victory.

WEIGHTS FOR NEXT CLUB MEET NAMED

Multnomah Will Select Pair of Boxers From Four Huskies.

The weights for the Vancouver-Multnomah interclub meet, which will be held in Vancouver, B. C., December 6, have been selected. The weights are 135 and 145 pound wrestling, and 185 and 195 pound boxing.

In the 135 pound boxing class, Multnomah will send either Fireman Knowlton or Billy Eymann. Vancouver has several lightweights, but will choose either Hammon or Wardnough.

Doolling or Derbyshire will likely be selected to represent the winged "M" club in the middleweight boxing. Derbyshire got the decision over Doolling in the Portland-Spokane smoker.

The wrestling aspirants in the 135 and 145 classes are numerous, and try-outs will likely be held the last week of this month.
