Brief Items of Tuesday's Late News

Short Stories of World Happenings Not Received in Time for Yesterday's Issue of The Journal.

Political.

President Taft said Tuesday that he planned to fill all vacancies occurring before March 4 without regard to the approaching change of administration. There are several important appointive offices now vacant, including the commission of the bureau of Indian Affairs and the office of chief of the bureau of chemistry.

Just a year later, the state department received Tuesday the required legal notice of the approval by the state of Ohio of the proposed constitutional income tax amendment. Two more affirmative votes are required to afford the three-fourths vote prescribed by the constitution to secure the adoption of the amendment.

That Socialism has reached its climax in Milwaukee, Wis., and is now dropping backward, is the declaration of political observers as a result of the election by which Victor L. Berger, the lone Socialist member of congress, was defeated, and every Socialist officeholder in Milwaukee county was voted to private life. Socialists had control of the city administration, but failed to complete in accomplishing promised reforms that they suffered a loss of \$519 votes over the spring election.

Eastern.

Charged with "larraging" Minna La Valley at Clarksville, Ohio, six men were placed on trial at Norwalk Tuesday. The girl, who is 19 years old, says she was mistreated on the night of August 10 last.

The second annual exposition of the Northwestern Development league was opened at Minneapolis Tuesday. Among the states represented are Washington,

Oregon, Montana, Idaho, the Dakotas and Alaska.

Maud Malone, a suffragette, who was arrested two weeks ago on a charge of disturbing a Woodrow Wilson meeting in Brooklyn was convicted Tuesday and given a suspended sentence. She appealed the case.

Personal taxes on the Astor estate were sworn off in New York Tuesday. Andrew Carnegie did the same to his assessment last week. The assessment was \$5,000,000, but the executors claimed obligations equaling the amount.

Indictments against the Cudahy Packing company, charging violations of the federal act governing the sale of oleomargarine have been nolle prossed. The government and the Cudahy company agreed upon a compromise. The indictment contained 27 counts and had the case gone to trial and the company been adjudged guilty the fines would have aggregated \$500,000. The compromise was made on a cash basis of \$1000, the Cudahy company paying court costs.

The armed cruisers Tennessee and Montana sailed from Philadelphia Tuesday for Smyrna and Beirut. It was first planned to send the cruisers to Constantinople, but upon assurances from Russia that Americans are guarded in the capital, the orders were changed.

The laying of a cornerstone of a great monument in Arlington National cemetery, to the dead of the Confederacy, was the principal event Tuesday in the opening program of the annual convention of the United Daughters of the Confederacy. William J. Bryan was the orator of the day.

Mrs. Ella Crawford, a wealthy widow, murdered her 3-year-old daughter, Eleanor May Crawford, and then made two unsuccessful attempts to kill herself at her home in Chicago Tuesday. The mother drowned her daughter in a bathtub. The woman then attempted to hang herself, and, failing in this, she struck herself on the head several times with a hatchet.

Indictments against Armour & Co., the meat packers, and Fred Oppenheimer, a commission merchant, were quashed by Federal Judge Carpenter at Chicago Tuesday because the word "transport" in the indictment should have read "trans-ship."

Record prices were realized for sets of new old volumes at the continuation in New York Tuesday of the sale of the library of the late Robert Hoe. This was the second day of the fourth part of the sale. The three parts sold have brought a total of \$1,669,135.

A minister cannot face the high cost of living of the present day and "maintain his honor" on a salary of \$1000 a year according to Rev. Gilbert A. Shaw, rector of Grace Episcopal church at Riverhead, N. Y., who gives this reason for his resignation. He has accepted a call to a church at Hazelton, B. C., where he will receive a larger salary.

Nearly 200 leading surgeons of the world wielded the scalpel for charity in New York Tuesday at the sale of the library of the late Robert Hoe. This was the second day of the fourth part of the sale. The three parts sold have brought a total of \$1,669,135.

The Amalgamation of the Home and Pacific Telephone companies is held valid in a decision rendered at San Francisco by Superior Judge Ellison, a copy of which was received Tuesday by City Attorney Long. This gives the Bell interests a monopoly over the telephone field of the bay district.

At Opportunity, Wash. Tuesday morning, while Mr. Arthur Spencer was giving her 18-month-old daughter an alcohol rub, the alcohol was ignited from a nearby lamp and the child was burned to death.

The Lebanon claim that Astoria and Hood River will have to take a back seat for them, as they expect to exercise the suffrage privilege on December 2 in the city election to be held there.

Melancholy, due to overwork and fearing that she might have failed in some of her studies at the semester quarter just completed and not desiring to disappoint her parents with uncreditable work, Miss Isabelle Johnson, daughter of Peter Johnson, a farmer residing near Moscow, and a junior at the Lewiston State Normal school, attempted suicide in her room at Savage Hall by taking wood alcohol.

A boom for Judge Frank S. Dietrich, of the federal court for the jurisdiction of Idaho, was launched at Boise Tuesday by his friends for United States senator-elect by the next Idaho legislature to succeed the late Weidner B. Heyburn.

The 15th dividend of \$2.50 a share on the stock of the Standard Oil company incorporated in California has been declared by the board of directors of the company at a meeting held in Richmond, Contra Costa county. The issued stock is now valued at \$48,000,000.

In a fire that was started through the carelessness of a workman, the entire plant of the California Paper and

Board mills at Antioch, Cal., was destroyed Tuesday. The loss will reach more than \$400,000, partly covered by insurance. The plant was the largest of its kind west of the Mississippi river, the building covering 16 acres.

Foreign.

Cleveland H. Dodge of New York, has received a cablegram from Dr. Gates, president of Robert college at Constantinople, saying that the missionaries and colleges of Constantinople are all right; that the city is tranquil, and that Robert college is running as usual.

Maddened by the insults of strikers, a body of free workers marched to the union hall, at Waikiki, New Zealand, burst open the door and rushed upon the occupants. A fierce battle ensued, during which revolvers were freely used. A constable and a civilian were shot dead and others were wounded, several mortally.

Miscellaneous.

Five bandits ambushed the Bank of Ochelata, at Ochelata, Okla. Tuesday, got \$1500 and escaped. The robbers cut all the telephone and telegraph wires leading into the town before they attacked the bank.

Two Greeks were wounded, one perhaps fatally by sheriff's deputies at Bingham, Utah, Tuesday. The deputies declare that they were fired upon from a Greek coffeehouse as they were escorting two suspected strike rioters to jail, and returned the fire.

Cable advice from Honolulu report the barkentine Kikikait, a total loss on the reef off Kilauea. The Kikikait belonged to Pope Talbot of San Francisco, and had been operated for several years between Hawaii and Port Gambier, Washington.

At a well attended mass meeting, at Seward, Alaska, D. M. Stewart, who represented Seward at Washington last winter, was unanimously selected to retain the same position during the coming winter.

Governor McDonald, who was inaugurated last January as New Mexico's first state executive, is critically ill. His ailment is diagnosed as Bright's disease.

Salmon Bureau of the Journal.)

Salmon, Or., Nov. 13.—In an opinion given to State Treasurer Kay, Attorney General Crawford held that the new eight hour law, passed at the last election by the people, included all work done by the state, county or city that might be contracted, but said it did not apply to regular employees of institutions or municipal departments where men are employed direct and by the month. But he held that it would apply to all work that might be contracted whether it was being done under contract or not.

AVIATOR SAYS CROWDS COME TO SEE FALLS

Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 13.—"They'd rather see you fall than fly," says C. L. Wiggins, an Atlanta boy who went away and became an aviator, and is now back home to visit his mother, bringing his machine with him.

"At the international meet at Chicago a short time ago, for instance," says Wiggins, "the day after a flyer lost his life there was a tremendous crowd. That day no one fell. The next day the crowd was less. That day another flyer fell to his death. Next day another whooping crowd came out. So it goes. The people seem to want a demonstration of a flyer's inability to fly, instead of his ability to perform successful feats."

When Cal P. Rogers, now dead, made his famous flight from coast to coast, Wiggins followed him in a special train across the continent. He went up with Rogers in the last flight before Rogers was killed at Long Beach, Cal., early last April.

"The latest thing in aviation stunts is the Texas Tunny," states Wiggins. "You fly along on an even keel, then suddenly lift your right plane, drop your left plane, and swoop downward and to the left, like an eagle or a buzzard on the wing. Then you tilt the machine the other way and swoop to the right and upward again. It is a pretty stunt for the spectators, a dangerous one for the aviator."

WOMEN SKILLED IN CAMPAIGNING

Suffrage Majority in Southern Oregon Due to Able Work of Fair Campaigners.

(Special to The Journal.)

Medford, Or., Nov. 13.—Three months before the election a small party of Medford women met and decided that Medford would give a large majority for the suffrage amendment. They met a second time and decided that Jackson county would do the same, and at a third meeting their confidence extended to the whole of southern Oregon. Just how much they had to do with the result can never be absolutely ascertained, but wherever they worked large majorities were piled up and Jackson, Douglas, Josephine and Klamath counties saved the day at the polls, Jackson county giving 918 majority.

The Medford women organized clubs in every village in the county and then took automobiles to Klamath Falls, where they organized a county committee which followed the same plan. In Josephine county they met many very willing workers and an organization was formed there which was the equal of the one in Medford. Every voter in the three counties was mailed literature and the campaign, which steadily grew in interest, was conducted on the educational line. For the last week before the election placards were posted in the county and the names of the registered voters in Douglas and Klamath counties were left at the majority.

The women made no mention of campaigners here, take notice in more than one particular. They advertised the amendment in the newspapers, placarded the city, posted bills on the boards, put vaudeville and slides on at the theatres, and used rubber stamps on all the hotel registers in the city. One enthusiastic young woman even stamped the "votes for women" on the aprons of the grocer and meat clerks of the city. On the night before election placards were left at every door in the city.

There will be many who will advise the women how to vote and many who will advise them how to organize and campaign, but the general feeling in Medford is that the candidate who wishes the best advice should go for it, in a receptive mood, to the women.

DYNAMITE EXPLOSION KILLS PORTLAND MAN

(Special to The Journal.)

Orengo, Or., Nov. 13.—As the result of a premature explosion of dynamite under a stump on the new right-of-way of the Oregon Electric line east of town, A. Crawford, of 1617 East Flanders street, Portland, was killed, the body being horribly mangled. The Oregon Electric Railway company is constructing a line between here and Hepple on the United Electric Railways line, about five miles north of here, and have a large force of men and teams grading and cutting the way through the woods on the right-of-way. At some points, especially east of town, the timbers are large, thus requiring big charges of powder to blow the stumps after the trees are cut down. The charge that killed Crawford was an exceptionally large one.
