

BOTH SIDES FEAR FRAUD IN COUNT

Steady Decrease of Lister's Vote in Washington Causes Democrats Alarm.

Seattle, Nov. 13.—Alarmed at the continued decrease of the vote, the Democratic headquarters has sent out telegrams to all of the county chairmen to watch the vote closely. John Troy, secretary of the state central committee, and George E. Ryan have gone to Chehalis and Pacific counties, where they declared irregularities have been reported.

The Hay people also are sending men to every county and the party managers are watching each other.

The election returns from King county were received yesterday under the supervision of George E. Ryan, representing Ernest Lister, and State Senator Pliny Allen and M. J. Carrigan, representing Governor Hay. This resulted in an increase of 24 votes for Hay and a loss to Lister of 17 votes.

The revised official vote of King county is: Lister 35,347, Hay 18,927, showing that Lister carried King county by 7320.

Lister's plurality over Governor Hay has been increased 123 votes by the receipt of the Snohomish county returns. The new figures gave Lister three additional votes and decreased Hay's former vote by 119. Lister's plurality now stands at 886.

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port of Whidden & Lewis sets forth that \$17,729.41 is for work on the court house building done up to September 1, 1912; \$3250 is the balance due them on the work so far completed, and \$2000 is estimated as approximately their commission on the remaining contracts.

Virtually all the actual construction work on the west wing of the building has been completed, and only the finishing and furnishing remains to be done. The east wing was completed last year and has been occupied by the county since September, 1911.

All the remaining \$25,330 in contracts yet to be filled, which excludes the item for fire escapes, is for furnishings in the new west wing, with the exception of an estimate of \$2150 for cement sidewalks. Much of the furniture will be of steel, like the steel counters and with which the office of the county clerk is now equipped.

February 1, 1913, has been set by the architects as the date when the entire west wing will be completed and turned over to the county. In the meantime work has been concentrated on the first and second floors to finish them so that they can be occupied by the county assessor and county treasurer and their departments by January 1. These departments are now in the city hall.

When the west wing is completed, the county jail, which now occupies the seventh and eighth floors of the east wing, will be transferred to the eighth floor of the west wing. The space now used by the jail will be made into offices.

Among the county officials now compelled to rent offices outside, who will have spacious quarters in the new west wing are the district attorney, justices of the peace of the district and the constable.

The new courthouse is a building of which Multnomah county can be proud for many years to come," was the comment of W. L. Lightner, county commissioner, today. "I consider it one of the finest public buildings, and built at the smallest cost for its size and efficiency, in the west."

error will see that the suits to put the Roseburg Brewery & Ice company, of which Mayor Micelli is one of the leading stockholders, out of business are vigorously prosecuted.

"Unless Mayor Micelli resigns I have instructed District Attorney Brown to bring an injunction suit against the Roseburg Brewery & Ice company and also to proceed to revoke the company's charter," declared the governor today. "If Mayor Micelli gets out of office and lets some one in who will enforce the laws, there may not be need to prosecute these civil suits."

For some time District Attorney Brown has had the officials of the brewery company in court on a charge of violating the local option law. The brewery was supposed to be manufacturing nothing but near-beer, but the charge was made that real beer was being manufactured and sold there. The jury which tried the case first hung six to six. Then in the election the brewery people made a vigorous fight against the reelection of District Attorney Brown, who made a campaign issue out of his determination to fight the brewery to a finish. After Brown's reelection five directors of the brewery company went into court and pleaded guilty to violating the local option law and paid fines aggregating over \$2000.

"As the mayor is a leading stockholder of this company he should now get out of office," said the governor, "and if he doesn't he will have to take the consequences. The confession of guilt of the directors will be good material for having the company's license revoked."

Russian foreign Minister Sazonoff is quoted as telling the German ambassador at St. Petersburg that Serbia will have to fight Austria without Russia's assistance if the Serbian government ignores Austria's warning.

WILSON REGAINS CALIFORNIA; LEADS T. R. BY 136 VOTES

The official count of the vote in San Francisco for president will not be completed until 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. The unofficial count is based on the electors topping the tickets of their respective parties, and it is not believed

Wilson Gains 64 in Los Angeles.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Los Angeles, Nov. 13.—With Woodrow Wilson electors gaining steadily, according to the claims of the Democratic committee watching the count the official canvass of the presidential votes cast in Los Angeles proceeded rapidly today. Jefferson P. Chandler, a member of the committee said:

"Excluding all contested precincts, Wilson has gained 64 in the official count. "If our claims of irregularities had

been allowed Wilson would show a gain of 200 in the city alone. We will take no further action at this time but should Roosevelt carry the state, we will undoubtedly carry our protests to congress, as we are convinced that they are well taken, and will have a tremendous effect on the Los Angeles county vote."

The Progressives admit the Democratic gains. The canvass thus far has been confined to the city vote. When this is completed the county ballots will receive attention.

Spreckels Will Lead Fight.

San Francisco, Nov. 13.—Rudolph Spreckels, the California Republican

millionaire who backed Woodrow Wilson for president in this state, returned here today from the east. Spreckels said he would leave at once for Los Angeles to initiate there a searching investigation into the election returns in that county.
