

Launches the Sixth Royal Arcanum Council With Fat Roll of Members

F. T. McFaden, New Supreme Regent, Has His First Installation in Portland.

Columbia, a new council of the Royal Arcanum, numbered 3901 in the nation, and sixth in Portland, came into being last night, the installation ceremonies being presided over by Supreme Regent F. T. McFaden of the order. The large class of candidates for membership in the new council was initiated by a degree team from the Past Regents' association. The officers were installed by the supreme regent, including George B. Reeves as regent, and George L. Baker as vice regent. Mr. McFaden said it was the first installation he had presided over since being elected head of the order.

After the meeting at the Masonic temple which was attended by the members of the five previously organized councils in this state, there was a banquet at the Hazelwood and Supreme Regent McFaden charmed all in sound of his voice with his eloquent tribute to the character-building influence of the Royal Arcanum, especially in regard to the order's emphasis upon the importance of the home and the place of the wife in it. A. F. Flegel, Portland attorney, followed in the same vein, saying that home means more to members of the Royal Arcanum than to any others he knows, and that one of the men he feels most grateful to is George W. Hazen, who introduced him to the order.

V. Vincent Jones, regent of Multnomah council, in a graceful address, presented the new Columbia council with a banner. C. J. Franklin, regent of the Electric council, introduced 40 members of his council, all in full dress and bagged with the name of their order. More than 300 attended the ceremonies last night. Supreme Regent McFaden and Mrs. McFaden left last night for California.

MABRAY MAN NABBED; SWINDLE CHARGED

St. Paul, Nov. 13.—John Carkeek, or Cartech, fresh from a 28-month term in the county jail at Council Bluffs, Iowa, for his connection with the famous Mabray gang of swindlers, attempted to swindle William Shempf of Delano, Minn., out of \$2500 in St. Paul, it is alleged, and was arrested by Detective Hennessy. The arrest of Carkeek and his pal, Damas Rivard, a telegraph operator, was accomplished by Chief of Detectives Fielding and Detectives Wa-

ters, Turner and Fitzgerald, the last named being the one who grabbed Rivard as Hennessy caught Carkeek at Fifth and Cedar streets.

The men had been working on their intended victim since Tuesday, the police say. When Shempf, who is a commission merchant at Delano, came here to make some purchases, he was met at the union depot by the two and taken to several different hotel rooms, all of which contained telegraph instruments, and on which Rivard apparently received sure tips on horse races. Shempf took a two-to-one shot for \$1500 and won. He was told by Carkeek that he had won \$5000, and he was asked to sign the slip on which he placed his bet.

Shempf signed, and says Carkeek shifted a draft under the pen and then showed the surprised Delano man that what he had really done was to sign over his deposit of \$2500.

The men were caught at Fifth and Cedar streets, after they had made arrangements with Shempf to go to Superior, Wis., where they claimed their ray station was located.

Carkeek is an ex-prizefighter, and is said to have been used as a fighter by the Mabray gang in their fake fights. Shempf succeeded in stopping the draft at the Delano bank.

PRESIDENT M'CREA RESIGNS PRESIDENCY

CONTRIVANCE INVENTED TO FLASH NAMES OF STREETS INSIDE CARS

(Special to The Journal.) Spokane, Wash., Nov. 13.—No longer may the streetcar passenger be compelled to distinguish such street names as Washington or Broadway out of a collection of sounds resembling a debate at a convention of Zulus, for two Spokane men have invented an electrical contrivance that will flash the street names as the car progresses. W. L. Andre and Frank J. Burns have worked five years on the plan and have just received a patent for a device containing the names of streets crossed by a given car, operated automatically by a wire attached to a revolving wheel, which is tripped and turned as it strikes each trolley wire. The inventors encountered difficulty in the matter of reversing the roll when the car reaches the end of the line, but this was obviated by an arrangement permitting the motorman to press a button to reverse the roll automatically.

GOVERNOR EYES WEINHARD PLANT

Hears Eugene Cold Storage Place Is Distributing Center for Liquor.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Or., Nov. 13.—That the cold storage plant maintained in Eugene by the Weinhard Brewery company as a distributing center for liquor being shipped into a dry county is a violation of the spirit of the local option law if not the letter of the law, was the declaration of Governor West today, when he stated that he intended to request District Attorney Bryson and Attorney General Crawford to bring an injunction suit against the company.

This decision of the governor followed a move on the part of the Weinhard brewery people to throw the suits now pending in the circuit court of Multnomah against the saloons in the Jefferson street depot out of court on the ground that they could not be legally brought by Special Prosecutor Esterly.

"I don't think they can make their point stick," declared the governor, "because I took extra precaution in fortifying Esterly's position. In addition to having the court appoint him special prosecutor I quietly appointed him a special agent of the state, and besides I asked the attorney general to be associated in the case so if necessary it could be brought on the relation of the state."

"But regardless of whether they make their point stick, we are going to look after the storage plant in Eugene. I understand they have lockers at the storage plant so one may order his booze and keep it on hand. It is a regular club. District Attorney Bryson will bring the injunction suit and he usually gets what he goes after."

MAHER'S SALARY CLAIM SIGNED BY AUDITOR

County Auditor Martin yesterday signed four warrants for \$125 each in favor of "Paddy" Maher, salary checks for the months of July, August, September and October. The warrants had been held up by Auditor Martin because he did not desire to pay them until he had absolute authority to do so. The payment was made yesterday on a written opinion of District Attorney Cameron and sworn statements from the district attorney's and the coroner's offices that Maher had performed his work. Maher is a special agent of the two offices and is employed in gathering evidence in cases which are brought to the attention of the district attorney's office and for inquests.

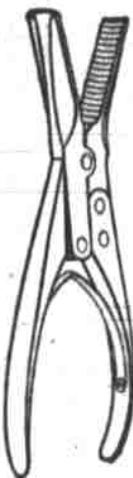
