

NOLTA IS POPULAR CHOICE TO LEAD LEGISLATIVE LIST

Official Returns of Election Shifts Peninsula Man Ahead of W. Irving Spencer With 20,033 Votes.

Official count of the vote for state senators and representatives, as announced today, made no change in results of the unofficial figures, but shifted J. H. Nolta to the head of the list as the most popular of the candidates for the lower house, with W. Irving Spencer second.

Robert S. Farrell was high man for state senator, Dan Kellisher second. N. Day received 7500 votes less than Farrell, but was elected over R. W. Montague, high man on the Democratic senatorial ticket, by 1534.

Sweet Home Votes for High School. Sweet Home, Or., Nov. 20.—Saturday was a busy day in Sweet Home, it being the day of the meeting of the voters of the nine school districts which make up the new high school district, called to vote a special tax for the purpose of building a high school building in Sweet Home.

A five mill tax was asked for on the school meeting notice, but it was very quickly and decidedly voted down. A good deal of warm discussion was indulged in before a motion to raise a two mill tax for the purpose of buying suitable grounds and building was put to vote. The motion carried by a vote of 70 yeas to 49 nays.

About 200 were present but not all voted. A godly sprinkling of women were among the voters. The meeting was held in the Upper

church, which is used for a high school room through the week, and for Sunday school and church services on Sunday. There are about 50 doing high school work at present under the efficient tutelage of Professor Van Fleet. The two mill tax will give the building committee a little over \$2000 to work with.

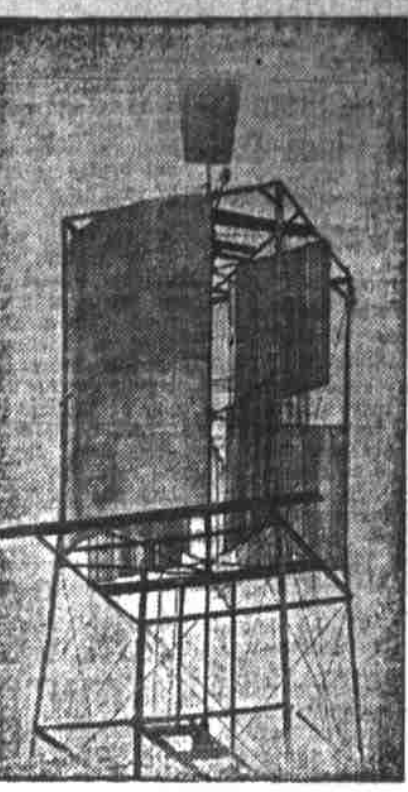
