

DAIRY SHOW BIG EVENT FOR WEST; CROWDS ATTEND

Students' Judging Contest Feature; East Looking to the Northwest for Fine Grade of Stock, Says Pres. Clise.

"We are going to make the Pacific International Dairy show the big annual stock show of the western United States," declared J. W. Clise, the Seattle banker, president of the association, when seen yesterday prior to the opening of the second day of the big show at the North Portland stockyards. "The best market for dairy stock in the United States is the Pacific northwest," continued Mr. Clise. "Eastern breeders concede that the Pacific northwest is where they get the best dairy stock. We have the climate, in our favor and there is no reason why we should not make this western coast the best dairy spot of the country. Dairy stock breeders consider the national show at Chicago as the court of final appeal in this country, but with the proper effort, the International Dairy show of the Pacific northwest can be made to rank with the Chicago show. With just a little effort on the part of the dairy stock breeders, the northwest can be made the dairy center of the United States and Canada."

Stock men exhibiting at the North Portland show will effect a permanent organization looking to the holding of future shows. While the results this year are more than was expected, exhibitors look for better results next year and are confident that future shows will rival the annual International Dairy Stock show given at Milwaukee. An thrush of attendance, an enthusiastic appreciation and a considerable financial support are delighting the land show management. Attendance last night broke all records. Users had to be employed to keep the dense throng moving so that all could see. A crowd was waiting outside when the doors opened this morning. With the attendance of the railroad employees this afternoon and of several improvement clubs the number today promises to exceed that of yesterday.
 Just across the street from the land show two hundred of the men who have made Oregon a world leader in the production of fruit are gathered, attending the twenty-seventh annual meeting of the State Horticultural society. Of the society A. P. Bateham is president, E. H. Sheppard, vice president, F. W. Power, secretary.

Opening the meeting this morning President Bateham said that never has the fruit producing business had a brighter outlook in Oregon. Orchardists are constantly adopting better methods until their work has assumed the dignity of a profession.

C. and the election of officers will be the feature of the Thursday afternoon session. The annual banquet of the society will be at the Multnomah hotel tomorrow night and the program will be continued in the meeting hall at East First and Morrison streets Friday.

BOMB MAN HAD OTHER MACHINES

Los Angeles Maniac Who Threatened Police Station Was Well Stocked.

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 20.—Under close guard in the emergency room at the Central police station, Albert Davis, known as "Karl Warr," who yesterday terrorized the station by threatening to explode 60 sticks of dynamite comprising an ingenious infernal machine, is being held for examination by insanity experts.

Davis, although he refuses to talk freely, declared that he was determined to get fair wages for the men employed by railroads, and therefore he contrived his machine and searched for Paul Shoup, president of the Pacific Electric Lines; Shoup, he said, was to be killed unless he promised to better his employees' condition.
 In a room occupied by Davis, who recently came here from Long Beach, the police found several machines similar to the one he carried yesterday. One of these, tested in Elysian park last night, blew to pieces a rock weighing 20 tons. Experts in explosives who examined the charge of the machine Davis brought to the police station declared it was sufficiently powerful to destroy buildings for blocks around. They said that miraculous luck prevented an explosion when detectives overpowered the man.

Headed by Mayor Alexander, Los Angeles citizens started a movement today to secure Carnegie medals for Detectives Browne, Hosick and Fitzgerald, who overpowered Davis at the police station. Furthermore, a purse will be raised by popular subscription for each man.
 The alleged maniac said today that his name is Karl Reidebach, and that he recently came from Wurtemberg. He declared he has hundreds of pounds of dynamite cached in San Bernardino county.
