

REASONS FOR BACK BY LITTLE TASKS AT ASYLUM

Report of Superintendent of the Salem Institution Shows That 42 Per Cent of Patients Were Cured in Last 2 Years.

Salem, Or., Nov. 21.—During the last two years 1373 patients, of whom 875 were men and 498 were women, were received at the state asylum for the insane at this place, and 572 patients, or 42 per cent, were discharged. Of those discharged 407 were fully recovered, 246 were so much improved that they were almost well, and 200 of them became fully restored to reason shortly after leaving. This makes a record of 42 per cent of those received during the biennial period being cured.

On October 1 of this year there were 1153 men and 652 women patients at the asylum. The average daily attendance during the two years has been 1677.04.

These figures are according to the biennial report of Dr. R. E. Lee Steiner, superintendent of the asylum, who speaks optimistically of the work being done by the institution.

"Only secondary to improve the welfare of the most sadly afflicted of God's creatures, the patients," says Dr. Steiner's report, "has been our effort to make the financial burden as light as possible, and we felt much gratified in a per capita cost of but \$13.71 per month. When it is understood that this covers all expenses of feeding, clothing, medical attention, nursing, heat, light, amusement, upkeep of buildings and all incidental expenses one must realize that careful and systematized economy must be practiced."

Find Cures in Work.

Dr. Steiner says the new receiving hospital, the south wing of which has been built and furnished, and the method employed in caring for the curable insane patients, marks the greatest advance in the treatment for the insane in this hospital for years.

"Employment is most essential for the welfare of the inmates and strenuous efforts are put forth to furnish some useful and remunerative work for every patient who is able," says the report. "Hundreds of men are employed upon the farm, in the gardens, and about the various departments of the institution. A great deal has been accomplished in the way of road building, grading and beautifying the grounds, and the produce from farm, garden and dairy helps materially in lessening the expense of this institution, as well as supplying better milk, fresher vegetables, and finer fruit."

Coaxes to Industry.

"The economical feature, though saving thousands of dollars, is not as important as the inestimable benefit hundreds of patients derive from the splendid opportunities afforded for healthful, productive labor. The female patients are not neglected in this regard."

"An industrial department is maintained to encourage and educate the indigent and demented cases, to devise interesting tasks for those who are irritable or unreasonable, and to entice the indolent into habits of industry."

Of the patients admitted during the last two years 241 were laborers, 113 were farmers, 199 were housewives, 52 were housekeepers, 21 were carpenters, 13 were miners, 20 were cooks, 18 were clerks, 17 were lumbermen, 15 were nurses and the others were scattered among almost every occupation.

During the period 50 men made good their escape.
