

WOMAN WOULD BE DYNAMITE SANE

Alienists Say the Los Angeles Crank Is in Right Mind; His Disposition Is a Problem.

Los Angeles, Nov. 21.—That Carl K. Reidelbach, dynamite crank who threatened to dynamite the central police station here, is not insane, is the belief today of James T. Fisher, professor of psychology at the University of Southern California, and Dr. Charles Carter, police surgeon. Reidelbach grined through his examination in the psychopathic ward of the county hospital and seemed highly pleased with the decision of the experts.

POWER BELT SLINGS MAN TO INSTANT DEATH

Springfield, Or., Nov. 21.—John E. Moore, an employee of the Oregon Power company, was killed instantly late Tuesday night by being caught in a moving belt in the "hog" house in which slabwood is reduced to chips for fuel for the company's electric plant here.

During the night the conveyor system between the "hog" and the fuel bin became clogged and Moore threw off the power so repairs could be made. He called to his fellow workman to come and help in clearing the chute, but when the other man reached the floor he could not see Moore.

Not finding him in the furnace room he returned with aid and found Moore with his arm around the belt and the pulley. Evidently he had tried to arrest the momentum of the machinery after the power was cut off, and was hurled against the side of the building. His skull was fractured.

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IN BRAWL AT SANDY MAN IS SHOT IN HEAD

Announces He Will Let Law Take Its Course in California.

Estacada, Or., Nov. 21.—During a brawl in one of the three saloons of Sandy Monday night, R. F. Parker, a former saloonman of Estacada, was shot, it is alleged, by a stage driver named Jerry Friel. Parker narrowly escaped death, the bullet glancing along the side of his head, inflicting a severe scalp wound. Seven men Tuesday were rounded up by the marshal of Sandy and fined. Parker also was fined for assault upon a liverman following the shooting.

GRAND JURY IS PROBING BERT CROWLEY'S DEATH

Prallville, Or., Nov. 21.—The Grant county grand jury met and organized yesterday. A number of important cases will come before the body at this session, including the first degree murder case from Susanville, this county. This is the case of William Settle, who has been in jail at Canyon City since the commission of the alleged crime last July. Settle is charged with shooting in cold blood Bert Crowley, a young man of 23 and a neighbor of Settle. The shooting occurred in the morning. The two had quarreled the evening before over a bottle of whiskey which Settle charged Crowley with stealing.

KING OF ITALY CREATES THREE NEW RELATIONS

Rome, Nov. 21.—As a result of Italy's war with Turkey King Victor Emmanuel has three new cousins. They are San Guilian, minister of foreign affairs; General Paolo Spingardi, minister of war, and Admiral Pasquale Leonardo-Cattolico, minister of marine. In recognition of their services in enabling Italy to get away with its grab of the two Turkish provinces of Tripoli and Cyrenaica, the king has just conferred upon them the collar of the Order of Annunziata, which makes them relations of the sovereign. The order permits the king to increase the royal family in this manner to the extent of 23 cousins, but it is seldom that he exercises this right to the full limit.

WEDS WITH PRISON TERM HANGING OVER HIS HEAD

Roseburg, Or., Nov. 21.—Although, should the supreme court decide against him, Ed Russell, of Ruckles, has a penitentiary sentence of from one to five years hanging over his head, he is to be married. A marriage license was issued in Medford to Russell and Miss Lucy Miller, of that city. Russell was convicted in the circuit court in Roseburg, November 23, of the crime of larceny after a jury at a previous trial of the case had disagreed. An appeal from Russell's conviction is pending in the supreme court. If a new trial is denied Russell will have to serve his sentence.

ELKS' NEW HOME IN OREGON CITY DEDICATED

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Oregon City, Nov. 21.—Oregon City's handsome \$27,000 Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks' home was formally and impressively dedicated and service held yesterday afternoon and last night. Elks from many parts of the state were present, as were large delegations from Portland, Salem, Albany and Vancouver, Wash. The visitors were the guests of Oregon City Lodge No. 11,189, which held open house at its new home.

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MRS. SHARKEY DIES AFTER BRIEF ILLNESS

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Following a brief illness with heart disease, Mrs. Elizabeth Sharkey, 456 East Seventeenth street, and mother of ex-Councilman John P. Sharkey, died at her home Tuesday night. Mrs. Sharkey, who was 70 years old, came to Portland 27 years ago and made this city her residence to the time of her death. Born in Ireland, she accompanied her parents to America in 1845, where they settled near New Brunswick, Nova Scotia. Seven years later her parents moved to St. Johns, West Virginia, where Mrs. Sharkey resided until she came west. Besides one brother, Patrick McClement of Baltimore, seven children survive. They are all residents of Portland and were with their mother when she passed away. The children are Edward J. Sharkey, John P. Sharkey, William T. Sharkey, Mrs. Catherine Southard, Mrs. J. M. Casey, Mrs. Mary J. Sweeney and Mrs. A. R. Zellars.

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ASSESSMENT GREATER IN MOST COUNTIES

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(Salem Bureau of the Journal.) Salem, Or., Nov. 21.—Figures showing the total assessed valuation of the various counties are now being received by the state tax commission. These figures do not include the assessments to be made by the commission. For Baker county the assessed valuation reported this year is \$17,794,765, a decrease of \$131,316 from last year's assessment; Columbia county, \$12,447,490, a decrease of \$163,500; Grant county, \$2,717,584, an increase of \$21,003; Jackson county, \$25,846,148, a decrease of \$1,465,754; Josephine county, \$8,866,478, an increase of \$114,472; Lincoln county, \$3,402,812, an increase of \$60,530; Linn county, \$26,942,295, an increase of \$638,779; Morrow county, \$9,174,701, an increase of \$188,828; Polk county, \$12,749,100, a decrease of \$266,770; Willamette county, \$12,559,218, an increase of \$2,202,441; Wasco county, \$9,531,590, an increase of \$294,260; Washington county, \$17,780,946, an increase of \$487,246; Yamhill county, \$15,025,071, a decrease of \$191,854.
