

PROBE OF "BLIND PIG" FACTS ASKED BY ALBANY CHIEF

Daughtry Replies to Citizens With Demand That They Prove Charges He Has Accepted Bribe Money.

Albany, Or., Nov. 21.—Chief of Police Ellis Daughtry of this city, who was called before a mass meeting of citizens last Sunday at the Methodist church and requested to proceed at once to the rigid enforcement of the law against the sale of liquor and who was at that time publicly informed of the accusations that have been made about him, has made a public statement asking that a special session of the grand jury be called to investigate the charges against him. His statement was as follows:

"To All Whom It May Concern: This is to certify that inasmuch as there is so much talk of my having received checks and money from certain parties who run blind pigs and otherwise violate the law, that I have asked the deputy district attorney, Gale S. Hill, to call a special session of the grand jury at once to investigate the matter and thus give the people who say they know so much, a chance to tell it to the grand jury.

"I court the fullest investigation and demand that I get it and ask that the parties circulating these reports be required to appear before the grand jury and prove that I ever took one dollar from any man or body of men, aside from my salary."

Daughtry was informed at the mass meeting Sunday afternoon that it was commonly reported about the city that he was receiving money from Jim Hart for allowing the blind pigs to run without interference. At that time he broke into tears and left the church sobbing.

Albany courts have been busy this week partly as a result of the recent reform activities, partly as a result of the freedom with which blind pig whiskey flowed Sunday and partly as a result of the blind pig activities of the past. Judge L. L. Swan issued two warrants for the arrest of J. D. Kennedy for alleged violations of the local option liquor law and Kennedy is now out on \$500 bail awaiting trial.

William Riley, E. D. Henry the Harbinger man who is under indictment for blind pigging, and Charles Anderson were each fined \$100 and costs in Judge F. E. Van Tassel's court yesterday morning for fighting in the blind pig district.

Al Peacock was tried yesterday on the first of seven cases against him in Judge Willig's court and was found guilty of selling liquor contrary to the local option law. Peacock had been found guilty in the justice court and fined but he appealed.

There are still six cases against him which are to be tried this week. Another indictment charges Peacock with having attempted to bribe Chief of Police Ellis Daughtry to allow Peacock to run blind pig here. The indictment charges that the sum of \$750 was offered. The other indictments are for blind pigging.

HUNTS FERRY PEOPLE VOTE TO UNITE WITH MAUPIN

The Dalles, Or., Nov. 21.—The residents of Maupin and Hunts Ferry held a joint mass meeting Saturday and it was voted almost unanimously to consolidate the two places and incorporate under the name of Maupin. Maupin and Hunts Ferry are on opposite sides of the business river, Maupin on the west and Hunts Ferry on the east, about 10 miles from the mouth of the river and are connected by a steel bridge recently built by the county. They are in the center of one of the best grain and stock sections of Wasco county, and when consolidated will become a trading center of considerable importance. There are now two stores, a hotel, newspaper and blacksmith shop in the town of Maupin, and a large grain warehouse in Hunts Ferry.

WANTS \$130,000 IN ALL FOR THE STATE MILITIA

Salem, Or., Nov. 21.—It is understood here that Adjutant General Finser will ask the coming legislature for \$70,000 for the maintenance of the state militia during the next two years and for \$60,000 for the erection of new armories. When a new armory is built the city in which it is located is required to expend an equal amount with the state, which is equal to doubling the appropriation for this purpose.

Uses Donkey Engine to Plow.

Hood River, Or., Nov. 21.—F. J. Patterson, who owns a large unimproved tract of land in the eastern section of the Hood River valley, is now clearing the tract by means of a large 3000 pound plow mounted on wheels and drawn by a large donkey engine that uproots everything with which it comes in contact excepting the very large pine and fir stumps. It plows a furrow about 20 inches deep. A huge harrow is placed on the ground after the plowing that is also drawn by the donkey engine that cleans the land of the debris. This plow is the invention of a German who was brought from that country to construct the one for Mr. Patterson. The plow turns four 16 inch furrows at once and one acre per day is prepared for planting.

NO SOFT ANSWER SENT TO MICELLI

Governor Says Roseburg Mayor Can't Keep His Oath and Break It, Too.

Salem, Or., Nov. 21.—In a letter to Carl E. Wimberly, city recorder of Roseburg, Governor West declares nothing can change his course in his law enforcement campaign and that Mayor Micelli is to blame for the directing of public attention to the conditions in Roseburg. Mr. Wimberly had sent the governor copy of resolutions passed by the city objecting to the governor's action regarding law enforcement in Roseburg.

"My line of action is already marked out and I intend to follow it to the end," declares the governor, who says further: "It is a fact, admitting of no contradiction, that any institution is a public nuisance which openly, constantly and notoriously flaunts its disregard of constituted authority in the face of decent people, to the detriment of the public morals and the public good. This is a maxim and it is corollary thereto that any person standing as sponsor for, or hand in hand with, such an institution partakes of its public attributes and shares in its public disgrace.

"Such an institution is the Roseburg Brewing & Ice company, the revocation of whose charter has been asked of the court by request of this office, based upon indictments found by a grand jury of the law-abiding and justice loving citizens of Douglas county. Against this effort, your mayor, as stockholder and profit sharer in this illegal handmaiden of organized vice, made indignant defense. Sworn to uphold the law he stultified his oath by attempting to condone its violation—a violation proven of record by the plea of guilty entered upon the docket of the circuit court.

"No man can keep his oath and break it. No man can fulfill his trust and betray it. This office is confident your mayor knew the local option laws were being violated in Roseburg and by the Roseburg Brewing & Ice company. He was a stockholder in an illegal busi-

MINER, KEPT 2 YEARS IN JAIL, THEN FREED, BRINGS \$66,000 SUIT

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 21.—Found not guilty after being held in jail for two years at Nome, Alaska, on the charge of looting sluice boxes, John Tilberg is suing the Pioneer Mining company for \$66,000 damages in the superior court here today. Tilberg was night foreman for the company for a time prior to the arrest, which was not made until he came to Seattle and sold gold for \$14,360, which he claims was his own. He alleges that a requisition for him was issued before the complaint was sworn to. He asks \$5 a day for the time he was detained in jail and bail for being "advertised to the world at large as a gold thief."
