

OTHER Y. M. C. A.'S WIRE CONFIDENCE

Nashville, Kansas City, San Francisco and Others Have Been Heard From.

Telegrams and letters are pouring into the local Y. M. C. A. headquarters from Y. M. C. A. institutions in every section of the country, asking for details of the cause that led to the attack on the Portland Y. M. C. A. by a local afternoon newspaper.

When seen at his office this morning, H. W. Stone, general secretary of the Y. M. C. A., was reading telegrams from Y. M. C. A. secretaries in Nashville, Tenn., Kansas City, San Francisco, Walla Walla and a dozen other places, expressing confidence in the Portland institution and deploring the infamous attack of the Daily News.

"The details of this affair have been telegraphed all over the country, as evidenced by the clippings that I am receiving daily from cities as far east as Nashville, New Orleans and Kansas City," said Mr. Stone.

The following resolution was adopted yesterday at a meeting of representative Methodists of Portland gathered at lunch under the auspices of the Men's Methodist Social union:

"Whereas, A bitter and unwarranted attack has been made by the Daily News of this city upon the local Y. M. C. A. and upon its leadership; and

"Whereas, The Y. M. C. A., as everybody knows, stands for the best and highest moral and spiritual life in a community, its leaders always willing to cooperate with every organization standing for human betterment; and

"Whereas, For 45 years this institution has been working incessantly in our midst for a finer citizenship and a nobler manhood; and

"Whereas, Secretary H. W. Stone and his able corps of assistants have already proven themselves to be wise in leadership, careful in administration, rational and helpful in counsel and willing to go their utmost for men and boys, for homes in Portland and for the good of all; therefore, be it

"Resolved, That we condemn this method of attack in the aforesaid paper as being cruel, base and reprehensible and utterly devoid of the principles which should actuate reputable journalism.

"We are glad to take this opportunity to express our sympathy with the officers and leaders of the Y. M. C. A. under this hostile criticism and express to them, to Secretary Stone and his associates our utmost confidence in them and in the institution which has demonstrated itself to be one of the finest of Portland.

"We urge the representatives of the Y. M. C. A. to take prompt steps to obtain a full retraction and to secure adequate redress or punishment for the perpetrators of this gross libel."

NEW PUBLIC MARKET MODEL OF SANITATION

The most modern and complete public market on the Pacific coast is the claim made for the Yamhill Sanitary Public Market, which was opened for inspection Wednesday night. Several thousand people visited the market at that time, and made a careful inspection of its arrangement and conveniences. Music for the occasion was furnished by an orchestra, and guides were there to explain the market and to set forth its

advantages as a shopping place for the thrifty housewife.

No goods were sold at the opening, which was in the nature of a reception to the citizens of Portland. Souvenirs were distributed and tickets were given as chances on a prize drawing to be held tomorrow night.

The public market at Second and Yamhill streets represents an investment of about \$60,000, and every effort has been made to make it just as up to date as possible. Sanitation and cleanliness have been the first considerations in its construction, and the latest ideas of public market building as used in other cities have been followed at the Yamhill place. The aisles are wide and the display and selling booths are large enough to permit a good showing of goods in a cleanly and inviting manner.

The market has its own refrigerating plant, and is furnished with the latest style showcases and display racks.

The public market will be supplied with a full line of groceries, meats, fruits, vegetables, dairy products, sea foods, tea, coffee and confectionery. A delicatessen is also included in the general plan, and bakery goods will be kept fresh and wholesome at all times.

The floors of the new market are all of concrete construction.
