

LEELANAW SAILS FOR PORTLAND; BIG CARGO OF FREIGHT

W. S. Scammell & Co.'s Steamer on First Trip Up From San Francisco; Goods for Local Agents.

On her first trip to this port in the San Francisco line of steamers operated by W. S. Scammell & Co., the steamer Leelanaw was scheduled to steam today from San Francisco for Portland, carrying a full cargo of freight.

The Leelanaw is operating in connection with other steamers owned by that company and it is expected that by the first of the year the line will be running between San Francisco and this port on a five day schedule, as their new steamer will be completed by that time.

The Leelanaw is bringing a full cargo of freight and she is consigned to the local agents, Baumgartner & Baker. She has in her cargo 1500 tons of cement and general freight for the E. J. Dodge company which will be discharged at Oak street dock and the remainder at the Albers dock. She is a vessel of 1377 tons net.

Prior to taking American registry the Leelanaw was the British steamer Earnwell and was built at Newcastle, England, in 1880. She was built with passenger accommodations.

At the time the California-Atlantic Steamship company was running the Stanley Dollar and Riverside to this port the Leelanaw was on the run between San Francisco and Balboa and she was never loaded for this port.

MAKES FAST VOYAGE

Bark Passes Gulf So Quickly That Men Couldn't Catch Turtles.

Exceptionally fast time was made by the German bark Jersbek, Captain Peitsmeir, while in the Gulf of California, says the captain who was up from Linton yesterday, and she made the run from Santa Rosalia to the Pacific in two days, which gave her a good start for her 21-day passage to the mouth of the Columbia. The German ship Leebek made the same voyage last season in 20 days.

Captain Peitsmeir said that the Jersbek went through the gulf so fast that it was impossible for them to catch any turtles, which skippers in that part of the world depend on for soup and fresh meat. The German bark Isebek, which arrived in port a few days ahead of the Jersbek, was nine days in the gulf, and Captain Haas says that they caught over a hundred turtles; in fact, more than they could use. They also caught a number of sharks and the skipper has been presenting friends here with canes made of the backbones of the creatures.

The Jersbek had good weather until she arrived off Tillamook, when she ran into bad weather, which included wind, rain and fog.

When a few days out of Santa Ro-

salia, a seaman named Meyer fell from the deck to the ballast in the hold, a distance of about 14 feet, but he sustained no injuries beyond a few slight bruises, and was able to continue his work in a day or two.

Captain Peitsmeir has been to this port six times, the last being in 1908, when he came here in the German ship Nordsee, taking a cargo of wheat to Calisto. The Jersbek will load a cargo of wheat here for the United Kingdom or for the continent under charter to M. H. Houser. Before going under the German flag the Jersbek was the British bark Lyderhorn.

FOG HALTS TRAFFIC

Fog on the river this morning interfered to a great extent with the movements of different vessels, and very few craft were to be seen or heard on the river. The steamer Oklahama arrived at Linton at 2 o'clock this morning with the British bark Colony in tow, reaching that place before the fog closed down heavily. However, the Norwegian bark Valeris was to go from the ballast dock, at Linton, at an early hour this morning to her berth for grain at the Irving dock, and the German bark Jersbek was to take her place at the ballast dock, but the fog prevented. INJURED IN FALL

While working on the United States dredge Chinook at the government moorings, Charles Alsberg, a paint chipper, employed by the United States engineers, fell to the hold of the vessel and was severely hurt about the head at 8:30 this morning. Alsberg had cuts about his head and when picked up by companions was in a semi-unconscious condition. He was brought to the foot of Stark street and taken from there to the hospital.

SHOOTS AT DESERTERS

Rickmers reported yesterday afternoon that six more of his Japanese sailors got away the night before. This leaves but two more of the "little brown men" in the crew, two having escaped the night before.
