

# LARGE TIRE FIRM MAY CONSTRUCT BIG BUILDING HERE

Manufacturer's Representatives Find Business Increasing Fast; Will Add to Force of Salesmen.

"Conditions are so flourishing in the west that the whole country would probably be in good business shape despite what circumstances might prevail in other parts," said J. M. Gilbert, capitalist of New York, who is in Portland today following an extensive trip through the west and the Pacific northwest.

Mr. Gilbert, who is general manager of the United States Tire company, is accompanied by J. D. Anderson, general sales manager, and the two are out on a tour of business and investigation. Following a consultation this morning with local representatives of the company, it was decided that the local distributing agency must be materially enlarged to take care of the business which is resulting from the rapid growth of Portland and contiguous territory. To this end the Portland force of employees will be increased and new quarters will be secured.

**May Street Building.**

Mr. Gilbert said it is probable that his company will erect its own building in Portland to take care of business in this district and that improvements will be started at once.

"The cities of this great western slope, Portland particularly, I may say, furnish a wonderful field for the manufacturer," said Mr. Gilbert. "Our company recognizes this fact, and we intend that the west shall be well taken care of in a business way. The growth of the automobile business represents to a considerable extent the growth of a country, and we are assured that Portland and Oregon are growing because of the steadily increasing growth of our business in this locality."

"It is to make arrangements for taking better care of this business, and to promote a big, broad sales policy, that we are now in the west. No part of the country shows greater trade stability than the northwest."

**Pleased With Portland.**

Speaking in particular of the automobile industry, Mr. Gilbert said: "Everything points to another tremendous year for the automobile business. Estimating conservatively, I think there will be probably 750,000 pleasure cars in use in this country next summer. This means that the country will require about 4,500,000 tires. Our company expects to manufacture about one-quarter of them. Our factories are running on full summer schedule now, three shifts every day for six days in the week."

"I am wonderfully pleased with Portland, its performances in a business way in the past year and the prospects it has for continued growth and prosperity. Both Mr. Anderson and myself are mighty glad to be able to see the city and study its possibilities at close range."

Mr. Gilbert and Mr. Anderson will leave tonight for San Francisco en route east.
