LAWYER PATRICK GAINS HIS PARDON AFTER TEN YEARS

Convicted of Murder of William M. Rice, Millionaire Patron, Sentenced to Die, He Never Gave Up Struggle.

WILL JOIN WIFE HE MARRIED AFTER ARREST

Was Convicted on Testimony of Marsh's Valet Jones, Who Admitted Guilt.

Patrick's Fight for Life. William Marsh Rice died in New York, September 23, 1900. Albert T. Patrick arrested October 4, 1900. Trial began January 20, 1901. Convicted March 24, 1902. Put in death house at Sing Sing, April 7, 1902. Appeal for new trial February 10, 1903. Court refuses new trial June 2, 1905. Refuses stay of execution June 14, 1905. Execution fixed for August 16, 1905. Motion for reargument and stay of execution granted July 24, 1905. Renewal of motion for reargument October 2, 1905. Resentenced to die December 6, 1905. Unsuccessful appeal to United States supreme court. Resentenced to die January 22, 1906. Governor Higgins denied application for reprieve January 4, 1906. Governor Higgins received petition for clemency January 15, 1906. Sentence commuted to life imprisonment by Governor Higgins, December, 1906. Visit of habeas corpus denied December 2, 1909. Governor Dix signs pardon November 26, 1912.

Roses Bloom in Portland. There was no frost on the pumpkin when Thanksgiving day broke in Portland this morning. It was foggy until about the time when the hotel lobbies began to fill up and the promenaders appeared on the streets. Then the sun shot a myriad of golden beams through the mist, scattered the fog, dispelled the gloom and made the day ideal. The temperature at 11 o'clock was 59 degrees. Particularly to the strangers within the city's gates this Thanksgiving brand of weather is a revelation and a joy. Roses a-bloom in the dooryards on November 28 is something for the eastern men to write home about. Shrubbery and grass, green and healthy looking, contrast with the carpet of snow which goes with the season in other parts less fortunate, and the snow loses out in the comparison. It is football weather plus.

New York, Nov. 28.—Howling blasts and swirling snow is the seasoning for the Thanksgiving turkey today all the way from Texas to Georgia, and from there north to Canada. Heavy snow covers New York state and in many sections transportation was demoralized. In Canton, N. Y., 26 inches of snow has fallen. The storm struck New York city this morning and already is causing serious difficulty with the streetcar service. Dismal and disagreeable weather prevailed here. The snowfall continued this afternoon, but it melted rapidly. The thermometer stood at 31 degrees.

Denver, Nov. 28.—Thanksgiving day here was marked by a heavy fall of snow, the weather this afternoon being cloudy and disagreeable. The temperature was 51 above zero.

FINDS WIFE HE WEDDED IN MENTAL LAPSE IS OLD TIME SWEETHEART

Albert Ryan, After Four Years of Forgetfulness, Discovers Old Dream Comes True.

Los Angeles, Nov. 28.—"It's Mary! Oh, I knew it would be. I never could have married anyone else," cried Albert J. Ryan, of San Diego, when he was reunited with his wife at the central post office station here today. Ryan recovered last Sunday from a mental lapse of four years, according to his story, during which time he had married Mary Flood, of New York, to whom he had been engaged when he went to Arizona for his health. He was told last night that he was a married man with two children. And since then he has waited in an agony of apprehension lest the woman he married was not the girl he loved and had left in New York. The Ryans departed together to celebrate Thanksgiving. Mrs. Ryan telling the police she would return later and explain all she knows of the unusual case. Ryan came to himself lying on the beach at Oceanside and came to Los Angeles to do some work. He was recognized by a San Diego man as a former employe, who told him that he had a wife and two children in that city. Ryan could not remember, and the San Diego man thinking he was delirious, notified the police. According to Ryan's story he was doorkeeper for a wealthy club in New York and was engaged to marry Miss Mary Flood. He became ill and was taken to Phoenix, Ariz., where he went in search of health. This was in 1908, and Ryan says he remembers nothing from the time he boarded the train in New York after kissing his fiancée goodbye until he awoke at Oceanside. "They tell me I have a wife and two children in San Diego," he said. "I don't know who she can be. They say my name is Mary, and perhaps I have some hope to God it is she. The only girl I could have married was Mary Flood. Ryan was not retained by the police, but he promised to visit the police station today.

SUES NAVAL OFFICERS FOR ARRESTING HIM

Norfolk, Va., Nov. 28.—Suit for \$25,000 is entered today against a number of prominent naval officers by W. W. Hickey, a naval commissary steward, who alleges he was manacled before his comrades and otherwise humiliated when no specific charge had been supplied, as required. Hickey is now in jail awaiting trial by court-martial for perjury. The officers involved in Hickey's suit are Captain Quimby, Captain Huse, Rear Admiral Doyle, Captain Wall and Captain Smith.

TYPHOON KILLS 100 IN PHILIPPINE ISLANDS

Manila, Nov. 28.—A severe typhoon, which occurred here today, caused the death of more than a hundred persons, and resulted in a property loss estimated at millions of pesos. The storm crossed the islands of Samar, Leyte and North Panay, practically destroying the town of Tacloban, the capital of Leyte. Two steamers were wrecked while lying at anchor in Tacloban harbor. The weather bureau is predicting another typhoon of unusual severity along the coast of Mindanao.

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS OF SENATE IS DEAD

Washington, Nov. 28.—Daniel Ransdell, sergeant at arms in the senate since 1900, died here today at Garfield hospital. He was a native of Indiana. Heart failure following a recent operation for bladder trouble killed Sergeant Ransdell. His death was sudden. The funeral will be held in Indianapolis on Sunday.
