Identify Smithy and Anderson as Having Been in Ohio Town When Erie Track Was Dynamited.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Indianapolis, Ind., Nov. 29.—Strong testimony was offered today against Peter Smith and George Anderson of Cleveland, two of the defendants in the case of the union men charged with illegally transporting dynamite. Cleo Beard, aged 14 years, and her sister Laura, 15, identified Smith and Anderson as men they saw carrying a box near North Randolph, Ohio, just before a section of the Erie railroad track near there was dynamited.

ASTORIA WANTS BACK FISHING LEASING COIN

Astoria, Or., Nov. 29.—The matter of turning over to the state, for the purpose of bettering and advancing the fish industry in Oregon, of the money the government receives from the leases of certain fishing grounds, has been taken up by the Astoria chamber of commerce and an effort will be made to get the proper authorities at Washington to investigate the situation as early as possible. It is said that the government now has at least \$50,000 which could be turned over to the state, and if such a proposition could be arranged, Oregon would derive at least \$12,000 from these grounds.

Demonstrates Need of Canal.

The reply was taken to indicate what many have long believed, that the railroads will, as their representatives frankly admitted this morning, advance nonwater competitive terminal rates sharply, but that when the Panama canal is finished they will meet this water competition by a sharp reduction, having the effect of demonstrating, even now, the tremendous savings to shippers—and through them to consumers—of the use of the Panama canal by intercoast vessels.

In opening the session this morning a general informative statement as to the rate was made by the Western Freight Agent Blakely of the Northern Pacific. Followed Harry W. Mitchell, Portland head of Mitchell, Lewis & Staver, with a statement as to the effect of the rate on agricultural implements and wagons. A. H. Averill, president of the Averill Machinery company, declared the rate as it affected threshing machinery was unjust and revolutionary. A. F. Biles, for the Central Door and Lumber company, declared that the 20 per cent increase proposed on glass would boost the rate from \$11.80 to \$14.05 per car and be prohibitive.

Sofia, Nov. 29.—It is officially announced that two entire divisions of Turkish reserves numbering 10,000 men have surrendered to a Bulgarian force near the village of Marhamit. Eight mountain batteries were taken.

Belgrade, Nov. 29.—Marching against the Turks, a company of Serbian troops found an opportunity of avenging a two-year-old crime by hanging Abdul Shalam, a notorious frontier brigand. Two years ago Abdul treacherously deceived a Serbian schoolmaster to his home near Guillian and shot him, afterward boasting of the deed and defying the Serbians to capture him. The schoolmaster was a popular writer of national songs, and finding themselves in the neighborhood of Guillian, a company of infantry obtained leave to hunt the murderer. They tracked him and a Gypsy was found to act as hangman.

Sofia, Nov. 29.—Dispatches received here today say the Bulgarian force is closing in on the Turkish garrison at Adrianople, and that the besieged city cannot hold out much longer. The Bulgarians are newly entrenched and are fighting hard. It was reported that the 40,000 Turks formerly comprising the garrison, have been reduced one half.

MISS BOARDMAN IS 'LADY OF DECORATION'

PATRICK WILL FIGHT FOR RICE'S MILLIONS

Patrick intimated he would immediately start a legal fight intended to make him trustee of the Rice millions. He asserted he had been "railroaded" to prison because he refused to accept money from persons interested in Rice's affairs. The money, he said, was offered him provided he would give them control of Rice's estate.

DELAY COSTS BAY CITY MUCH MONEY

Engineer Freeman Pleads the Hetch Hetchy Case Before Secretary Fisher.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, Nov. 29.—Speaking for San Francisco here today in the Hetch Hetchy water project proceedings, Engineer John R. Freeman told Secretary of the Interior Fisher that if the demands of those opposed to the project were complied with it would mean a delay of five years and a further investigation expense of \$500,000 to San Francisco.

Fisher declared, however, that because of the opposition of other cities he would expect additional data to convince him that other water sources were not available. The San Franciscans interpreted this as meaning that the secretary wanted to defend himself against all possible future attacks that his decision might precipitate.

CHapel AT Mt. Angel TO BE GREATLY ENLARGED

(Special to The Journal.) Mount Angel, Or., Nov. 29.—Preparations are now under way for an extensive addition to the college chapel to make room for the new pipe organ to be installed. This organ, which will cost several thousand dollars, is donated by a benefactor of the monastery. The faculty has a force of carpenters at work to have the building completed before the Christmas holidays, when the new organ will be played for the first time.

EAST SIDE STREETCAR CRASHES INTO AUTO

A streetcar and an automobile collided about 3 o'clock this morning at Hawthorne avenue and East Twelfth, the front wheels of the machine being badly damaged. The driver of the automobile left the scene of the accident without giving bystanders his name. TREAT CONVICTS LIKE MEN THERE

Henry Teal Praises Warden Reed of Washington State Prison.

High praise for Warden Reed and the manner in which the Washington state prison is conducted, was voiced here today by Henry Teal who has just returned from a business trip to Walla Walla. While in Walla Walla he visited the penitentiary.

"What impressed me most forcibly," said Mr. Teal, "is the fact that the prisoners, through their work, have made the penitentiary self-supporting. The profits from the jute mill practically pay the cost of the operating expenses of the institution. I am told, and in addition the convicts make all the clothes used in other state institutions."

"As yet they receive no compensation for their work, but the fact that the institution pays its own way is a long step toward the ultimate fulfillment of the movement which will enable each felon in prison walls to earn some small wage paid by the state for the support of dependent members of his family."

"This is something I hope to see brought about in time. At present a convict gives his whole laboring to the state, while his family is thrown on the mercy of the world. In prison he is fed and clothed and therefore the greatest burden of his punishment falls on his family. This is not just, in my opinion."

"The prison is operated on the theory of 'good food' and for this reason the usual complaint of 'poor food' made in most penal institutions is lacking at Walla Walla."

"Cleanliness is the rule. The buildings, which are splendidly constructed, simply shine, and I noted that the usual odor found in practically every penitentiary was lacking. The jute mill and tailor shop are both run by electricity. A new auditorium which was opened for the first time yesterday has just been constructed by the convicts."

"The cells, however, in my opinion, are too small, and no running water is in them. Otherwise there is very little to criticize."

"At present there is something over 1000 men imprisoned at Walla Walla and the cost of their maintenance averages \$1 cents daily for each man."

"Much liberty is allowed the men, and they are given opportunities for entertainment to offset to that degree the hum drum existence which marks prison life."
