

Chief of Engineers of War Department Gives Estimates on Improvements in Oregon, California and Washington. 180,000.

(United Frem Leased Wire.) Washington, Dec. 3.—The following estimates for river and harbor improve-iments were submitted to congess to-day by the chief engineers of the war department:
