

# SUMS FOR COAST RIVERS, HARBORS WORK SUBMITTED

### Chief of Engineers of War Department Gives Estimates on Improvements in Oregon, California and Washington.

(United Press Special Wire.)  
Washington, Dec. 3.—The following estimates for river and harbor improvements were submitted to congress today by the chief engineers of the war department:

**California.**  
San Diego—\$25,000.  
Los Angeles—Dredging inner harbor to 20 feet, \$101,000; dredging two channels on turning basin to east and west basins of inner harbor, \$20,000.  
San Luis Obispo harbor, \$46,000.  
Los Angeles—New plan of improvements to obtain increased depth in outer harbor submitted. Cost estimated at \$27,250.  
San Francisco harbor, \$100,000. (Estimated that \$40,000 will be required to complete existing projects.)  
Bedwood creek, \$20,000.  
Oakland harbor \$275,000. (Estimated that \$500,000, \$81 additional will be required to complete existing projects.)  
San Pablo Bay—For works of improvement, \$230,000; for maintenance of improvements, \$40,000.  
Folsom channels, \$14,500.  
Petaluma creek and Japa river (consolidated), \$18,000.  
Monterey river harbor (exclusive of

amount available for fiscal year 1913, or about \$200,000 and portion of funds to be contributed by local interests), \$400,000.  
Tumbolt harbor and bay, \$200,000. (Estimated that \$107,400 will be required for completion of projects.)  
Eureka channel, for works of improvement, \$200,000; Eureka channel, for maintenance of improvements, \$220,000. (Both exclusive of expended balance from 1912.)  
Sacramento and Feather rivers, \$40,000.  
San Joaquin river, for works of improvement, \$159,632; San Joaquin river, for maintenance of improvements, \$25,500.

Canal at the Cascades, Columbia river, \$100,000.  
Nehalem bar and entrance to Nehalem Bay, \$100,000.  
Willamette river above Portland and Yamhill river, \$42,000.  
Columbia and lower Willamette rivers below Portland, \$280,000; for continuing contract work, \$120,000. (Estimated amount required for completion of project, \$2,575,000.)  
Mouth of Columbia river, Oregon and Washington, \$1,000,000 for works of improvement and for maintenance.  
Clatskanie river—No new appropriation; balance available, \$190.  
Cowlitz and Lewis rivers, \$25,500.  
**Washington.**  
Grays river, \$500.  
Willapa river and harbor, \$42,122.  
Grays harbor and bar entrance—No new appropriation, that of 1911 continued for \$655,000.  
Grays harbor, inner portion between Aberdeen and Chehalis river, \$20,000.  
Puget sound and tributaries' waters, \$25,000.  
Olympia harbor—No new appropriation; balance from 1912 continued.  
Tacoma harbor—No new appropriation; 1912 balance available of \$25,514.  
Waterway connecting Puget sound with Lakes Union and Washington—For works of improvement, \$1,000,000; for maintenance of improvement, \$500,000.  
Snohomish river, \$75,000.  
Skagit river, \$25,000.  
Bellingham harbor—No new appropriation; continuing contract authorization of \$52,250.  
Columbia river, between Bridgeport and Kettle Falls, \$25,000.  
Improvement plans submitted as fol-

lows: Hoquiam river, \$12,225; ship canal between Port Townsend Bay and Oak Harbor, \$62,500.
