

HORSE SHOWS ARE OPENED BY NEW CHAMPION

Cortina With Mrs. W. S. Biddle Up Wins From Bobbie Burns, Ridden by Miss Elizabeth Huber; Society Out.

Once upon a time, before the advent of woman suffrage and gasoline and such to change our ways, the custom was to ride a horseback or drive behind stylish animals to the horse show. But in accordance with the modern spirit, Portland society folk went in autos to the sixth annual horse show which opened last night at Kramer's Riding Academy, Sixteenth and Jefferson streets.

That, however, did not detract a whit from the brilliancy of the show. Rather it added to the importance of the horse show. There were more fine animals on exhibition, the riding was better and the horse show more excellent than any previous horse show held in Portland. All in all it was a brilliant success.

The horse show is always an event of particular charm to those prominent in society, and last night nearly 600 fashionably dressed folk occupied the boxes and galleries above the tankard. The exhibition ring was gay with fluttering decorations.

Mrs. Biddle Takes Honors.

Triumphal honors for the first night of the show were won by Mrs. W. S. Biddle on her bay mare Cortina, of Kramer's riding school, when she defeated Miss Elizabeth Huber on her famous winner of last year, the black gelding Bobbie Burns. Four times last year Bobbie Burns carried off first honors, but last night by a splendid display of horsemanship Mrs. Biddle took the trophy.

This event was in the combination class for ladies' saddle horses over 15.2 hands.

But probably the prettiest spectacle of the night was the drill, beautiful in execution, of eight gentlemen and eight ladies from Kramer's riding school. Trained and led by W. S. Elliott, of Kramer's school, they went through an intricate mane of formations without a falter. They rode singly around the ring, in doubles, in fours, and in abreast, wheeled, trotted and galloped, and not a single wrong movement marred the performance.

Particularly impressive was the horsemanship of the riders, their erect seats and the position of their hands, all perfect in execution. Mr. Elliott and his class were enthusiastically applauded as the flying hoofs of the horses thudded over the tankard in the formations of the drill.

New Horse Gets Blue Ribbon.

Another event which drew deep interest centered was the competition to decide the best pair of hunters ridden by lady and gentleman over the jumps. Again the team representing Kramer's riding school, and composed of Mr. Elliott and Mrs. Chester G. Murphy, took the trophy. They were awarded first prize by the judges over Eugene Oppenheimer and Mrs. James Nicol, mounted on two spirited hunters with many past laurels to their credit, from the Portland Hunt club, Oregon Frank and Will Wehrung, Murphy and Mr. Elliott of the winning team were mounted on Kitty and Robert Bruce.

Miss Huber's Bobbie Burns, defeated by Mrs. Biddle on Cortina in the combination class, was a spirited first in the ladies' saddle horse event, Cortina taking third.

One of the horses appearing at a Portland show for the first time was Gladys L., who, ridden by Miss Jean Morrison, also making her debut in the ring, took the blue ribbon as the best saddle horse under 15.2 hands. Gladys L. was a blue ribbon winner in the east, with triumphs in Kentucky and at the St. Louis show before she was brought to Portland for Miss Morrison. She was ridden under the colors of Kramer's riding school.

In fact, seven of the 11 blue ribbons awarded on the opening night, were captured by riders from Kramer's school. Splendid horsemanship was also displayed by the riders from the Portland riding school.

There will be a matinee today beginning at 2 o'clock. Tonight's final program will begin at 8 o'clock. One of the entries in which there is great interest is Flashlight, belonging to Mrs. C. E. McKenna, winner of nine cups. A feature tonight will be the award of the 25 trophies to the winners.

BAKER STEPS IN HOLE, NOW HE WANTS CITY SIDEWALK INSPECTOR

"There's a hole in the sidewalk on Second street, near the corner of Morrison," observed Chairman George L. Baker of the council, stepped into the mayor's office today.

"Well, what are you going to do about it?" asked Mayor's Secretary McCord.

"I want the sidewalk repaired," returned Councilman Baker.

"How big is the hole?" asked McCord.

"Well, my foot slipped in it the other night when I was hurrying to catch a car," replied Baker.

"You don't want the sidewalk repaired, then," retorted McCord.

"What you want is a new sidewalk," returned Baker.

The foregoing is a little conversation that resulted this morning in Councilman Baker drafting a resolution asking the city council to appoint an inspector of sidewalks whose duty shall be to walk over every foot of concrete walks in the city and report all defects to the city engineer. It is entirely probable that the new office will be created, too, as many of the sidewalks are a menace to life and limb. Councilman Baker believes that, unless these defective walks are repaired, the city will sooner or later face a heavy damage suit.

PORTLAND BUYS RIP HAGERMAN OF LINCOLN

Lincoln, Neb., Dec. 7.—The Lincoln club of the Western league this afternoon consummated a deal with the Portland club of the Pacific coast league, whereby Rip Hagerman was sold for \$103,000. Hagerman was sold for a round price, said to be about \$2000. Hagerman took part in 51 games last year. He won 23 and lost 18 for an average of .561, which was quite remarkable for a club that finished poor, in the second division.

POURED "DOPED" MILK INTO CITY SEWER

M. J. Domes of McCoy, Or., breeder of fancy cattle and a noted figure at all the big livestock shows of the northwest in recent years, has fallen under the displeasure of City Milk Chemist E. C. Calloway. So strongly is the milk chemist opposed to Domes' method of doing business that he has condemned 1909 pounds of milk shipped by Domes to a Portland creamery and between November 27 and December 2, Calloway has emptied this amount of milk from the Domes farm into the city sewers.

"We have discovered that large quantities of creamery milk have been watered and colored within the past few weeks," said Mr. Calloway today, "and when we found that Domes was one of the offenders we decided to make an example of him to deter others from the practice of adulterating milk. We notified the state dairy and food commissioner to investigate the Domes farm and inform the owner that his milk would be excluded from the Portland market unless he should discontinue his illegal methods."

CITY COMMITTEE TO FIND WAYS TO HELP RUSH HOUR SERVICE

Mayor Rushlight today appointed a committee to investigate service and traffic conditions on local street rail ways with the object in view of bettering conditions during the rush hours. The committee, which was authorized by the city council, will have full power to conduct attendance of witnesses at a series of hearings that will be held.

Councilman Allan R. Joy is chairman of the committee. The other two members are Councilmen H. W. Wallace and John M. H. Wood. The public is urged to send in any complaints they wish to make to the city auditor, who will submit the protests to the committee.

PROGRESS IS SLOW IN ARCHBOLD CASE

May Testifies He Didn't Know of Pending Litigation When He Made Deal.

Washington, Dec. 7.—Twelve of the 13 articles in the impeachment trial before the senate of Judge Robert W. Archbald, chief of the commerce court, charged with "misbehavior and misdemeanor" in office, are yet to be presented, indicating that the trial will not be concluded before the Christmas holidays.

The trial has been in progress nearly a week, and the evidence in the first article, referring to the Katydild Culp bank deal, is unfinished.

Senator Bacon ruled this afternoon that each side might read to witnesses from the records of the house hearings to refresh their memories.

Under cross-examination W. A. May, vice president and general manager of the Hillside Iron & Coal company, a subsidiary of the Erie railroad, asserted that when he fixed the price on the Katydild Culp bank he did not know the Erie railroad had any litigation pending in the commerce court.

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HUMANE SOCIETY'S REPORT INDICATES GREAT WORK DONE

Main Office Open Night and Day in Behalf of Worthy Cause; Auto Travels 5800 Miles During Period.

At the regular monthly meeting of the Oregon Humane society Friday, report of business done during the past seven months showed a great deal of good having been accomplished. Manager Rudersdorf reports that 1403 calls were made from the local office; 2394 horses and mules have been examined. Many of them were laid off and a number were destroyed; 179 dogs have been examined; 54 destroyed; 694 cats examined and 621 destroyed; 117 grading camps visited and recommendations made thereby making the operation of the camp easier upon the stock. A number of arrests have been made in these camps and two rockpile sentences imposed.

The automobile donated to the society by ex-President August Berg has become most valuable and has traveled 5800 miles. The society has placed warning notices on 211 grades in the city and has handed 1255 blocks of slippery pavement. Two officers are continuously on duty and the central office is open day and night.

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"EAL! EAL!" CHRISTMAS SHOPPERS ARE TURNING OUT NOW, STORE OWNERS SAY.

Christmas Shoppers are Turning Out Now, Store Owners Say.

"Do your Christmas shopping early." Bombarded on all sides, by advertisements, personal appeals, and notices, Portland shoppers apparently are responding to the imperative demand and are buying Christmas goods earlier than usual, according to heads of the larger stores.

With only 17 days remaining before St. Nicholas rewards good boys and girls, and bad ones too, for that matter, shopkeepers look for the beginning of the big rush this afternoon and tonight.

"If the shoppers will only buy their Christmas presents early as we urge, we every man alive will not be compelled to handle the usual deluge of orders that pour in on us the last three days before Christmas," said a department store head today.

"We have taken pains to get our Christmas displays on the counters early this year and have urged, so far as every man is able to make, their purchases as soon as they possibly can. Those who come first will have more time to make selections and of course will have a more comprehensive stock to choose from.

"In addition they will do a real kindness by saving the clerks from overwork and the time money time will save themselves from the worry and crush of those who put off buying gifts and goods which they knew they were going to buy weeks ago."

Knowing from experience that the rush of shoppers will increase with each succeeding day, virtually all the stores have been adding their shop forces and the delivery departments as well.

"We are doing our share, to handle the Christmas rush," declared the storemen, "and the shoppers should now do their part by shopping early."

COE AND BROWN OFF TO CHICAGO MEETING

Dr. Henry Waldo Coe, national committee member of the Progressive party and George Arthur Brown, state chairman, left last night for Chicago to attend the conference of new party leaders in that city next Tuesday. They will explain why Roosevelt failed to carry Oregon and tell what they think should be done for the future of the party.

Dr. Coe as national committee also appointed Mrs. M. L. T. Hilden, J. D. Lewis and Charles W. Ackerson of Portland, J. Frank Hughes of Salem and Dr. I. U. Temple of Pendleton to attend the conference. Mrs. Hilden is now in the east and is expected to represent the women voters. Mr. Lewis, who is colored, left for Chicago three days ago. Mr. Ackerson could not go. Dr. Coe said yesterday that he hopes that both Hughes and Temple will be on hand, but neither is certain.

CITY HALL CLERK DIDN'T RECOGNIZE HIS OWN CHIEF

City Inspector of Buildings H. E. Plummer "put one over" on a new clerk this morning. Mr. Plummer has been on a leave of absence for more than a month, and when he applied at the desk today for a permit, the clerk, who was appointed after Mr. Plummer went on leave, did not know his boss.

The building inspector is having two extra rooms built in the attic of his residence at 496 East Thirty-third street. The fee for a permit to do this is \$1.

"Employees of the building inspection department don't have to pay for permits, do they?" asked Mr. Plummer of the novice.

"Why, are you an employee of the department?" asked the clerk.

When Mr. Plummer gravely assured his deputy that he was on the staff of the building inspection, the latter expressed polite incredulity.

"It wouldn't make any difference, however, if you were the building inspector, himself, you'd have to pay for the permit," he courteously remarked the clerk after an interval.

"All right, then, here's the dollar," was Mr. Plummer's final retort, as he passed over the money and took the permit. The clerk glanced at the name on the permit, and then gasped, but his boss had already left the office.

ARREST TWO ON VICE CHARGES IN VANCOUVER

News of the capture of two more of the men wanted in the vice scandal was received in a message this morning stating that Roy Kadel and Fred Clark were taken into custody in Vancouver, B. C., and are bound for Portland in charge of Detective Abbott of the local police. According to the telegram their arrival was scheduled for 6 o'clock this morning but no word has been received regarding them as yet. Both are under indictment.

Det. V. Meagher was arrested yesterday afternoon by Detective Hunt and is out under bonds of \$2000. He is implicated in the scandal by Howard Bateman, one of the three brought to Portland yesterday from Seattle but maintains he is innocent. The other two returned from Seattle yesterday are Herbert King and Harry Hawkins. Hawkins and Bateman are held as witnesses.

TO EXAMINE PATIENT AS TO SANITY.

Shouting "God sent me here to stay," William J. Wilson of 731 East Thirty-seventh street, caused a great deal of excitement among the patients and attendants at the St. Vincent's hospital shortly after noon today. It was after several ordeals at the institution had overpowered him and put him in a small room that quiet was restored.

After locking him in the room the police were telephoned for, and Patrolmen Baceay, Sims and Coulter found the madman in a chair singing, when they opened the door. He was taken to the county jail where he will be examined as to his sanity.

TOTAL VALUE OF ALL REALTY IN COUNTY IS \$252,604,175

A recapitulation of assessed value of all property in Multnomah county, with the exception of personal property, shows that there is \$252,604,175 worth of land and improvements on land within Multnomah county. Of these there is \$22,175,000 worth of buildings and improvements worth \$2718,375. Of lots in Portland and the towns in the county there is \$175,474,670 worth, and the improvements and buildings are worth \$52,237,470. Of unplatted and outside the city and towns, there are 176,009.4 acres in the county.

TWO ALASKA BANKERS ON TRIAL AT VALDEZ
