

PORTLAND GETS CRACK INFELDER--HYNES IS GOOD

HEILEMANN, FASTEST CALIFORNIA YOUTH, IS SIGNED BY PORTLAND

Young Semi-Pro Infielder Was Wanted by Many Baseball Clubs.

Harry E. Heilemann, the best semi-professional infielder in California, will be a Portland Beaver next season, the youthful wonder having been signed by James J. Richardson, the former Portland sports writer, who has been doing a little quiet scouting in California for McCredie. Richardson, who is now in the coal business, arrived in Portland this morning on a business trip, and brought along Heilemann's contract for 1913.

Manager Walter McCredie was tickled to death when he learned that Richardson had done something that none of the other California scouts could do. Jersey City of the Eastern league had made a determined effort to get Heilemann's signature to a contract and it was this activity that caused Heilemann's mother to object to his playing professional ball. The Heilemanns are the wealthy soap manufacturers of California, and although Heilemann's mother was willing, the boy's mother didn't fancy the game.

All of the California clubs were after Heilemann but he refused to sign up. He is a chum of Cunningham, the youngster who finished up the season with the Beavers, and that was one of the reasons that influenced him to sign with Portland.

Heilemann began playing baseball at Heart College several years ago. He is a quiet, unassuming fellow, who is now 18 years old, six feet tall and weighs 145 pounds. His regular position is third base, and he has an arm that propels the ball across the diamond like a bullet.

He played seven games with Hanford in the San Joaquin Valley league last summer and hit .438, making 28 hits. He is now playing third for the Shreve team in the San Francisco City league, and making a tremendous hit with his speed and batting. He is a right-handed batter and takes a nice swing at the ball.

Harry Krause, the former Athletic pitcher now with Toledo, is one of the boy's biggest boosters and predicts a brilliant career for him.

McCredie's Return From South. Judge W. W. McCredie and Manager Walter McCredie arrived home yesterday afternoon from the Sacramento meeting, which they described as being mostly a handshaking affair. The judge's schedule was adopted, the opening dates of the Portland club being announced in The Journal about a month ago, when the schedule was made of construction.

Both the McCredies say that Ed Walter came off a bad second best in his encounter with Cal Ewing, and that all of Walter's talk was so much puff. He was caught in the act of a virtual 10-0 victory over Ewing, it is said.

Manager Walter McCredie did not locate his 1913 training camp, although he visited several towns, including Santa Rosa.

LUTHER M'CARTY WAS PEST OF CHICAGO GYM

Chicago, Dec. 13.—Pervasive and aggressive to such an extent that he was a "pest" was attributed to Luther McCarty, conqueror of Pueblo Jim Flynn, during the days that the rangy heavyweight was striving to learn the boxing game, according to a story told here today by "Gilt" O'Connell, a local trainer. "In spite of everything I did to discourage him," said O'Connell, "McCarty persisted in coming around. I tried to get him a manager, but no one would take a chance. He struck out finally on his own hook and found a manager. I will admit that I was fooled in him. I didn't think he had a chance in those days, but now I expect to see him become the champion of the world."

CANADIAN YOUTH IS ANOTHER SPEED ARM FOR BEAVER LEADER

Manager McCredie of Opinion Man With .629 Average Will Make Good.

That Manager McCredie picked up a corking young pitcher in the draft is asserted by recent arrivals in Portland from Ontario province, who have seen Pat Hynes shoot them over the pan for the London club of the Canada league. Hynes is described as a big fellow with tremendous speed who ought to be a bear under Manager Walter McCredie's coaching.

The unofficial averages of the Canadian league give Hynes 17 victories and seven defeats, which is a percentage of .629.

This record is one to be proud of and was a big factor in McCredie's draft.

Hynes, like the majority of pitchers, is no wonder with the willow. He was at bat 88 times in 29 games and made 14 hits for an average of .144. In his hits were two doubles and one triple. He made 21 runs which is good for 29 games. He had nine putouts, 98 assists and four errors for an average of .26.

"I think that Hynes will make one of the best young prospects that I have on the 1913 roster," said Manager Mac this morning. "I am going to give him a careful tryout and if he isn't fast enough for the Coast league, we'll send him over to the Colts for further seasoning. From all the reports I've received I believe that he is capable of making good."

Booster Kores and Hagerman. "Portland got two of the best players that the western league has had in years in Shortstop Kores of Des Moines and Pitcher Hagerman of Lincoln," said George D. Rigns, a recent arrival in Portland from Des Moines. "I had plenty of opportunity to watch Kores work last year in my home town and he is about the speediest young fellow around the short path that you ever saw. I believe he is good enough for a trial in the majors right now. He was the leading shortstop in the western league this last season and hit above .300, so you can see from the cold figures that he is a valuable man."

"Hagerman is a giant in stature and you never saw such speed that he gets out of his arm. I believe that he would be a star in the majors when he was first at Chicago, three years ago. He is a great worker and the Lincoln players say they had a hard time keeping him out of the line. Why, he wanted to pitch every game of the schedule and never complained of a sore arm."

"I am sure that these two western league boys will make good in double A company for although I don't yet see any Coast league games, I know how fast the western league is."

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Chairman Frank Has Been After McAllister and Anderson for February.

Chairman E. B. Frank of the Multnomah club boxing and wrestling committee yesterday received a wire from Chairman Waud of the Olympic club of Portland stating that two or three Olympic club boxers would be sent to Portland during the first part of February.

Frank has been trying to secure McAllister and Anderson of the Olympic club since the Pacific coast championship ship at Los Angeles, and believes he will be successful in landing this duo of clever mixers.

In return, Frank promises to send a couple of glove men to the Olympic show, which will be held the last week of January.

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If Anderson comes he will be sent against Walter Williams, the crack bantamweight of the local club. The Olympic club, however, may substitute some other boxer for Anderson, who is not a consistent performer in foreign rings.

Frank plans to stage the meet, including the city championships, February 10 or 11.

VOGLER BUILDING A CRAFT OF ORIGINAL DESIGN FOR RACING

Plan Boat With Four Engines for Harmsworth Trophy Challenger.

To build a motor boat capable of sustaining a definite speed over a Marathon course is the aim of F. W. Vogler, president of the Northwest Auto company, and his brother, Frank. They are now working on a craft of original design and believe they will produce one that will make a place on the team that goes to Europe next year to represent America in the Harmsworth cup race. Anyway, they promise that the Oregon Wolf will not be the only contender from Oregon for this honor.

Terrific speed, in the opinion of the automobile distributor, is not essential to winning a long distance motor boat race. The grueling grind to which a 50-mile course subjects the speeder, makes it more imperative that a craft of power be obtained, Vogler believes. It is his object to construct a craft as swift as the fastest boats but to complete one that will sustain a speed a few miles lower than the high mark of the champions.

"Bad weather is an element that must be seriously considered," said Mr. Vogler, "and we want a boat that will go through the worst kind and still maintain its maximum speed. In this we are confident that we will be able to make the power plant more reliable."

World Spend \$15,000.

If necessary the Voglers are preparing to spend \$15,000 in perfecting a boat that will perform in the manner they want. The work of constructing it has been going on for some weeks. Four regular Reo automobile engines, driving two screws, will supply the power. This will give 70 actual horse-power on each propeller.

"Many of the contenders will be capable of a speed of 40 miles an hour," continued Mr. Vogler in discussing the new boat, "but I am certain that this speed cannot be maintained over a 50-mile course. I believe that a continuous performance at a slightly lower speed will win the race. The records into the records of boats at recognized meets will bear out the statement that sustained speed has always won. Boat builders have tried to get too much by trying to construct a craft that will keep up a terrific speed."

If work on the new boat progresses with the rapidity it has in the past few weeks, they hope to have it ready for a trial spin about February 1.

AGGIE BASKETBALL '5 TO START TOUR DEC. 21

Everything Is Arranged for Long Journey Over United States.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Or., Dec. 13.—The O. A. C. basketball team will play the second game of the season with the team of Company D, Third Infantry, O. N. G., on the local floor, tonight. On the soldier team are four old O. A. C. stars—Swann, Cate, Blyden and Thompson, and the Aggie quintet will have no small task to crack when they meet on the floor tonight. All of these men know the strong defensive system worked up by Dr. Stewart, so will have a decided advantage over the Beavers.

During the past week Dr. Stewart has been covering up the deficiencies which were displayed in the game with Silverton last Saturday night. These two preliminary games are the only opportunities that the O. A. C. squad will have in which to gain experience before starting out on the tour of the United States, which it is proposed to take during the Christmas holidays and the first part of January, and the coaches are making the best of it.

The schedule of the contemplated trip will be put up to the faculty athletic committee today, for their approval. Games have been secured with nearly all of the larger eastern institutions, such as Cornell, Princeton, Columbia, Purdue, and others in that class. If the faculty committee approves of the trip, the matter will be laid before the college council for final approval. It is proposed to leave the campus December 21, and the first game will be played with the Triple B team at Billings, Mont. The men will return to college sometime in the latter part of January. The finances of the trip are practically assured. All of the necessary money for the trip has been provided for by contracts with the visited institutions, with the exception of not quite \$1000. Of this remaining amount, the business men of Corvallis have raised \$500 by subscription, and it is expected that the rest can be raised from the athletic fund of the college.

SILVERTON PRESERVES EXPANDED BY FARMERS

Deputy Game Warden Mount Encouraged by Residents of Waldo Hills.

(Special to The Journal.) Silverton, Or., Dec. 13.—Deputy Game Warden J. K. Mount has just closed a deal with a number of Waldo Hills farmers near this city, whereby the game refuge has been increased by about 600 acres of land. Those who have recently agreed to allow their land to be placed upon this list are J. H. T. W. and C. R. Riches and L. B. Haherby.

Several others have expressed a willingness to enter soon, and it is expected that within the next few weeks the recent addition will be doubled. A few months ago Mr. Mount succeeded in securing about 1500 acres from the Benedictine Fathers of Mt. Angel, all of which is located in a body within a short distance of Silverton.

The interest Mr. Mount is taking in the fish and game situation in this part of Oregon is quite gratifying to sportsmen. He has succeeded in having placed in the streams in this vicinity more than 6000 young fish during the past summer, and he is at present advocating better protection for them.

It is firmly of the opinion that the fishing season should be shortened and allow those which have recently been placed in the streams an opportunity to propagate in a reasonable manner. He has also succeeded in getting much better fishways established in the streams than have heretofore been enjoyed.

By defeating the University of Oregon football eleven by more points than it defeated the Aggies, the members of the Multnomah football squad will be the guests of several Corvallis business men at a banquet tomorrow night in Richards' grill at Park and Alder streets.

Multnomah beat the Aggies 9 to 6, and beat the Oregon warriors 18 to 6. As a result of their winning the Corvallis men are treating the members of the Winged "M" squad.
