

MOTHER GIVES UP BLOOD FOR COIN

Deserted Woman Makes Heroic Sacrifice for Little Ones.

Baltimore, Dec. 12.—Deserted by her husband, with no support for herself and 7-year-old boy twins, and herself ill in the hospital, a mother gave up a quantity of her blood in order to obtain money for their support. The mother is Mrs. Ethel Brown, of 312 East Hamburg street, and the story of her sacrifice became public when Detective Thomas Quirk returned from Vineland, N. J., bringing with him Charles Leroy Brown, the husband and father, who has been indicted by the grand jury here for deserting his wife and failing to provide for the support of herself and little ones.

According to Detective Quirk, last March Brown, who is a glassworker, deserted his wife and boy twins and disappeared from the city.

During her illness her small savings had slowly dwindled until she had but a few pennies left and it was while she was a patient that she sold a quantity of her blood for \$25 in order to pay the board of her other babies, who were being looked after by friends. Learning one day that a patient in another institution was in a serious condition and that the only hope of the surgeons was in transfusing some healthy blood into the body of the patient, Mrs. Brown offered to sell some of her blood. The surgeons were notified of the offer of the mother and in a short time an examination of her blood was made. The result was that her blood was found to be very healthy and a vein in her left wrist was opened and the blood taken. Mrs. Brown stood the operation very well and in a few weeks was able to leave the institution.

TILLMAN WANTS HIS WIFE BACK

"I Will Conquer Your Spirit or Die," Writes Senator's Son to Woman.

Columbia, S. C., Dec. 12.—"Just as surely as Ben Tillman had the force of character to overthrow the old regime of aristocrats in South Carolina, so have I the strength of mind to make you love, honor and obey me," is part of a letter written by Benjamin R. Tillman Jr. to his divorced wife, Mrs. Lucy Dugas, which appears in the papers in a suit filed by Tillman today to get possession of their children, Douschka and Sarah. The plaintiff is a son of Senator Tillman and Mrs. Dugas is a granddaughter of Governor Pickens, who was minister to Russia under President Buchanan.

Throughout the letter Tillman alludes to his former wife as a member of the "bourgeois class" and speaks of himself as of noble origin; but declares that he will crush her proud spirit and compel her to love him. Defending the senator's political course, to which the family of Mrs. Dugas was bitterly antagonistic, Tillman says:

"Tillmanism comes to redeem South Carolina from the atrophy that was upon her when ruled by the cult from which you came. You shall acknowledge it."

"You own Edgewood, your friends are loyal, you are strong, you have the anti-Tillman press and you have the supreme court with you. Hear me, little aristocrat thoroughbred, they have no terrors for me."

"The average man does not know how the eagles fly or take their quarry. You and I are fighting with a grimness that means much to both, high above the clouds and in a kind of ether few will understand, but I will control your spirit or die."

In concluding the letter Tillman repeatedly expresses his love for Mrs. Dugas.

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GIVE YOUR ADVICE VERY SPARINGLY

President James Says He Had the Habit but Thinks It Foolish.

Washington, Dec. 12.—"Don't be so free with your advice," President Edmund J. James of the University of Illinois, told the National Association of

State Universities, just before the organization elected him president for the coming year.

"You don't know enough to tell anybody what he should or should not do, even though you are college presidents. Nobody knows enough," President James censured college heads for telling students they should be doctors and diplomats when they are best fitted to be streetcar conductors and ice men. He declared many young fellows ruin their lives by trying to do something they can't.

"College presidents, like other persons, are too narrow minded to map out vocations for anybody," he asserted.

"Books and test tubes aren't everything there is to life—there's lots more outside the college," he continued. "Men should just naturally fall into their

places in the world; nobody can shove them in. If they do, they don't fit."

"A young fellow came to the University of Illinois not long ago to become an electrical engineer. Everybody he knew advised him to become one. In his junior year he met a chap who was studying music. He then decided to study music, too. He got along fine—fact is, he's the best in the class. It's going to be noise instead of volts for him for the rest of his life."

"Why, I've given advice to my sons, my brothers, my uncles and neighbors all my life, and the older I get the more I think I didn't know what I was talking about."

"Of course it's well to say, 'Don't drink, or swear, or gamble.' Everybody agrees about that; but further—it's best to be silent."
