Happenings of Human Interest Occurring Throughout the World After Yesterday's Issue Went to Press.

Congressional.

The senate, sitting as a court of impeachment at the trial of Judge Robert W. Archibald of the commerce court, charged with misbehavior and misdemeanor in office, has ordered the prosecution to close its presentation of evidence by Saturday. Attorney A. S. Worthington, representing Judge Archibald, announced the defense would rest its case by the end of next week.

Argument in favor of the Hardy bill, providing that at least three navigating officers must be carried on every deep sea steam vessel with a tonnage of over 1000 tons made before the full senate commerce committee Thursday by William Westcott of San Francisco, president of the Association of Master Mariners and Pilots of the Pacific. The Hardy bill already has passed the house.

Representative Barthold of Missouri has introduced a joint resolution to provide for a constitutional amendment to restrict presidential tenure to two terms of four years each, with ineligibility for reelection thereafter.

Bitter denunciation of the representations of Captain Hibbard of San Francisco, an official of the Pacific Coast Steamship company, against the seamen's bill, was voiced Thursday by officials of the Seamen's union. Hibbard asserted that coast seamen earn \$30 a month, but the union leaders say seamen have to work 80 hours overtime during the month to make the amount.

A bill providing for an eight hour work day and six days' work for women employed in factories in the District of Columbia was introduced Thursday by Senator La Follette.

According to the report of engineers, which was sent to congress Thursday, \$100,000 could be saved in the total cost of the Dallas-Celilo canal and the project could be completed by December, 1914, if congress would make ample appropriation. An appropriation of \$1,200,000 must be made in March, 1913, and an additional sum of \$495,000 in June, 1914, to accomplish these results.

Democratic senators in caucus Thursday appointed a committee to plan action concerning President Taft's federal nominations.

The senate on Thursday took up the omnibus claims bill.

Political.

Jerry B. Sullivan, of Des Moines, Ia., aspirant for the secretaryship of commerce and labor, may become a member of the new cabinet. Sullivan is in receipt today of a letter requesting that he meet President-elect Wilson in New York upon the latter's return from Bermuda. Sullivan has the support of Iowa Democrats.

The National Progressive conference ended at Chicago Thursday night, and Colonel Roosevelt returned to New York jubilant over the work accomplished. Although delegates sought to have the permanent headquarters of the party's executive committee located in various parts of the country, New York was selected by a vote of 13 to 12.

Colorado's first woman state senator, Helen Ring Robinson, who was elected at the November election, will introduce a bill at the next assembly requiring health certificates from all couples desiring to marry.

Analysis of the final election returns in California shows that Wilson carried six of the 11 congressional districts by large majorities, that Roosevelt carried three by large majorities, and two by slender margins. Wilson carried 41 counties and Roosevelt 17.

The Swiss federal assembly has elected as president of the Swiss confederation President Muller, at present chief of the military department.

Harrowing details of their treatment by the police were told by the defendants examined Thursday at the resumption of the trial of the 106 Koreans charged with conspiring against Count Terauchi, Japanese governor-general of Corea. One prisoner declared he had been hanged by his hair, which pulled off his scalp.

K. Korostovets, the Russian minister at Peking, has warned China that the rupture of their negotiations is imminent unless China ceases to delay the settlement of the Mongolian question.

Miscellaneous.

Plans have been made for the final disposition of the Geronimo band of Apache Indians, held as military prisoners at Fort Sill. Eighty-six of them elected to stay at Fort Sill and the remainder of the 200 will be located on permanent homes in New Mexico.

The department of agriculture announced Thursday that the 1912-13 cotton crop of the United States would amount to 13,820,000 bales of 500 pounds each. The value of the crop greatly exceeds that of last year, which was \$21,010,000.

Charles Battista, an Italian, under sentence of death for murder, made a declaration at Montreal Thursday that Joseph Petrosino, a New York detective, killed by the order of a powerful band of Italian who preyed upon their countrymen and whose practice Petrosino had unearthed.

Charles Wolcott, who fell 3000 feet with a balloon in South America 17 years ago, died at Edmonton Thursday, after an illness of several months. Wolcott held the distinction of being the only man so far as known to recover from such a fall.

It is announced that Rear-Admiral W. C. Cowles, commandant of the United States naval station at Honolulu, would be relieved February 21. It was said unofficially that he would become commandant of the Pacific fleet.

X-Ray Machine Used.

The use of a machine to show X-ray photographs was resorted to in the trial of the damage case of Emily S. Bingham against Holtz before Circuit Judge Kavanaugh this morning and excited much interest. Photographs were shown illustrating fractures of the shoulder which Mrs. Bingham complains she received by falling into the elevator pit in the Holtz store. The fall was not great, but she claims she was injured by falling among pipes projecting from the floor. She asks \$10,210 damages for her injuries.

COLD WEATHER CROWDS JAILS AND ROCKPILES
Cold weather is filling the jails and rockpiles of the city and county, and as road work has shut down practically everywhere, the authorities face a serious problem. A letter was sent to Mayor Rushlight this morning by the county commissioners to the effect that the city can have control of the Linnton rockpile and the product of the quarry until next March. Eighty city prisoners are at present at that quarry.

At Kelly Butte there is work for but 30 prisoners, as only two auto trucks are in use. All are county prisoners. There are 105 county prisoners at Kelly Butte at present.

Admits Embezzlement Charge.
A plea of guilty to embezzlement was entered before Circuit Judge Morrow yesterday by Sam Kelly, a former employee of the Brown-Richards company, who was charged with taking \$134.

The \$50 silver cup offered by the Northwest Poultry Journal for the best exhibit of 25 cockerels of any one variety was awarded to M. J. Meyers, president of the Oregon Poultry & Live Stock association, at the poultry show today. Mr. Meyers exhibited Barred Plymouth Rocks.

Other special premiums for pens and collections will be awarded this afternoon as soon as the various scores are averaged by Secretary C. D. Milston.

Included among the special prizes and sweepstakes are the \$50 Paga trophy and 11 silver cups that were put up by the association.

Judges Collier and Purvis completed their work this forenoon. They plan to leave Portland tomorrow. Collier for Pomeroy, Wash., where he will judge a show there and Purvis to Eugene on a similar mission.

"The birds exhibited at this show," said Mr. Collier today, "were among the best I ever saw and they averaged unusually high."

President M. J. Meyers said this afternoon that he will be in the field for reelection when the association chooses its officers next week.

"While I will not campaign for the position," said Mr. Meyers, "I am ready to take office again if the members of the association see fit to choose me."

Last night the members of the East Side Business Men's club visited the show in a body, as an official expression of their interest in it.

Tonight local chicken fanciers will entertain out of town poultrymen at a banquet at the Clifford hotel, East Sixth and Morrison streets. The show will close tomorrow night.

"PEN" OF FUTURE GREAT INDUSTRIAL COLLEGE—BAUER

Chaplain's Report Is Splendid Plea for Honor Plan and for Steady Work With Some Pay for Convicts.

(Union Bureau of The Journal.)

Salem, Or., Dec. 13.—"No schooling has been of more benefit than that provided by our 'honor' system," declares Chaplain Philip E. Bauer of the state penitentiary, in his report to Governor West. "When we started the policy of putting men out on their honor, we touched the spring unfolding a lot of the latent power in some of the boys of this prison which had never before been known."

Critics may howl and bemoan this system, but it is here to stay, and it is one of the greatest factors in producing dependable men. The majority of the men we have to deal with here have been kicked most of their lives, and so are more responsive to any trust bestowed upon them. They sometimes fail, as others do when trusted. But there is nothing that gives heart and purpose like being put on honor.

"Counting our parole men, trustees and the honor groups out on road gangs and at the state institutions, we have close to one half of the men under our charge trusted, and not driven by fear of Winchester. These men are not being sullenly driven as abject slaves of fear. Personally, I hope there will never be any disposition to retrench on this system of honor, but rather a leading purpose to make it ramify into every nook of this prison."

"One thing which would undoubtedly work for good in our prison would be graduated compensation for all men, beginning, say, at the expiration of one half of their minimum sentence, providing, also, that they work industriously and need no disciplining. This pay may not be much, but enough so that men with families could send a little home, and it would be the part of wisdom to favor the men with families dependent upon them. This would also obviate the difficulty that often confronts men who go out of our prison gates with little or no money, and for this reason are soon led back to a life of crime."

"Work is man's savior, especially the criminal's. It is doubtful if as much good will come to others from the beautiful grounds and better equipment as will come to the men who made these improvements."

"Two years ago one third of the men of our institution were killing themselves trying to kill time. Now every man of the prison, save a few in the hospital, is at work. The tailor shops, the shoe shops, printing shop, casket shop, machine shop, paint shop, the

kitchen crews, rock crusher, are busy scenes of industry. Outside the walls the farmers, road crews, rock crusher gangs and others working at the state institutions are rising habits of industry and incidentally banking a little money which will be of great service when parole day comes. We welcome with delight the day when this prison shall be known far and wide as a great 'Industrial College.'"

WILL ASK ARREST OF WITNESS IN VICE CASE

Charges are to be preferred against the arrest of Louis Anderson asked for blackmail as soon as he leaves the stand in the trial of Dr. Harry A. Start this afternoon, according to Samuel Johnson, attorney for Dr. Start. Mr. Johnson declares that Anderson bothered Start for days after Start's arrest for money with which to leave town and finally went to Attorney William H. Hume, Start's other counsel, with a proposition that he be given funds to leave town.

Earl Van Hulen was called to the stand this morning and corroborated the statements made yesterday by Fred Rodby regarding his visit to Dr. Start's office. The story was the same, the Rodby told. James Pruden, collector of a tailoring establishment, told of a call he made at the office of Dr. Start to collect a bill.

Earl Taylor, the last witness called this morning, was questioned closely by Attorney Hume regarding a visit made to Dr. Start's office to collect a dishonored check signed by Mrs. Start in an attempt to show animus in Taylor's testimony.
