Faulder Keeps Up His Spirits
by Jocular; Garrison Is
Steadfast in Story of Inno-
cence; Roberts Writes.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.)
Salem, Or., Dec. 13.—Last night the four condemned men in their death cells heard for the last time the grating of the steel bars and the shouts of the guards as the other convicts were counted and locked in their cells.

but Mike Morgan, Noble Faulder and H. E. Roberts declined to be seen.
Merry Jests of Doomed Men.
Faulder was jocular most of the time throughout the day. He frequently called to others of the condemned men with some jesting remark. Morgan was taken out to have his picture taken in citizen's clothes. He wore a white collar.

"Hey Mike, what did you do with that collar?" shouted Faulder, after Morgan had been returned to his cell. The cells of the condemned men are in a row on an upper tier.
"I'm saving it," replied Morgan.
"You won't need that collar tomorrow," said Faulder. "There'll be a rope in its place."

Just before night he finished a poem in which he maintained his innocence, and stated if the affidavits he had sent for came in time they would prove to the governor that it was not he who committed the crime.

man, had planned to make a 10-minute speech, which he had prepared with great care. The guests were much relieved when he changed his mind.
"I want to say," he shouted, advancing to the rail and looking down upon the audience, "that I did not commit the crime of which I was convicted. I was convicted on perjured testimony. The false witnesses were—"
He started to name them, but his voice broke, and for a moment he stood choking.
"Gentlemen," he said, "I have prepared a statement which will be given to the press.
Tall, wiry, immensely strong, Faulder then stepped to the rail and in a voice clear and strong, said:
"Hanging will never cure crime. You've got to get at the root of the evil."
The black caps were fitted on. The

nooses were adjusted. "My God, not so tight!" groaned Garrison. It was odd that at that moment he should mind a trifling pain.
Faulder said not a word.
Twelve men stood in a row, their faces haggard and drawn, performing an official duty. They were the jury. The doctors listened at the breasts of the men who were all but dead and caught the feeble, fluttering pulses of hearts that were reluctant to quit beating.
At 11:56 one of the three doctors said: "They are dead."

Even as he spoke there came the sound of tramping feet, as guards brought up the stairs two wooden coffins. The bodies were cut down and stuffed in the boxes. And that was the end of Garrison and Faulder.
Then came Mike Morgan and H. E. Roberts. They, too, observed the decencies of the occasion, and Roberts, who, it was feared, would turn craven, even halted some guards in the yard as he was passing to the death chamber with "so long, fellows."
They, too, walked briskly and without aid up the stairs, and without fuss took their stand upon the traps. Father Moore preceded them to the scaffold, wearing the robes of his holy office and praying as he went.
Morgan had no statement to make personally, but while his arms and legs were being bound with the straps, Father Moore said in his behalf:
"Morgan wants me to say for him that he killed John York in self-defense. He wishes me also to say that he is not guilty of killing his grandfather, of which charge he was acquitted. Nor did he have any hand in the murder at The Willows, as some of his enemies have said."

even more so than the two who had preceded him, his talk was rambling and almost incoherent.
"I didn't kill those men intentionally," he cried. "I committed part of the crime intentionally, but not that part. I thought I was hounded by the officials. They lied when they said I fired three shots. They told lots of lies about me. But I forgive them as I don't want to go to my death with revenge in my heart. I forgive all. I didn't know what I was doing."
"Sooner or later I would have committed some murder if I had not been committed that one, as I was always hounded by the officials."

From then on his voice trailed away and the words he uttered were disjointed and incoherent and without meaning.
The traps were sprung at 12:35. Another jury of 12 men stood in a row. Again the doctors listened with their stethoscopes for the heart beats of the dying men, who a moment before had been full of the vigor of life.
At 12:45 a doctor touched the sway-wire corpse that had been Roberts and said:
"Dead."
Two minutes later he nodded, and the body of Morgan was out down.
Two more wooden coffins were fetched. The execution was at an end.

Salem, Or., Dec. 13.—Each of the four condemned men said they slept well last night, and they appeared to possess steadier nerves this morning than they showed several days ago.
Mike Morgan and H. E. Roberts spent their last hours reading the Bible and praying, but Noble Faulder and Frank Garrison did not manifest a desire to make a similar preparation for the end.
Morgan arose this morning at 7 o'clock, which was earlier than usual, and soon after Father Moore, the Catholic priest who has been ministering to him, was with him and gave him holy communion. Father Moore said Morgan was very devout and that he thought Morgan had made adequate preparation for death.

Morgan Makes a Confession.
After communion services, Morgan requested Father Moore to make a statement for him at the gallows. He instructed him minutely, telling him to announce that he confessed to killing John York in Josephine county, but that it was done in self-defense. He told him to mention his trial and acquittal

on the charge of murdering his grandfather in Indiana, and to say that he was innocent of that.
Morgan gave Father Moore a packet of letters and pictures and trinkets to be sent to his mother at Mount Carmel, Ill. Besides his mother, Morgan has six sisters and two brothers living.
Roberts, who seemed so near a nervous collapse a few days ago, appeared much stronger this morning and spent practically all his time reading the Bible and praying. Rev. Mr. Faulkenburg, Adventist minister, has been administering to Roberts.

The regular prison breakfast was given the men in the death cells and each ate heartily. About 9 o'clock they were dressed in citizens' clothes in preparation for the executions. At the same time the prison officials completed final preparation of the gallows and arranged for hanging two at a time.
During the night and this morning none of the men made any further confession than what had already been given. Garrison still maintained his innocence. His only remark to the wardens was: "You can see how much interest my lawyers have taken in my case." He was evidently referring to affidavits he had been expecting, but never received.
