

FORESEE BENEFITS FROM PROPOSED ORIENTAL SERVICE

Hamburg-American Line Announcement Makes Good Impression on Shipping Men—Aid to General Business.

The announcement of the Hamburg-American line to the effect that it will operate regular freight steamers between this port and the orient and Europe has made a tremendously favorable impression. Shipping men say that if good service is furnished from this port will have increased to such proportions within a few months that additional steamers will have to be pressed into service.

They say the effect of this service will not only be beneficial in the port's position as a shipping point, but will immediately reflect in an increased volume of general business, new activity in the building lines and a stronger real estate market. These predictions they base on the belief that with the establishment of the Hamburg-American line service other routes out of Portland will be found inviting to large steamship concerns, with the result that in the very near future Portland will witness a growth in its offshore traffic that will prove a tremendous surprise to the most sanguine optimists.

S. M. Meers, chairman of the subcommittee of the Chamber of Commerce Oriental Trade committee, stated this morning that there is no reason whatever why Portland should not be the big gateway for traffic between this coast and the orient.

"If the Hamburg-American line establishes a regular service that meets the business offered promptly and gives rates as low as those governing shipments from Puget sound, then the company will have no need of fear of not getting sufficient business. But we must have a sufficient number of vessels and rates as low as their competitors on the coast. Portland is the logical shipping point, if it is backed up by a country that produces needs of the oriental markets and it can be hauled into Portland at very much less cost than to other ports. The same applies to eastbound traffic. I feel certain that prompt service and reasonable rates will cause to be routed by way of Portland a very large share of the eastbound business now handled through other ports."

SAYS COURT DOESN'T GIVE SQUARE DEAL

"I'll tell you why we don't take our cases before Judge Tazewell," answered Attorney Ernest Ringo, Governor West's special prosecutor of minor cases, yesterday in the justice court to Attorney William Parrell, who had repeatedly asked the question. "It is because we don't get a square deal from Tazewell. Look over some of the cases the state's agents had before him, and you will really see why we don't go to his court."

"Furthermore," continued Ringo, "my reason is upheld by the recent election, when the people of the county decided who would be circuit judge—Davis or Tazewell—that verdict is sufficient for me. Case after case has been taken before the municipal court. With what result? No support, and the arresting officers insulted. That's why we are in the justice court."

The case in question was that against Corie Adams, charged with conducting a disorderly house, and Benj. Bradford, charged with being a vagrant. Judge Bell heard the case, finding both guilty.

OLDEST PERSON EVER ARRESTED IN PORTLAND

The oldest man who has ever been placed under arrest in the city of Portland, according to Desk Officer Circle at police headquarters, is Thomas Tobin, aged 92 years, who was brought in this morning by Patrolman Coulter for being drunk. The arrest was made at Sixteenth and Couch streets.

Tobin, who has been 65 years, is employed by a charitable institution to do odd chores, being unable, by reason of his advanced age, to keep steady employment.

FARM HAND DECLARES RICH WOMAN TRIED TO BRIBE TO KILL SPOUSE

Widow of Planter Who Was Slain in Hunting Trip Is Under Arrest.

Macon, Ga., Dec. 23.—As a result of the alleged confession of Nicholas Wilburn, a farm hand, that he was offered \$500 and a promise of marriage to slay James King, Mrs. James King, widow of the slain man, is under arrest here today.

Shortly after her arrest Mrs. King, the police assert, also confessed that she planned the crime, which occurred December 12, when King was shot while hunting.

Mrs. King, who is 42, is owner of one of the largest plantations in Middle Georgia. Wilburn is 25.

Relatives of Mrs. King are preparing to investigate her sanity. She repeated her confession today. Public sentiment against her and Wilburn is very intense.

It is declared by relatives that Mrs. King has not been rational since her last baby was born.

Killed Husband Who Beat Her.

Chicago, Dec. 23.—Telling a dramatic story of how she shot her husband after he had dragged her from bed and beat and choked her almost into insensibility, Mrs. Harriet M. Burnham, a handsome woman of middle age, frankly confessed her guilt here today, but pleaded self defense.

Assistant State's Attorney Fleming will demand the death penalty, claiming that the crime had no extenuating circumstances, and that it was unprovoked and vicious.

Police Sergeant Mulvihill told of how Mrs. Burnham attempted to bite the officers who arrested her.

COFFMAN BUSINESS IS REORGANIZED

A new organization known as the Coffman Candy company, has taken over a number of the stores formerly under the management of A. J. (Jack) Coffman, who left this city a few weeks ago, it is said, rather than face his debtors. J. P. Howarth, for the past two years one of Coffman's managers, is now manager of the new concern, and A. E. Lundsen, a Portland real estate man, is president of the organization.

The new firm will retain the manufacturing plant at 43 Front street, and a number of the stores, including the main store in the Empress theatre building. The branch store in the Wilcox building has been sold to C. I. Scofield, a well known east side candy manufacturer.

Stories known about the control of the new concern will be under the same local management as before. The employees of the individual stores will retain their positions.

Jack Coffman is still out of the city, it is said, but his wife and child are living here.

MUNICIPAL CAR LINE IN OPERATION IN SAN FRANCISCO

Mayor Pays First Nickel and Opens Service to the Public on the Geary Street Public Owned Line.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

San Francisco, Dec. 23.—Paying the first nickel earned by the first municipally-owned and operated street railroad in the United States, Mayor James Rolph of San Francisco opened to public use here today the new Geary street line, which was established after one of the longest and bitterest fights in the history of public service corporation regulation on record anywhere.

The franchise of the old road which is replaced by the new municipal line expired in 1903. Two years before this a movement was begun to own and municipally operate the road when the franchise should collapse. In 1902 the question was made the subject of a special election. It was defeated. In 1903 it was again defeated. In 1905 the measure passed. Then came the San Francisco earthquake and fire, all records were destroyed, and taxes levied were needed for other purposes.

County Annual Levy.

In 1907 another tax levy was made. This the courts annulled. In June, 1909, the people defeated a proposed bond issue for the purpose. In December, 1909, the bonds finally carried by a great majority. Then the banks refused to buy them to the amount of \$2,020,000. Next came an appeal to the people and individuals and welfare organizations, including some labor unions, invested, and "big business," seeing the public support, swung into line.

During all those years, while the project was fighting for popular support, adherents of the United Railroads of San Francisco and that corporation itself, steadily harassed the plan in the courts. Finally the United States courts held that they had no jurisdiction in the matter and the municipal ownership men had won.

Start Construction Work.

In August, 1911, work on the roadbed and track was begun, and today it is more than half completed, 10 cars are in use, and only the erection of terminals and the extension of the line to the bay and ocean remain to complete the project, which has marked the furthest advance in municipalization of street railways in the United States.

SPINSTERS, WIDOWS, TRAIL DR. HOUCK

Eastern Women of Wealth Wire New Charges Against Tearing Medical Man.

San Diego, Cal., Dec. 23.—Rich widows and wealthy spinsters from many points are apparently coming to San Diego to comfort Dr. Otto W. Houck, held in the city jail here on a charge of procuring money from elderly women by promise of marriage. Five telegrams were received by the police today, and each preaches a new charge against Houck, who is believed to have procured more than \$50,000 from his victims.

Mrs. Eliza Stovier of Ogden, Utah, is due here tonight and Miss Ella Brown, a wealthy spinster of Duluth, Minn., will arrive Sunday. A Palo Alto, Cal., woman, whose name is withheld by the police, wires that she will be here Monday.

Houck spends most of his time in tears, declaring that he spent none of the money he procured from the women in drink or gambling, but mostly on his scientific education.

BARK TORRISDALE LOST AT ENTRANCE OF GRAYS HARBOR

O'clock this morning. All are in an exhausted condition.

The British bark Torrisdale is a four-masted steel bark and is 230 feet long and 42.5 feet beam. The depth of the hold is 24 feet. Her tonnage is 2134 tons net. Captain Collins was in command of the vessel, and according to reports received here she was 49 days out from Callia Colosa, on the coast of South America, bound for the west coast of the United States.

The bark was built in Glasgow in 1902 and is owned by Carnorvon Bay, Ltd., and was under the management of Roberts, Owens & Co.

The vessel has been in this port a number of times, having sailed from here last on September 29, 1911, with a large cargo of wheat valued at \$120,000 for the United Kingdom.

A large amount of silverware was lying near the turkey and cakes, but was not molested.

MORE INDICTMENTS IN VICE SCANDAL CASES

Three more indictments arising out of the vice scandal were returned this morning by the grand jury. Two were against B. Thornton and C. D. Bronner, proprietors of the A. B. C. restaurant, who have been in the county jail since the scandal was first unearthed by the juvenile court nearly two months ago. The third was against a man whose name has not been mentioned to date and who is being sought.

Eight other indictments were given out and one was held for the arrest of the man indicted. The indictments were against the following: Fred M. Morrow, now in the Spokane jail, for forging an endorsement on a pay check of the O. W. R. & N. company for \$39.50 on November 16; F. E. Wilson, formerly floorwalker at the Olds, Wortman & King store, for forging the name of C. E. Adams as check payable to the company for \$42 on December 23 and cashing it with the company; Dr. M. M. Pendroy, for a statutory offense on Lulu Fowler, a blind woman, on November 22; George Liffie, for contributing to the delinquency of 15-year-old Dorman Rice, on December 25; Harry J. Hudson, for obtaining money under false pretenses by passing a check for \$30 on C. Polos August 24 with no funds in the bank; Lewis Brown for larceny of \$150 from the person of Alex Charles on December 13; Ed Wood, for assault with a dangerous weapon on James Moss on December 9, and Dan Pankovich, for assault with a dangerous weapon on Louis Borich on December 8.

Not true bills were returned in the cases of Leslie Anderson, charged with embezzling \$61 from the Portland News; Jane Cyr, charged with running a bawdy house, and C. D. Hoffman, charged with embezzling \$100 from his employer, Mike Smith.

DOUGHTY WOMAN USED FISTS ON HIGHWAYMEN

The two young men, Joe Lane and James Cameron, arrested at Vancouver Thursday, were charged yesterday admitted to Detectives Maloney and Craddock of the Portland police department four holdups in Portland. An attempt was made to hold up a woman and her husband. When commanded to raise their hands, the husband quickly put them up, but the woman began fighting with a bundle and her husband. No report was ever made to the police of this affair, therefore the names of the couple are not known. The boys cannot tell where it happened.

Another holdup to which they admit is that of A. W. Daniela at Shaver street and Vancouver avenue, and R. M. Pratt at Beech street and Haight avenue Christmas night. Both holdups were within minutes of each other, and were committed as Lane and Cameron were on the way to Vancouver.

The boys also confess to assaulting Watchman Gibbs of St. Helen's hall a few nights ago, when they took his star and pistol from him. His money was not molested. Vancouver authorities caught the two men in the act of burglary, and will prosecute them.

company charges \$56 a year for furnishing current for each arc lamp fed by overhead wires and \$75 a year for lamps fed by underground wires. The company makes no additional charge for the installation of the lamps. The project, relating to the last year of the contract, was evidently inserted because the company felt it would not pay to go to the expense of installing lamps which would earn revenue for only a few months.

Competition Next Year.

But the mandate of the board in yesterday's order 254 new lights installed will, according to the mayor, have to be obeyed. Ordinarily that number of lights would not have been ordered in several months. No more lights can be installed before December 31, 1913, when the present contract expires. It is the belief of the mayor that the new contract for street lighting will be let at a saving of at least fifty per cent, as the Northwestern Electric Co. will then be in a position to tender a competitive bid.

WOULD PROHIBIT BOYS FROM SELLING PAPERS

The submission of an ordinance to the city council prohibiting young boys from selling newspapers is being considered by the council of Jewish Women. It was learned today.

Members of the council already have taken the matter up for discussion with Mrs. Milla Trumbull of the child labor commission, and she has promised her support.

It is proposed to secure the enactment of an ordinance similar to the state newsboys' law of New York, and the city ordinance of Detroit and Cleveland. Under laws in force in the east boys under 16 are not allowed to sell newspapers on the streets, and none under 14 can work at night.

Whether the council will ask that the same age limits shall apply in Portland has not been decided.

ROAD GANG ESCAPE SHOT.

San Francisco, Dec. 23.—After escaping from a road gang yesterday, Peter Mayntzer, a county jail prisoner, was shot and killed here today by Deputy Sheriff Henry Borgeson in a running fight.

Deputies scoured the city for a trace of Mayntzer and came upon him unexpectedly. Mayntzer was serving five months for petty larceny, his term to expire February 23 next.

SCHOOL CHANGES PROPOSED BY TRIO OF NEW MEASURES

County School Tax Division, Election of Superintendent and Textbook System in for Shakeup, If Bills Pass.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.)

Salem, Or., Dec. 23.—Three bills of importance to the public school system of Oregon are being drafted and will be introduced in the coming legislature, based probably by the state educational department on the present method of apportioning the county school tax and to increase it in amount, to make the office of county school superintendent appointive by the board instead of elective, and to abolish the system of making an entire change of text books every six years. State School Superintendent L. R. Alderman has already explained his reasons for supporting the latter named bill, which is intended to make the cost of school books lighter to parents and to relieve the necessity of reorganizing the school course when a change is made.

But the idea back of the other two proposed measures is entirely new. The one providing for making the office of county school superintendent appointive instead of elective is said to be a move to meet the usual effect of the adoption of woman suffrage. It is pointed out that in woman suffrage states nearly all school positions, from state superintendent of public instruction down to county school superintendents, are held by women. It is said in those states these offices are conceded to women, and the electorate will not support a man for them.

It is said the theory back of the bill being drafted is that the man or woman should be chosen for these offices according to the number of teachers employed instead of the number of children of school age in the district.

The plan is to have the county school tax increased so the entire county will bear more of the cost of the school system, thus reducing the special school taxes levied by individual districts. It is said this bill would probably give in proportion that they now receive; at the same time the idea is to apportion the fund according to amounts being expended for education.

FIELDS THREATENS A DAMAGE SUIT

County Clerk Will Sue Finley if Warrants Are Served on Him.

County Clerk Frank S. Fields was this morning notified to appear in Justice Bell's court this afternoon to be formally served with two warrants charging him with refusing to pay to the state treasurer certain game license funds that he had collected. The warrants were issued on the complaint of State Game Warden Finley. Mr. Fields agreed to be in court, but added that if the warrants are served he will probably institute suit immediately against Finley for \$20,000 damages.

Formal complaint against Mr. Fields was issued by Mr. Finley through the district attorney's office yesterday afternoon. Flat refusal to pay the sums asked caused Finley to decide that further delay would only injure his case. He found out in making his complaints that Mr. Fields could not be arrested on refusal to pay one of the sums because as says he is protected by the statute of limitations.

One of the two warrants used in today's action charged Fields with withholding game license moneys due the state in 1910, amounting to \$106. The second warrant charges him with withholding license money due the state in 1911, amounting to \$75. The complaint that could not be pressed because of the statute of limitations charged the withholding of game license funds from 1905 to 1909, amounting to \$107. Because of this statute Mr. Finley was injured that if he waited many days longer, and accordingly took the action of today. A third complaint, charging Mr. Fields with not turning over \$1035 due to the game protection fund, is being held by Mr. Finley, and according to him, the warrant may be issued later this afternoon.

"I don't think the failure of the bank will protect Mr. Fields in this action," said Deputy District Attorney Fitzgerald today. "If this money has not been paid, I believe as I told Mr. Fields, he is guilty of the misdemeanor as specified by the statute, in not paying up at the end of every three months."

"I will submit to arrest this afternoon," said Mr. Fields, "but on the advice of my attorney, John F. Logan, and others, will probably start suit at once for \$20,000."

UNIONS BENEFIT BY CONVICTIONS—DREW

New York, Dec. 23.—Commenting on the Indianapolis verdict, Walter Drew, general counsel for the National Erectors' association, said here today:

"I think these convictions will be a tremendously good thing for organized labor. Unscrupulous men with criminal records have been exploiting unions to their own advantage long enough. Such men as those convicted can be found in other labor organizations."

"It would behoove all unions to 'put their house in order,' which probably they will. There is much good in organized labor. Let them follow Clancy's advice and 'clean house.'"

Mrs. Clancy Wins Love.

San Francisco, Dec. 23.—A message of love and sympathy was wired from here to Indianapolis today by Mrs. E. A. Clancy, wife of one of the union men convicted there of illegally transporting dynamite. It read:

"I know you are innocent and that in the end truth and justice will prevail. No judge, persecutor, or steel trust can make me believe you are guilty. Keep fighting for justice and the rights of the workers."

STEAMER WORKMAN IS REPORTED ASHORE

San Francisco, Cal., Dec. 23.—A cablegram received here today by the maritime department of the chamber of commerce stated that the Harrison line steamer Workman, Captain Booth, is ashore 15 miles south of Rio de Janeiro. The Workman sailed from this port for London November 17 with a general cargo valued at more than \$300,000.

HORSE FEASTS ON TREE MENTIONED IN BIBLE

Sacrilege has no place in the vocabulary of a hunker's horse. A magnificent specimen of the Bay tree, the plant mentioned in the Bible, was almost completely eaten up by a horse with a voracious appetite this afternoon. The plant was standing in front of a moving picture theater on Fourth street. The horse, which was left standing near the tree, proceeded to feast on the green tempting leaves. Passers-by rescued the tree before the horse could finish it.
