LIVE WIRES URGED TO WORK FOR GOOD WATER. (Special to The Journal.) Oregon City, Jan. 1.—A petition signed by more than 200 Oregon City citizens was presented to the Live Wires at their weekly noon day luncheon yesterday, urgently requesting that they devote its best efforts to securing pure water for Oregon City. The petition was circulated by Harry Sawyer and the signatures were secured in a very short time. The petition stated that abundant water from the Bull Run pipe line can be secured at a cost approximately of \$100,000, and recommends that the Wires urge a special election to vote bonds for this amount. A heated discussion of the petition came up at the luncheon, as quite a few members are ardent advocates of the present water system.
