Case Against Woman Continued.—The case against Anna Morrison, better known as Anna Gillette, who formerly operated a resort in the north end, was continued yesterday afternoon in the municipal court until Monday afternoon. Deputy District Attorney Hennessy was to have prosecuted the matter, in which the charge was that of selling liquor without a license, but the deputy failed to appear when the jury was called. The Morrison woman signed a complaint against two men last week charging larceny of an umbrella and six pairs of silk hose. In the hearing testimony was given that she sold the men liquor at the Royal rooming house, Fourth and Washington streets, which she is now conducting. It was upon this testimony that the two men were discharged and the woman held. She accuses Hennessy of conspiring to set free the two men. Hennessy consented to a jury trial yesterday morning, agreeing to try the case in the afternoon, but when the time came did not appear.

Arrested as White Slave.—Within 100 feet of the police station, D. B. Lively is accused of operating as a white slave. A raid was made on the place last evening by Sergeant Harms and the moral squad. Lively conducts two rooming houses on Sixth street, one being near the station. A woman giving the name of Fay Leroy was arrested in the place. A man giving the name of Alex Dahlian was arrested with her. The man told the officers he had been sent to the rooming house by Lively, being given complete instructions how to find the woman. Barney Carr was also caught in the raid. A state charge covering white slavery is against Lively, while the others are held as witnesses. The rooming house is at 91½ North Sixth street.

Eleven Divorce Cases Heard.—Eleven divorce cases were heard this morning by Referee Woods in the absence of Circuit Judge Morrow and will be submitted to Judge Morrow on his return from California where he is with the Royal Rosarians. All were uncontested and were on grounds of desertion and cruel and inhuman treatment. The cases heard were: Susanna vs. John Hansen; Clara vs. C. R. Filkey; Grace B. vs. Ernest Macavoy; Fay E. vs. Edwin T. Glasgow; Alice vs. George W. Mills; Herbert H. vs. Gertrude E. Williams; Sadie vs. James Lopez; A. vs. Nellie L. Hixson; Grace H. vs. Joe D. Sweet; Vera vs. Charles M. Ivie; and Edward vs. Alfreda Schachtmeyer.

Pardon Not Recommended.—The health and police committee today again postponed consideration of an ordinance providing for new regulations governing the construction of motion picture houses. The committee recommended that an ordinance granting Frank Marco a pardon be not passed. Marco ran amuck in a rooming house recently, and after chasing several of the inmates out of the building, he held police officers sent to arrest him at bay with a long knife. Marco was overpowered finally and sent to the city lockup for six months.

Attempts Suicide.—Over religious study is considered the cause of Gunnar Peterson to attempt suicide yesterday evening in his room at 418 Columbia street. The man had cut the arteries in his wrist and neck, but was found by his room mate in time to give medical attention, which saved his life. The man was taken to the Good Samaritan hospital, where he was kept throughout the night. He is unmarried.

Want Salary Raised.—The ways and means committee of the city council will hold the first of a series of sessions to apportion the general fund next

Monday morning at 10 o'clock. The usual number of applications for salary raises have been made by various city officials, but the requests that are granted this year will be conspicuous by their paucity.

Admits Taking Watch.—Upon complaint of Johann Lovin, a timber worker, Detectives Maloney and Swinney yesterday evening arrested Thomas Francisco, charging him with the larceny of a watch and 25 cents from Lovin. The latter reported to the police that Francisco invited him to take an automobile ride Wednesday night. During the course of the ride, the two men got into a fight, Lovin being badly pummeled. When he returned to his hotel his watch and 25 cents were missing. Francisco admits taking the watch. A charge of larceny has been placed against him, which will be heard Monday in the municipal court.

Meeting at Woodlawn.—The Woodlawn Improvement association will meet in regular session at Greene's hall, Dekum avenue, tonight at 8 o'clock. The committee appointed to act in conjunction with other clubs in order to secure the approach for the Interstate bridge on Union avenue will make their report. Newly elected officers will assume charge.

Youth Pleads Guilty.—Charles H. Northern, a young man arrested last week by Patrolman Lilla on charges similar to those made against the men caught in the vice scandal, pleaded guilty yesterday afternoon before Circuit Judge Henry L. Benson of Klaskan Falls who is sitting in place of Judge McGinn. Sentence will be pronounced tomorrow.

Masquas Sunday Tramp.—The Masquas on Sunday will leave on the Oaks car at 1:15 p. m. and go to Sellwood, whence they cross on the ferry to the west side. From here the party will tramp by way of the Riverside drive over Elk Rock hill to Oswego and Sucker lake. They return to the city by the Oswego train.

Sentenced to Reckless.—Sixty days on the rockpile was the sentence given Harry S. Hill this morning in the municipal court for conducting himself in an indecent manner yesterday before three east side women. He was arrested by Motorcycle Officer Coulter. The woman appeared before him this morning.

Company Incorporated.—Articles of incorporation of the Bramhall-Seward Lumber company were filed with County Clerk Fields this morning. The capital of the company was placed at \$10,000 and the incorporators were Loren Seward, J. N. Bramhall and J. H. Middleton.

Inner Study Circle to Meet.—The Inner Study circle will meet Monday afternoon, January 6, at 5:45 o'clock, at the Bowers hotel. At this meeting will be shown the first set of lantern slides sent out by the educational committee of the Associated Ad Clubs of America.

Comfort Station Bld.—The lowest bid opened by the park board yesterday for the construction of the proposed comfort station under the pavement at

the corner of Sixth and Yamhill streets was \$18,140. The bid will probably be accepted and the work started within a few days.

Man Dressed as Woman.—A man dressed as a woman appeared yesterday afternoon at the home of Mrs. L. Lindsay, 355 Holladay avenue, asking for work. Mrs. Lindsay had no employment, but offered the stranger something to eat, as he insisted that work be offered as he was hungry. He was invited to the kitchen, given something to eat, but for some reason, he did not eat much. As the man left the house, Mrs. Lindsay noted it was not a woman that she was assisting, but a man. The police were notified, but could find no trace of him.

To Avoid Dead Letter Office.—At the request of City Auditor A. L. Barbur, Acting Postmaster W. E. Williamson has written to the postmaster general of the United States asking for permission to enter into an agreement with the city whereby undelivered assessment notices sent out by the auditor to various parts of the city may be returned to the city auditor instead of being sent to the dead letter office.

Raised Bills in Circulation.—A \$1 bill raised to 120 was passed yesterday on the grocer at 115 North Fourteenth street, the money later being turned over to the police. A report from the federal officers is to the effect that there are several of these counterfeit bills in circulation in Portland, having been put out 10 days ago. From reports, the officials say it is being done by two men.
