

FIELDS IS ENTITLED TO ALL CITIZENSHIP FEES UP TO \$3000

Supreme Court Accordingly Orders His Salary for July and August, 1911, Paid; 7 Other Opinions.

(Salem Bureau of the Journal.)
Salem, Or., Jan. 7.—The state supreme court today affirmed the decision of the lower court in issuing a writ of mandamus to compel the officials of Multnomah county to pay County Clerk Frank S. Fields his salary for July and August, 1911. This salary was held up by County Judge Cleaton and Commissioners Hart and Lightner, on the ground that Fields had refused to turn over to the county the money collected by him for naturalization fees.

In an opinion written by Judge Bean, the supreme court holds that the county is not entitled to these fees. It holds that under the act of congress, approved June 29, 1906, the county clerk is entitled to naturalization fees up to the amount of \$3000 annually, and any fees collected in excess of that amount must be turned over to the bureau of immigration.

In the event that the state courts exercised the jurisdiction conferred by the federal statutes, the duties of the clerk pertaining to naturalization matters are in addition to those imposed by the state for which the salary is provided," says the opinion. "In naturalization proceedings the clerk acts as the agent of the United States."

Seven other opinions were handed down today as follows:
Merchants' National bank of Portland vs. John P. Sharkey company, appellant; suit to collect on promissory note, appealed from Multnomah county; reversed and new trial ordered unless the plaintiffs will refund a certain amount of interest charged at the rate of 8 per cent since the commencement of the suit, when the legal rate was 6 per cent.

Kincaid and Stren vs. J. L. Shambrook, appellants, appealed from Douglas county; suit for \$550; affirmed.

F. W. Paine and J. G. Paine, appellants, vs. the Milton, Freewater & Hudson Bay Irrigation company, et al; appealed from Multnomah county; suit for \$29,500 damages sustained to shipment of goods, reversed and new trial ordered.

N. Jones vs. William Hughes, appellant; appealed from Multnomah county; action to recover \$1815; affirmed.

Shipman, Deary, Rhame & Company, vs. Portland Construction company, et al, appellant, appealed from Multnomah county; suit for \$3350; modified and affirmed.

West Side Lumber & Shingle Company, appellants, vs. A. G. Herald & Company, and Pauline Walcott; appealed from Multnomah county; suit to foreclose lien, which was dismissed in lower court and is here reversed and the lien foreclosed.

CHURCH TO CELEBRATE BIRTHDAY OF PASTOR

The first official meeting of Trinity Methodist church was held last night. Reports from the treasurer showed the church to be prospering. Only \$13 was unpaid on current expenses for the last quarter, ending December 31, 1911. Thirteen members were added to the church during that time. Plans were discussed for the celebration of May 13, the birthday of the pastor, Rev. Charles T. McPherson. This is in recognition of Mr. McPherson's services in bringing to a successful conclusion, 13 difficult church enterprises in 13 years. It is hoped to raise \$11,000 more before that time, the amount necessary to build free of debt, the new Trinity Methodist church. It was unanimously voted to increase the pastor's salary \$200. Messrs. G. E. Johnson, W. J. Clemens and others, will speak at a rally in the next Sunday at 11 a. m.

County Pays 2-3 Library Expense.

Hood River, Or., Jan. 7.—In view of the fact that the Carnegie library donation of \$17,500, made the city of Hood River for the purpose of erecting a library building, was contingent on the condition that the city guarantee to raise and spend the annual sum of 10 per cent of this amount, or \$1750, per year, the city and county have made a contract whereby the city will pay one third and the county two thirds of this amount. The ground on which the county makes its apportionment in order to maintain the library is that the library will have a circulating department that will reach nearly all of the residents of the valley.

REAL SNOW FALLS; SOON DISAPPEARS

Weather Man's Forecast Was Right; Traffic Not Interrupted.

Luckily the car probably came along as nearly as ever on time, too, because from the office of the dispatcher of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, it is reported that the street-car company suffered no inconvenience on account of the snowfall. The snow did not pack hard enough to require the operation of flanges and there was not enough of it to necessitate the use of snow plows.

It was fine fun for the youngsters while it lasted. They made the best of it during the early morning hours. The snow packed splendidly for snowballs, and some of the boys showed remarkable speed and accuracy of marksmanship in their delivery. The lucky ones who have sleds rescued them from oblivion in cellar and garret. Shovels and tin pans made fairly good substitutes in instances where the real article was lacking.

It was a bad night for criminals and a good night for policemen. Bloodhounds with colds in their heads suffered no inconvenience on account of the colds, tracks in the freshly laid snow being visible to the eye if not odoriferous to the nose.

Altogether it was a very satisfactory little snowstorm.
