Woman Fined \$100—Mrs. Anna Morrison, proprietor of the Royal hotel at Fourth and Washington streets, was found guilty yesterday in the municipal court of selling liquor without a license. Four young men testified buying liquor from her on Christmas night. Chris Mars was the chief witness against her. The accused had two of the men arrested December 26 for stealing an umbrella and six pairs of silk hose. This charge was dismissed by Judge Tawell, as he held no evidence had been introduced to show the theft. ORENCO DECIDES TO INCORPORATE

Women Show Malice Toward Piggens, Barns and Fowl Inside Limits.

(Special to The Journal.)
Orenco, Or., Jan. 7.—By a plurality of 16 votes the people of this place decided yesterday on incorporating the town. The vote stood 49 for incorporating and 33 against. A goodly number of women turned out. It is believed Mayor McDonald will have his hands full, as one woman voter said yesterday she was going to see that every barn was removed from the town. Another woman voter, who has a dislike for other women's chickens running over her premises, has indicated that she will bring influence to bear on the officials of the town to have an ordinance passed to compel every poultry raiser to keep his fowls penned up. One woman said she would see that no hophens were allowed to exist in the town.

Uniforms for Elevator Boys—In keeping with the handsome new courthouse the two elevator operators are to be dressed in fine blue uniforms in the future and as a sample Harry Smith and Ben Charleston, the two men in charge, had a uniform between them this morning. Smith wore the blue military coat and Charleston displayed the military hat which the regulations require. In a few weeks the remaining portions of the uniforms will be ready for display.

Pitman Burned in Explosion—George Fairbanks, stoker on fire engine No. 4, was seriously burned this morning in an explosion in room 3 at Third street. The explosion was from a gas jet, which was occasioned when an attempt was made to light it. Fire started from the explosion, causing a call for the fire department. Damage by fire, however, was small. Fairbanks was attended at a nearby drug store and taken home.

Snow Blocks Fire Engine—Fire this morning at 2 o'clock destroyed the home of H. F. Bartels at 426 Hall street. The blaze originated in the basement near the furnace. Fire engine company No. 4 answered the call, but had great difficulty in getting up the hill near the place. The heavy machine could not be hauled to the top of the hill, slippery streets preventing. The hose wagon was finally got to the top. The loss is reported heavy.

Sanitary Commission to Meet—The newly appointed sanitary commission of 15 citizens will hold its initial meeting at 1:30 o'clock next Friday afternoon in the mayor's committee room on the third floor of the city hall. The purpose of the meeting is to organize and divide the work among subcommittees. The object of the commission is to investigate sanitary conditions with a view to making recommendations to the city council as to what should be done to handle the garbage situation.

Conductor Fined Between Cars—While putting his car away last night in the Piedmont barns, James Schwinster, conductor on a Union avenue car, was caught between it and a Broadway car, pinning him until assistance arrived. The Broadway car was being used to push the Union avenue car into the place. The injured conductor was taken to the Good Samaritan hospital, where he was attended by Dr. Rocky.

Prove an Alibi—An alibi was proved by D. E. Ranney and Mannie Duston, the two who were recently arrested on information of Secret Service Officer Steve Connell on a charge of passing Defunct Georgia bank notes. In the hearing given them before United States Commissioner A. M. Cannon yesterday. The testimony indicated that it was a case of mistaken identity.

City Bonds Sell at Premium—The ways and means committee of the city council yesterday opened bids for \$217,000 of municipal street improvement bonds. The city water board will be awarded \$200,000 of the issue on its bid of 3.5 per cent premium. The United States National bank will get the rest at the same premium.
