

SAY LAWYER USES UNFAIR METHODS

Attempt Made to Intimidate
Winters Heirs, Charged
Here.

Affairs in the case of the estate of H. D. Winters, who died about a year and a half ago leaving an estate valued at \$100,000, have taken a new turn, according to Attorney Manning and Leonard yesterday, who are representing John Henry Winters of Johnstown, N. Y., in his fight as an heir to the estate.

These attorneys are in receipt of a letter written, according to Mr. Manning, to John H. Winters by Nelson H. Tunniff, an attorney of New York, on April 9, 1912, asking Mr. Winters to turn over to him all evidence of his claims to the estate.

In the letter, Attorney Tunniff stated that he was representing a number of New York banks and had done considerable work in tracing heirs to estates. He asked Mr. Winters a number of questions in regard to his relations and if he had pictures and papers thoroughly establishing his claims.

"When Mr. Winters received this letter," said Mr. Manning, "he sent a reply telling Tunniff that attorneys in Oregon were already representing him and had been at work on the case for some time."

"Upon receiving this Mr. Tunniff made a personal visit to Mr. Winters. He did everything in his power to have the case transferred so that he could be the attorney. He stated to Mr. Winters unless the case was turned over to him, he would see to it that Mr. Winters would get none of the estate."

Whew! Postal Clerks Fled. It Was Limburger! Cheese Is Isolated at Postoffice Awaiting Owner

Limburger cheese and spoiled head cheese have brought very forcibly to the minds of Portland postoffice employees one of the disadvantages of the parcels post system. A triple strength piece of limburger, in a highly satisfactory state of decomposition, was received for Portland delivery from Tillamook Monday.

Oregon's Industrial Toll of Human Life for Sixteen Months' Period Numbers 164

From the report of State Labor Commissioner O. P. Hoff, which is soon to be made, it appears that 5179 accidents, 164 of them fatal, were reported in the 16 months' period from May 29, 1911, to September 28, 1912, in the trades and crafts of Oregon, where more than three men are employed.

The lumber industry laid the heaviest toll upon life, with a total of 1891 accidents, railroad work being a close second, with 1274. There were 43 fatalities in logging work, sawmills or yards, and 45 fatal injuries in railroad construction, section, train or yard work. The total list of accidents as classified is as follows:

Blacksmithing, 60; bridge construction, 27; can manufacturing, 46; carpenters, 50; concrete, cement and paving, 28; construction, 398; electrical work, 183; furniture, etc., 27; logging, 481; machine shops, foundries, etc., 544; meat, canneries, 45; mining, 11; paper mill, 45; power plants and construction work, 35; quarry work, 20; railroad construction, 389; railroad section, 264; railroad train, 407; railroad yard, 394; sawmills, planing mills, etc., 545; sawmill and planing mill yards, 285; teaming, 42; warehouse and dock work, 95; woolen mills, 38; miscellaneous, 261; total, 5179.

The figures of Commissioner Hoff's report are being used by the workmen's compensation commission to show the need for the enactment of a general compensation law in Oregon.

Dr. Chappell stated that Rockefeller has undergone six operations, is scarcely able to whisper, and that another severe attack might prove fatal. SALT LAKE'S WATER SYSTEM FROZEN UP

Two of the three reservoirs supplying the business section are exhausted and the third is held in reserve in case of fire. Switch engines are forced to go to Farmington, six miles distant, to fill their boilers. The mercury is rising rapidly this afternoon and improved conditions are expected soon.

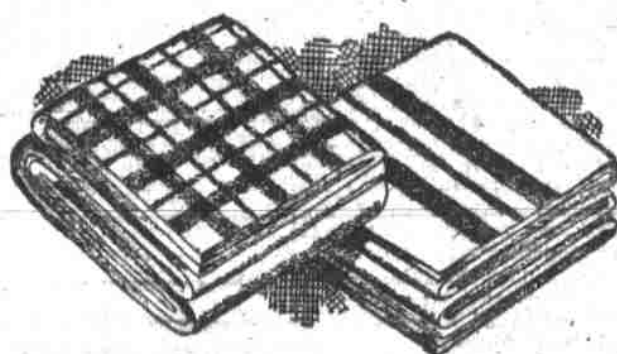
