

## ALIMONY DRIVES TELLER TO STEAL

Divorced Wife and New One  
Take More Than He  
Can Make.

Seattle, Jan. 10.—"I had to pay alimony to my divorced wife. I had to support my present wife. And so—well, I made a mess of it. I want to take my medicine so that when I come out I can make a better start."

Russell W. Jennings, defaulting teller of the Pacific National bank of Tacoma, missing since December 6, and arrested in Seattle Wednesday, gave above explanation of his downfall this morning. Jennings made a full confession of his pecuniary habits, which are in excess of \$5000. The officer found Jennings at the Elks' club in the Alaska building. He did not deny his identity, saying: "I came here to forget my troubles."

To Cashier Stephen Appleby of the bank, he said:

"I knew the jig was up when I was transferred from receiving to paying teller a few days before the shortage was found."

He denied he had spent any of the stolen money on dissolute women. Jennings was given a preliminary hearing this morning and held for the Tacoma grand jury. The minimum sentence is five years.

## POSTAL SERVICE ROUTE GIVES HARD PROBLEM

Postoffice Inspector H. G. Durand has returned from Spokane, where he has been acting chief of the northwest inspector force during the absence of Inspector Birdseye. While at Spokane, Mr. Durand detailed inspectors Whitney and Neal to go to Burns, O., and endeavor to maintain postal service between Vale, Austin, Canyon City, Diamond,

Venore and Burns, which was entirely paralyzed by the sudden resignation of C. M. Kellogg, the contractor on New Year's day, from the position of distributor.

The mail route into the isolated towns of eastern Oregon from Vale and Austin, points on the railroad, is the largest contract delivery job in the United States. C. M. Kellogg, the contractor, covered the 320 miles between the towns mentioned, seven days a week, getting the mail from the railroad at Vale and Austin. The route is known as a "star" route, and it is said that one who has never been over the territory cannot appreciate the conditions that have to be met. Situated on a high plateau, at this time it is bitterly cold. These were some of the conditions, therefore, when early New Year's morning, the postmaster at Burns was notified by Kellogg's agents that he was through with the job. There had not been the slightest warning before that Kellogg would quit. The inspectors were rushed to the scene and this week the mails were slowly gotten into motion again. Operations are being hampered, however, by the unwillingness of any one to take the delivery contract for a short time while the government is advertising for a new bidder.

The service was maintained at considerable expense. Kellogg was bonded to the government at something like \$50,000, and he was probably paid in the neighborhood of \$25,000 a year. Road houses for the team relays and men had to be maintained at intervals of a few miles over the entire route. The terms of the contract stipulate that the bondsmen have to stand all the expense of the service while a new man is being secured for the job.

## MARSHALL ASKS FOR PROGRESSIVE LAWS

Indianapolis, Ind., Jan. 10.—The sixtieth general assembly of Indiana convened at noon yesterday. Governor Marshall, who assumes the vice presidency of the United States March 4, in his final message to the legislature, urged the passage of several progressive measures, including workmen's compensation, public utilities and inheritance tax laws, and the popular election of United States senators.

## GUARD MUTINEERS ARE MUSTERED IN

Four Offending Companies Received Back Into Third Infantry.

Final adjustment of the difficulties which resulted from the Oregon National Guard "mutiny" during the maneuvers near Monticello, Wash., last summer was made Wednesday when Adjutant-General Finzer in an official proclamation mustered the four offending companies back into the Third Infantry.

By virtue of the proclamation First Provisional company will be known now as Company H, Third Infantry; Second Provisional company as Company G, Third Infantry, Dallas; Third Provisional company as Company E, Third Infantry, and Fourth Provisional company as Company F, Third Infantry. This is the first regimental recognition given the provisional companies.

General Finzer has announced the following as dates for official inspection of companies during the year 1913:

Coast Artillery Corps—Fourth company, February 3; First company, February 4; Seventh company, February 5; Sixth company, February 7; headquarter staff, February 10; Second company, February 10; Third company, February 10; Fifth company, February 11; Eighth company, February 12; band, February 12.

Third Infantry—Company K, February 3; headquarters, staff and band, February 4; Company F, February 5; Company C, February 6; Company B, February 10; Company B, February 11; Company E, February 13; Company D, February 17; Company M, February 19; Company G, February 19; Company I, February 20; Company L, February 21; Company A, February 25; Battery A, Field Artillery, April 18; ambulance company, February 4; medical supply depot, February 4; general headquarters, February 14; storehouse, Portland, February 15; storehouse, Clackamas, March 1.

## DALLAS GUARDSMEN ELECT NEW CAPTAIN



First Lieutenant, now Captain, Conrad Stappin of The Dallas National Guard company.

Dallas, Or., Jan. 10.—Company G of the Oregon national guard held a meeting Tuesday night, presided over by Lieutenant Endicott, U. S. A., to elect a captain. First Lieutenant Conrad Stappin was chosen and passed satisfactory examination before Lieutenant Endicott and Major Smith immediately following the election.

This company, which is one of those disbanded following the trouble at Gata, Wash., last summer, while on encampment, has been transferred back to the Third regiment of the O. N. G. Mr. Stappin is a druggist and has been connected with the O. N. G. for the past five years, serving three years as first lieutenant. He is a member of the I. O. O. F., W. O. W., Rebekah and K. of P. lodges of this city, and is also a Shriner.

## URGES INVESTIGATION OF STATE POLICE PLAN

The Oregon National Guard aggregates a total of 1667 men, according to the annual report of Adjutant General Finzer.

The enlistment is apportioned as follows:

Brigadier general 1, colonels 5, lieutenant colonels 4, majors 12, captain (adjutant) 1, captain in quarters (sentry) 1, captain (commissary) 1, captain (inspector of small arms practice) 1, captain (chaplain) 1, captains 32, first lieutenants, battalion adjutants 3, first lieutenants 31, second lieutenants, battalion quartermasters and commissary 2, second lieutenants 13, total commissioned 116, noncommissioned officers 294, musicians 76, cooks 34, privates 1074; total enlisted, 1451; aggregate 1667.

The report recommends that the legislature at its session this year continue the annual appropriation of \$20,000 for the construction of armories. The adjutant general states that additional buildings are necessary to maintain the guard's high standing in efficiency. The report also recommends the building of an armory at Clackamas, Or., as a store house for all supplies.

It is urged further that cash payment be made for all supplies purchased for the militia. The report states that the organization could be more economically maintained if such a rule were followed. Mr. Finzer recommends also that the matter of forming an organization of state police be investigated.

## PROPOSES REFERENDUM HOSPITAL CONTRACTS

Application of the referendum to all contracts for hospital and physician's services made by any firm or corporation in Oregon is proposed by Dr. J. E. Anderson of The Dalles, representative-elect to the next legislature.

In a bill drawn by Dr. Anderson he proposes to bring about this plan by requiring that once each year, on or before the first day of July, any company or firm making a contract for treatment of employees with any hospital or doctor shall post a list of its contracts in a conspicuous place for inspection of employees, and a referendum may be called by the employees on a petition signed by 25 persons, or by 25

per cent of the employees where less than 100 persons are involved. Following the filing of such a petition the contract must be submitted to a vote of all the employees who are contributors to the fund, and at the same time a vote taken on a substitute contract proposed by those who file the referendum. The contract receiving the largest number of votes is thereby confirmed.

The bill is designed to meet complaints that have been made by employees a percentage of whose wages is withheld for hospital dues. This would give the employees a voice in the making of contracts for their care. All firms and corporations withholding any share of wages of employees for such purposes are to be required to file an itemized list of contributions and expenditures with the secretary of state.

## ALLEGED "DOPE" FIEND USES GUN TO GET SUPPLY

White, an alleged "dope" fiend, entered Flat's drug store late Wednesday night, and at the muzzle of a gun, held up Herman Kresse, the clerk, and demanded all the morphine and cocaine in the store. Kresse gave him a small quantity, declaring it was all there was in stock. White left, threatening to kill Kresse if he reported it. White was followed to an old shack near the railroad and arrested. He had a large dirk knife and "dope" in every pocket. He said the supplies were sent him from Philadelphia in \$15 amounts.
